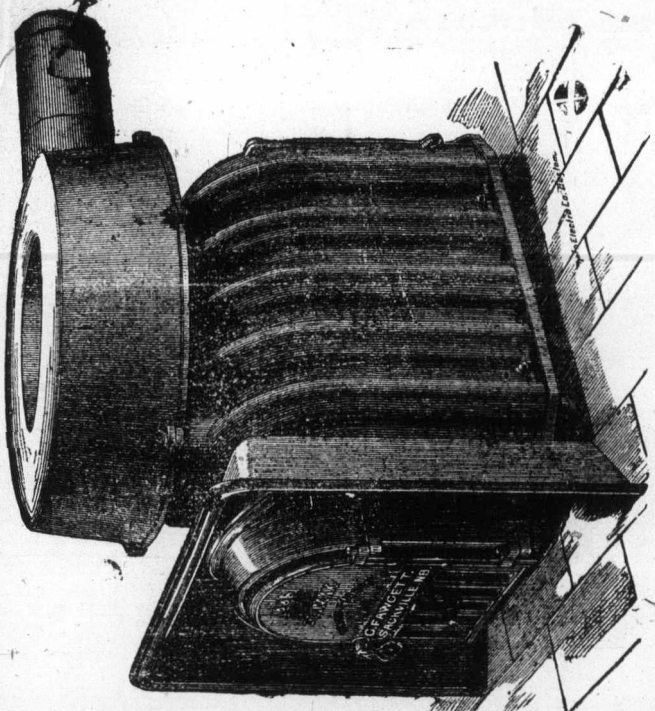

WOMEN'S MISSIONARY SOCIETY.—A
public meeting under the auspices of the
Women's Missionary Society is to be
held in the Methodist church, Sackville,
on Sunday evening next.

HOME FOR BURIAL.—The body of Mr.
Edward Bowser formerly of Coles Isl-
and who died in Nebraska last Thursday
passed through Sackville and was interred
at Westmorland on Tuesday.

EXCURSION TO CHARLOTTETOWN.—The
excursion to Charlottetown via the N.
B. and P. E. I. R. R. and steamer
Alameda left here yesterday morning
about 30 persons leaving Wood's siding
at eight o'clock.

FOREST FIRES.—The forest fires in
the vicinity of Sackville have done con-
siderable damage to lumber, and have
not been for the strenuous efforts put
forth by some of the residents, much
property would have undoubtedly been
destroyed.

FROSTY HOLLOW CULVERT.—Messrs
Rhodes, Curry & Co. have about com-
pleted the quarrying for the new culvert
at Frosty Hollow, and the men are con-
tinuing to remove the old one. All
trains have orders to slow up when ap-
proaching the place.

NEW WAREHOUSE.—Messrs M. Wood
& Sons have commenced the erection of
a new four and feed warehouse between
the branch line at their present ware-
house and Weldon St. It will be of
wood, 75 by 30 feet, and two stories
high. Mr. Copp superintends the
building.

SHIPPING NOTES.—The Herber is ex-
pected to sail for Barbados the latter
part of the week. She will carry about
1000 bales of hay, and lumber and
shingles.—Schooner Grete, Capt. Cor-
bett, sailed on Saturday with 300 pec-
tling and some logs for New York. She
was loaded by Simco's Outhouse.

SPECIAL PRIZE.—Mr. Arthur Snow-
don, Point de Bute, has offered a special
prize for yeasting colls aired, by Greg
Chester, to be competed for at the
Sackville and Westmorland Agricultural
Society's Exhibition here next fall.
This was omitted in the compiling
prize list.

A ROUGH EXPERIENCE.—Karl Fauske,
a German who was on board of a Nor-
wegian bark which ran into an iceberg
off Newfoundland, is in the Marine
Hospital here, suffering from the results
of the chilling he received while in an
open boat. His feet were badly swollen,
but under Dr. Trueman's treatment, he
is recovering rapidly.

PILING.—Mr. S. L. Chapman is ship-
ping large quantities of lumber to
Rockport to New York. On Friday
last the schooner Maud Pye sailed with
500 pieces, and the schooner Walter
Miller took 700 pieces previously.

A new departure is being made in the
shipping of piling from points on the
St. John to Sackville. The first shipment
left St. John some days ago.

