That candies have been an evil influence cannot be denied. Yet if a syrup be made from pure sugar and an extracted tooth be placed in it no destructive progress will be inaugurated. Candies, however, are not composed of sugar alone. If pure sugar were eaten in a limited quantity by one whase month is kent in a hygienje condition.

composed of sugar alone. If pure sugar were eaten in a limited quantity by one whose mouth is kept in a hygienic condition I doubt if any injury would result. But if the debris of other food stuffs have found lodgment on and between the teeth the sugar is just the ingredient needed to advance fermentation, which is one of the steps towards decay. If the candy is a compound, instead of being all sugar, then we must expect fermentation.

A good plan is to eat candy from one shop only. Take a piece and place it in a glass of water. The sugar will dissolve and the presence of other matter will be disclosed. In this way one may determine where to buy candy. I have found, for example, that what are known as "French or Jordan almonds" vary very much. In a few instances the sugar coating will dissolve until the almond is left bare, but in the majority of cases a coating of a substance, which I think is flour paste, is found covering the almond. This would readily produce fermentation and cause decay.

It must be remembered that in mastication the candy is ground into the grooves in the crowns of the teeth, and this is exactly where decay commences. These are the vulnerable points. I have heard persons say, "If I cat candy my teeth ache." Such persons should not eat candy. Their teeth are either decayed or else there are cracks in the onamel which allow the syrup to enter and reach the sensitive dentine, causing an irritation which is injurious.

But surely our correspondent would not have us reverse the order of things, and set up the only alternative system which now prevails in some of the States. There no juryman is allowed to be sworn if he has read of or formed any opinion whatsoever on the crime charged. Thus a premium is placed upon ignorance and incapacity. Would a jury so chosen in the Birchall case have been an improvement on the one that found the prisoner guilty?

Our correspondent arraigns the press for ling" the prisoner. It is true that ome of the newspapers, unwittingly we charitably suppose, overstopped the bounds of propriety in too speedily taking it for granted that Birchall was guilty, but even friends of the condemned man have acnowledged that in the main the papers gave Birchall fair play. Our correspondent cannot have very closely followed the developments in the case or he would have observed that the newspapers, in the in-terests of justice, contributed not a little to unravel the mystery that at first sur-rounded the murder, and which promised at one time to baulk the officers of the law. That the facts accumulated from time to time told severely against the accused was no fault of the newspapers. They did not and would have been as willing to devote their columns to set forth Birchall's defense that the chief credit for improvement of ssume the role of prosecuting attorneys, as they were to publish the facts that told against him. DAIRYING IN DENMARK. The introduction of mechanical cream separators about ten years ago has wrought great change in the dairy industry of Denmark. In 1883 the exports butter to foreign countries was 19,000,000 pounds: in 1885 it rose to 26,000,000, and growing steadily it last year reached the large figure of 60,000,000. Formerly Denmark was an exporter of grain; now it imports large quantities of corn and other food stuffs, which are required for the large dairy herds. What this means, every good farmer knows. The fertility of the land is being kept up and improved, and articles of the highest value are produced for export. The farmer who sells hay and coarse grains is really selling his farm. His aim ought to be to convert all raw materials of the farm into manufactured articles, keeping what is valuable to enrich the land, profiting by processes of manufacture and saving freight on every reduction in bulk. feed his cows a pound of colza cake mixed with other foods, and to the use of this ingredient is attributed the superior quality which his butter maintains in the English market. Good, wholesome fodder is, of course, a necessity, and great care is taken of the cows, which are groomed and curry-combed every day. 

The Stock Increasing, Yet the Gems Are Much Higher in Price. Much Higher in Price.

The world's stock of diamonds has increased enormously in the last fifteen years. In 1876 the output of the African mines was about 1,500,000 karats; last year it was over 4,000,000, and the great trust which controls all the principal mines asserts that it has 16,000,000 karats in sight at the present time. Meantime the demand for diamonds has greatly increased, and they are higher to-day—partly because of the trust, but also because of the increased demand—than they were a year ago.

are nigner to-day—partly because of the irrust, but also because of the increased demand—than they were a year ago.

In one respect the diamond industry is different from almost all others. Its product—that is, of gems—is never consumed. Of gold and silver a much larger amount than most people believe is literally consumed in the arts past recovery, but a diamond once cut goes into the world's great stock and is liable to come upon the market at any time. Hence the world's annual taking of diamonds, which appears to be steadily increasing, even at advancing prices, is an index of how much of its surplus earnings it can afford to expend yearly in this particular form of luxury.

The romance of diamond mining is all gone. It is now a matter of excavating vast beds of blue clay by machinery, washing it, and sifting out the diamonds, which, after being roughly sorted for size, are sold in bulk by weight. The men who do the actual work are mere laborers and their pay is small.
