



Two soldiers, it is feared, are fatally hurt, while twelve are more or less injured. About twenty strikers were hurt, one, it is reported, fatally. SHOE OPERATORS LOCKED OUT.

Quebec, Oct. 25.-There is serious rouble in the boot and shoe industry here, which concerns over 10,000 operatives and some 30 factories. It started last week in Alfred Poirier & Co.'s las tory, on Joseph street. One of the hands refused to work for weekly wages instead of piece-work, and quit work. His place was filled by a non-union man, which resulted in a strike. The manufacturers' association, recently formed, was appealed to, and decided shoe manufacturing interests until a better understanding could be arrived at with the men, and the members of the association say they will remain closed until January if need be. The committee has issued an order to all factories to close down tomorrow evening, and expect that every factory will comply with the order. 

The emperor recognizes the fact that Gen. Tung Fuh Siang has committed serious offences, and he charges Prince Ching and Li Hung Chang to fix the penalties to be imposed upon those for whom the Europeans demand punishment. The decree states that Chinese plenipotentiaries have already inflicted punishment upon some princes. These plenipotentiaries assure the emperor of the death of Kang Yi. Lord Rosslyn Accused of Slandering British Officers.

Disaster at Jacobsdal-Cape Town Highlanders Lose 34 Men.

London, Oct. 26.—Mr. Winston Spencer Churchill, speaking last evening at a banquet given by the Pall Mall Club, Mr. Dooley on the attacked Lord Rosslyn for "slandering British officers" in accounts the earl sent to newspapers from South Africa. He went so far as to give the lie direct to some of Lord Rossiyn's statements. Cape Town, Oct. 26 .- The refugee committee has cabled a statement to Colonial Secretary Chamberlain regarding the continued delay in grant-ing permission to refugees to return to the Transvaal. Upon the receipt reply a mass meeting will be held by the refugees, who are daily becoming more discontented, because of the con tinued refusal of the authorities to permit them to return to their homes. BRITISH LOSE 34 MEN.

Cape Town, Oct. 26.-The Boers have captured Jacobsdal, southwest of Kimberley, after a stubborn resistance on the part of the garrison, which con-sisted of a detachment of Cape Town Highlanders. The latter suffered severely, losing 34 out of 52 men.

Nearsightedness, shortsightedness or myopia, as it is variously called, is a condition of the eyeball-usually lengthening-in consequence of which the rays of light are brought to a focus in front of the retina and so the object is blurred. This condition may exist from birth, but is usually the result of too much and too early use of eyes, as in the case of students, engravers, who do fine sewing and so forth. Thus