BASE BALL.—At the regular meeting
of the Charter Oaks on Monday, Capt.
Patterson resigned command of the team
for the rest of the season and Mr. A.
W. Bennett was elected. Arrangements
are being completed for games with
Amherst, Dorchester, and Moncton-
brook. To-morrow the third game of the
series between Crane's Corner and
Lower Main St. will be played on the
Oaks' grounds.

STREET IMPROVEMENTS.—The culvert
over Bowser's Brook, has been replaced
by a new and larger one and the road
bed in the vicinity greatly improved.

Some attention should certainly be
given to the planing in different parts
of the town. Between the Post Office
and Mt. Allison, and in several other
parts the sidewalks are positively unsafe.
The bridge spanning the brook near the
residence of Mr. Thos. Babcock, is in a
very shaky condition and should be re-
paired before some one is injured by its
collapse.

STOCK NOTES.—Mr. Bliss Anderson's
Clydesdale stallion, Lord Clyde arrived

A VALUABLE horse belonging to Mr.

and had to be killed.

a 15 feet well recently, but fortunately
lit on its feet in two feet of water.
Its mother managed to hoist it to the
surface unhurt.

will hold its annual meeting at Picton,
N. S., when addresses will be de-
livered by several noted divines from
different parts of Canada. A good
attendance is asked and expected.

THE Maple Leaf says that W. S.
Starratt, of Waterside, expects to put
another schooner on the stocks as
soon as his new one is off, which will
be in about six weeks. Messrs Her-
bert Newcomb and Samuel A. Copp
have a contract to build two new
schooners; and are now getting out
the frames.

RAILWAY BUSINESS in Amherst is
booming. The ticket sales at the
station were over \$4,000 for the last
month, a great increase over any pre-
ceding period. The short line
business is opening up wonderfully.
Mr. Dashwood, of Amherst, has been
added to the freight department as
clerk.—Record.

J. S. ATKINSON & Co.'s store at
Albert has been broken into on Wednes-
day night last, and watches and jewelry to
the value of about \$100 taken. Sus-
picious characters named John Welch
and Charles White were arrested and
much of the stolen property found on
their persons.

A Vast quantity of coal, nine inches
wide, is reported to have been dis-
covered on the farm of Ralph Steeves,
Lower Hillsboro, and is now being
exploited by mining men with a view
to developing it. It will be a valuable
find, if workable, as albertite is worth
about \$25 per ton.

are being effected on the Church School
Room, and on the Church and Church

The School Room has been practi-

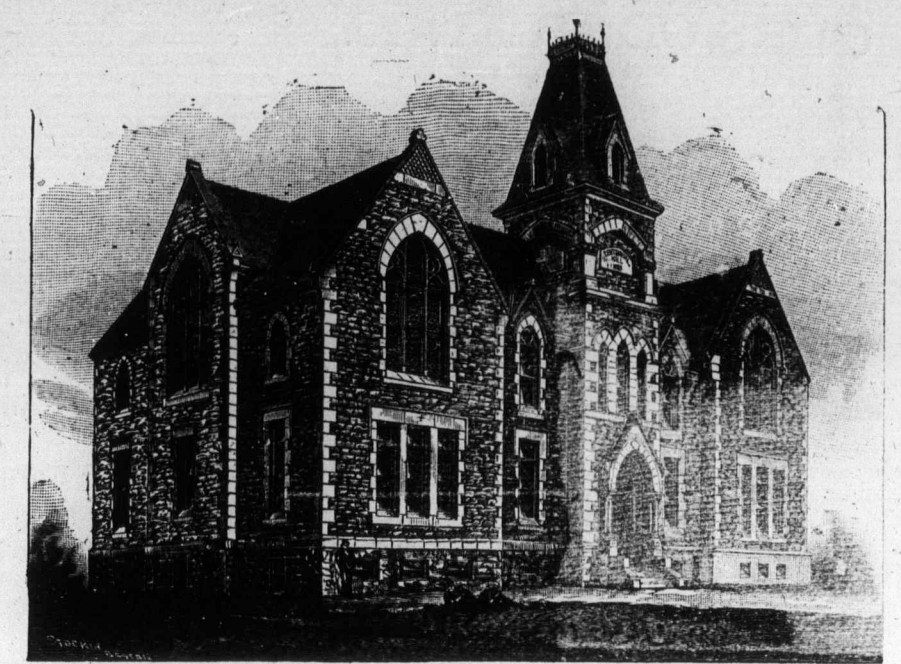
