CONCERNING MR. WOOD.

The Liberal-Conservative candidate for Westmorland can congratulate himself on the circumstance that his opponents have not succeeded in attacking his record for the four years of his public life. Mr. Wood has not in parliament four sessions, and has been recognized as one of the leading Maritime Province members. He has taken an important part in many debates. His speeches and votes are in the public records, so that he who runs may read. If he has failed in his duty to his country or his country the record does not show it.

Mr. Wood is one of those who believe in the future of this country, and who have sought to bring the resources of the land within the reach of the people.

While some others laughed at the idea of the return of the C. P. R. loan, and while one of the New Brunswick colleagues declared that in two years from 1884 the thirty-five millions of Canadian Pacific bonds taken as security would not be worth a thousand dollars, Mr. Wood, with the judgment of a business man, formed the opinion that the investment was necessary and safe. The future has justified that view for the railway is completed and the loan was repaid long before it was due. And before the date fixed by contract for the completion of the C. P. R. to Ottawa has arrived, the trans-continental line will connect by the shore with the Intercolonial at Salisbury.

While Mr. Wood's critics were pouring forth complaints over the decline in the shipbuilding industry, and the prospective decay of the lumber business, and bemoaning the effects on the laboring men and the farmers' markets, Mr. Wood has given his best thought and work to legislation for the encouragement of other industries of a more abiding character. Steamships may displace sailing vessels, the timber may disappear before the woodman's axe, but the people will still use the products of the workshop and factory. Instead of ship and saw mills we may have cotton factories, refineries and foundries. Little Rhode Island makes its lumber and builds its ships, but the state is a hive of industry, and the farmer with a few acres of land has the best market in the world. What the possibilities of New Brunswick may be in this direction we cannot say, but a man who like Mr. Wood is doing something by legislation and by personal experiment to work it out is worth more to the country than many lawyers, whose business is with the estates of the departed, and whose ideas are connected with issues long since dead.

Mr. Wood was not in 1882 so prone to election promises as his opponent is today. He spoke with modesty and reserve of what he could do for his country, and has been one of the politicians who are better than their word. If Mr. Emmerson had been the member for the county and had succeeded in convincing the Government and parliament of the railway from Sackville to the Cape, he would, no doubt, have made many speeches in honor of himself, even though the road had never been built. The railway itself, and the pier at the shore terminus are Mr. Wood's speech to the electors who have long looked forward to the realization of this enterprise. Elsewhere in Westmorland like addresses are made to the people.

Westmorland has never had a representative who made less display of his own achievements, and never had a representative who has been anything near as valuable to the county as Mr. Wood, nor has the county been represented by any man, not even by Sir Albert Smith in his best days, who would give a better account of himself before the public, or a better defence of the principles he supports, than the latest member.

DR. WELDON IN ALBERT.

Dr. Weldon may or may not be about to be elected in Albert, but he is making some of the best speeches ever made in the County. There is nothing hide-bound about Dr. Weldon's politics. He is an independent man and a thinking man, and no party can hope to oust or run him. It is impossible to conceive of persons or parties influencing Dr. Weldon to do or say anything he does not believe to be right. The people of Albert by electing such a man will have a representative to be consulted on great questions as well as small, not a delegate to represent Elgin or another section of the county, but the whole of it, and the whole of Canada. These considerations will, undoubtedly, have great weight with the constituency, which will hardly care to take the risk of rejecting a candidate who has the largest, richest and most cultured constituency might be glad to elect. The appeal against him on the score that he is an outsider is a false one for Albert County will be more his home henceforth than any other. The hearty reception which Dr. Weldon meets wherever he goes, and which all who know him were sure he would meet everywhere that he became known, points to his success on the 22nd.

WATCH THEM.

Mr. H. R. Emmerson, meets with new and unexpected difficulties in his ostentatious proclamation that he is purer than all politicians that have gone before him. Everywhere that Mr. Emmerson speaks, the principal seats on the platform are occupied by party managers, who not long ago were engaged with Mr. Emmerson in an attempt to carry an election by the methods that Mr. Emmerson denounces. They know just what sort of an elector the candidate is, and when he makes lofty pretensions they look at one another with a wink as the ancient Argurs were supposed to do when their clients backs were turned.

