### WESTERN ONTARIO.

Harrow would like to be made a port of entry under Amherstburg.

One hundred and forty appeals are in "Miss Greave, teacher of the Glendale school, has sent in her resignation, to take effect at the close of the present term."

At Grey county Assizes, Dutcher against Thomson, an action for damages for seduction of the plaintiff's daughter, was settled by the payment of \$300.

Mr. Frank Moffat, who is working with the C. P. R. construction gang at Ingersoll, jumped from the train when it was going at full speed and dislocated his shoulder.

Fred Johnson, who was arrested for stealing \$20 from an employee of Ald. Clinton, was up for trial before Magistrate Bartlett at Windsor, and on promising to pay back the \$20 was released.

The Chicago Canadian-American says: "David S. Wegg, who came to this country from the vicinity of St. Thomas, Ont., and who attained quite a prominent position in legal circles in Milwaukee as a railway attorney, has been elected a director of the Northern Pacific. He now lives in Chicago."

The tailoring shop of A. J. Brown, at Comber, was burglarized on Saturday night or Sunday morning, and several suits of clothes stolen. The marauders took chisels and other tools from the M. C. R. freight shed to open the window with. The safe was tampered with, but not opened. The thieves left two worn-out suits behind.

While the Rev. C. T. Cooke was delivering a lecture in the Charles Street Methodist Church on Japanese customs at Ingersoll last week a gold watch and chain was stolen from his vest, left in an ante-room. Chief of Police Northgrove has succeeded in recovering it from a boy named Edwards, who claims to have picked it up outside of the church.

The Rev. Elwin Radcliffe, B.C.L., rector of St. Paul's Church, Mount Forest, has placed his resignation in the hands of the church wardens, Messrs. Wood and Perry, to take effect the latter part of the month of November. Rev. Mr. Radcliffe has accepted the curacy of Manningford, near Marlborough, Wiltshire, England, of which his uncle, the Rev. E. Everett, M.A., is the rector.

The statistics of Stratford jail for the year ending Sept. 30 show that 112 males and 10 females were confined during the year. Of these 34 were Canadians, 24 English, 32 Scotch, 6 Americans and 3 of other nationalities; 64 of the prisoners were reported as being temperate and 58 intemperate. The county paid for the keeping of 102 of the inmates and the Provincial Government for 20. The average cost of daily rations was 64 cents. Officers' salaries amounted to \$1,428 50, and the ordinary jail expenses to \$1,078 50.

A very pleasing event took place at the residence of Mr. J. J. Amos, Lieut., on the evening of Oct. 14, being the marriage of Mr. J. D. Amos to Miss Salome Arcoat, both of McGillivray. Rev. J. S. Loebe officiated. The bride was supported by Miss A. J. Amos, and the groom by Mr. C. A. Gibbs, of Parkhill. The bride and bridesmaid were attired alike in cream cashmere, trimmed with moire ribbon and silk lace. The presents were both costly and numerous. Quite a number of friends were present and spent a very pleasant evening.