It will be well to keep a strict watch on the "party of purity" in this country, notwithstanding their threats about jailing and prosecuting boodlers. During the late election contest in the province of Ontario, the statement was wired all over Canada that a Dominion Government agent was busy bribing the electors of Perth to vote for one Mr. Hess, and that he would be arrested and sent to jail. The man was arrested the night before the election, but the arrest was not made by the men who started the report. It was made at the instance of Mr. Hess himself, and the briber proved to be an agent of the Reform party, so called. He was committed to jail and is now out on bail. During the late Manitoba local contest word came from Ontario that some prominent supporters of Tory premier Norquay would be arrested and imprisoned. An arrest did take place there, after and the party sent to jail was no less than the gentleman who opposed Norquay in his own constituency.

A SKELETON AT THE FEAST.

STRANGE ALLIES.

It is currently reported that Rev. Mr. Lawson, an excellent and venerable Baptist minister, is actively engaged canvassing for Mr. Emmerson, like Sir Charles Tupper, is a Baptist minister's son. Nobody disputes Mr. Lawson's right to canvass for the man of his choice, whether he be the son of a Baptist minister or not, and few would find fault with him for preaching political sermons if he conscientiously thinks they are required, but as poverty is said to make strange bedfellows, so the exigencies of Mr. Emmerson's case are likely to give Mr. Lawson some strange allies. Foremost among these will probably be Messrs. Frechette and Langevin, will promote missionaries recently imported from Quebec in answer to the Macedonian cry of Mr. Weldon, of St. John. These missionaries have come among the Canadians of this Province to convert them from the errors of Toryism, and it is likely that "the noble county of Westmorland" with its large French population will be neglected. It is not to be expected, however, that they and Mr. Lawson, although striving for one end, will work together or even in the same part of the vineyard. Mr. Lawson is not likely to accompany the missionaries to the French settlements to tell the Canadians about the unholiness of the British Empire, and the Catholics, and so, to ward them off from the French domination. On the other hand, it is not at all probable that the missionaries will go with Mr. Lawson to the Baptist communities of Westmorland to show the people that Kiehl is a genuine martyr, and that the Government should be overthrown for permitting the sentence against him to be executed. It is not even to be expected that Mr. Lawson and his allies will speak together from the same platform, for their work can best be performed apart from each other. It may be well however for Mr. Lawson to reflect whether the work his allies are brought here to do is such as he can conscientiously approve. If he believes their coming will promote harmony and general welfare of the community he will do well to work in the same ranks, but if he thinks their mission will have a tendency to stir up religious strife he will certainly decide not to labor for a cause which requires such expedients.

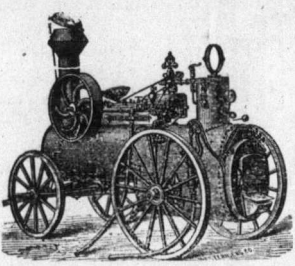

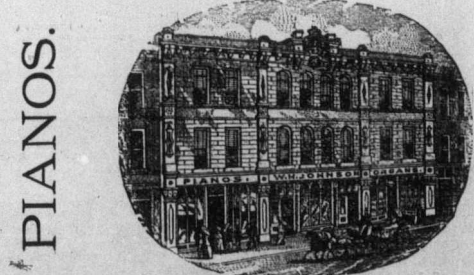

PROVINCIAL APPOINTMENT. Westmorland. Robert Lowerison to be a Commissioner of Sewers for the Ritor aboudeau marsh in the parishes of Sackville and Westmorland.

BROUGHT HOME. The remains of John T. Power, of Charlottetown, who recently died at Jacksonville, Fla., were forwarded by rail to Cape Tormentine yesterday to be taken across the Straits by iceboat.

Why this sudden rise in our poor rates, as we were only assessed \$256 for poor rates for the year 1885? There was a surplus of \$28.98 due this parish at the January session of 1887. Also \$11.00 fines collected by Wm. Dunne Esq., both of which were paid over to the overseers of the poor the past year, so that our actual poor account for the past year is \$690.39. As the rate payers of the parish will soon be called upon to pay their taxes they should certainly know what they are paying such a heavy poor tax for, therefore I think it is clearly the duty of our County Councilors to publish in the County newspapers a detailed statement, showing the names of parties receiving parish aid, the names of parties to whom the amounts were paid (or assumed) to each.

Many life long Liberals, disgusted with the blizzard campaign of bluster and blackguardism, have abandoned organized hypocrisy and are doing yeoman service for union, prosperity and progress. Among the most prominent recruits are Frank Killam, ex-Grit M. P., and Hon. L. M. Baker, Yarmouth, who are supporting Kinney, Duncan, Cameron, Richmond, William Oxley, Cumberland, T. B. Smith, ex-Grit M. P., Windsor, D. McDonald, ex-Grit M. P., Victoria, John McGowan, shipbuilder, Shelburne, and John Vought, leading Liberal of Cape Breton County. Sir Charles Tupper will have seven hundred majority in Cumberland, and McLeishan five hundred in Colebrook, and Liberal and Conservative prospects are brightening all along the line in Nova Scotia.

Last year will add another one hundred thousand, making in all half a million, not to speak of other expenditures for cruisers, etc.

St. John, Feb. 9.—Engineer Purdy was here to thoroughly investigate and report upon the repairs of St. John as a terminal port.

HALIFAX, Feb. 9.—Reported that Messrs. Nelson, formerly proprietors of International Hotel, have bought the Halifax Hotel for ninety thousand dollars.

Mr. Editor.

In looking over the report of the County Council in your issue of 27th ult. I notice the Parish of Botsford is assessed \$650.41 for poor rates for the past year of 1886.

Why this sudden rise in our poor rates, as we were only assessed \$256 for poor rates for the year 1885? There was a surplus of \$28.98 due this parish at the January session of 1887. Also \$11.00 fines collected by Wm. Dunne Esq., both of which were paid over to the overseers of the poor the past year, so that our actual poor account for the past year is \$690.39. As the rate payers of the parish will soon be called upon to pay their taxes they should certainly know what they are paying such a heavy poor tax for, therefore I think it is clearly the duty of our County Councilors to publish in the County newspapers a detailed statement, showing the names of parties receiving parish aid, the names of parties to whom the amounts were paid (or assumed) to each.

A Bradford, Vt., despatch of the 5th inst. says: "The night express, which left White River Junction for Montreal this morning, filled with passengers from Boston, New York and the West, for the arrival at Montreal, was thrown from the track by a broken rail on Woodstock bridge, West Hartford, Vermont, about 2 o'clock this morning. The engine, baggage car, two passenger cars and two sleepers plunged over the bridge sixty feet into the river below. The cars immediately took fire and within twenty minutes were all consumed as was also the bridge. The loss of life is estimated at fifty and the number of injured large.

According to the last United States census the total capital invested in the fishing industries of Maine and Massachusetts is \$17,710,444, the annual product \$17,755,928, and the total number of persons employed on sea and shore \$1,188. This would be a comparative small state to go to war about, but it is, of course, a principle for which each side is contending.

The Egyptian Government have raised the blockade of the Soudan and commerce with that region has been re-opened.

The Inter-State Commerce bill has received the approval of the President.

GENERAL NEWS.

Several fast skaters, including McCormick, Whitley, Akery and Dingee, have left St. John to take part in the Montreal races.

Another case of the bitter blizzard is reported from New York, a Canadian who went there to purchase counterfeit bills paying \$127 for what subsequently proved to be two old newspapers and a pound of coal.

Five men boarded a train at Alliance, Ohio, on Thursday night and rescued a train from two Cleveland police officers, the officers being shot and so brutally beaten that their lives are in great danger.

A terrible water spout burst over the village of Chestnut Mount, near Carleton Place, on Wednesday night, almost ruining that section of country. A child was carried off by the flood and drowned.

The appeals from Port Hood, C. B., to the full bench of the supreme court, in the cases of William McDonald, charged with rape, and the man McDonald, charged with the murder of Mr. LeLair, have both been decided against the accused.

Advices from Mandalay state that the British forces have captured the entire camp of the insurgent Boshway. Boshway, however, managed to escape. King Theebaw and the Tanwa of Woodtho have issued an address to the Burmese, advising them to submit to the British rule.

A special from Fargo, Dak., says: "A blizzard seems more severe and terrible than its predecessor. The storm between Jamestown and Fargo has been worse than any in the history of the country. The thermometer ranged between 25° and 30° below zero all day Thursday, and east and west of this point terrible blizzards are raging. The trains from the east with four engines was unable to make its way through the snow-drift, and numerous settlers are reported to have been lost on the prairie. A man near Sirius wandered about on the prairie Wednesday night, having been lost while attempting to go from his house to a store, a distance of four miles, and when found he was buried in a snow-drift in which he sought shelter. His limbs were frozen so badly that amputation will be necessary, and it is thought he cannot recover.
