Proposed By the Deminion Council of the Alliance

Montreal, Sept. 22.—The Dominion Council of the Alliance for the Suppression of the Liquor Traffic met here to-day. Sena tor Vedai in the chair. At the morning session the principal business was the presentation of the report of the executive committee, which made the following recommendations:

Looking back over what has been ac complished, looking forward over the great work yet to be done, and carefully considering what are the wisest and most hopeful lines of action on which all friends of prohibition may unitedly advance, your executive committee respectfully submit the following:

tive committee respectfully submit the following:

1. That the plan adopted and action taken in reference to the Royal Commission be followed out as far as the executive finds itself able to do so.

2. That other friends in every provide be urged to avil themselves speedily of the advantages offered them by the Scott Ast and other forms of local option legislation 3. That other provinces be strongly urged to follow the example of Manitoba in applying at once to their respective legislatures.

to follow the example of mainton an applying at once to their respective legislatures for the taking of a direct vote on the question of total prohibition and for immediate effective prohibitory legislation if such voting shows that the people favor such legislation.

4. That our workers in every province handle to prove the organization of the

WINNIPEG'S GOOD EXAMPLE. Winnipeg, ever a progressive city, has resolved to apply to the Manitoba Legislature for power to adopt the single system of taxation, collected on land values only. This is the result of a conference of the City Council and the various trades organ izations, real estate representatives, Board of Trade and other bodies. The meeting resolved that the amounts necessary to pay the expenses of civic government should be collected from the land, less income tax (income to the extent of \$1,000 being exempt), and income from other sources than taxation; likewise less the coat of fire and police protection, which should be charged against stocks and buildings. This will be a big blow at the holding of acant lots for speculative purposes, which has been the curse of many Canadian cities, and has militated against the best interests of the workers.

He has made an excellent impression on the House."

CHOLERA-BEEEDING BARGES.

BERLIN, Sept. 23.—People living and employed on barges are becoming infected with choicra more and more every day—a fact that causes much anxiety. From Tuesday noon to Wednesday noon, 23 cases of choicra were reported on barges. Thirteen of the patients were certified to be suffering with Asiatic cholera and were taken to the Moabit hospital. In one instance a whole family, consisting of father, mother and two children, were removed from a barge. A 5-year-old child died on the road to the hospital, and the mother died last night. As the canal system ramifies the most thickly populated districts of Berlin, it will be seen that the situation here has become serious. All barge traffic has been stopped and most of the boats are anchored to the river banks and watched by sanitary officials.

In the face of the general panic, when everybody was deserting the cholera-stricken town, she worked with calm, unremitting attention under great difficulties, nursing cholera patients and encouraging others under the awful circumstances of the battle with the epidemic, I do not think it an exaggeration to state that hundreds of Persians owe their lives to the courage and devotion of this heroine."

RAGING IN HAMBROOK.

LONDON, Sept. 23.—The News' Berlin dispatch says: A reporter who interviewed 23 bargemen to-day found that eighteen of them were ignorant of the fact that the Spree is infected and that warnings had been issued. It is found that the oppressive weather is having a bad effect. Many experienced people in Hamburg believe that the water is not the only or even the principal cause of the epidemic. In many parts of the city where the same water is consumed not a single case of cholera has occurred, and in several streets only one house has been infected. It is also noticed that the disease has appeared oftener in new houses than in old. The disease is now raging worst in Hamburok, a newly-built suburb of Hamburg. This suburb is built on middy ground which was recovered by dreedging. The building regulations of Hamburg are very deficient.

Twelve Killed in the Wreck at Shreve.

The Rheems Disaster Due to an Engineer's Blunder.

Fatal Accidents at Newburgh, N. Y. and Columbus, Ohio.

THE WRECK AT SHEEVE.

PITTSBURG, Pa., Sept. 22.—In the wreck near Shreve, Ohio, all trace of the baggage express matter, mail, and even some of the bodies of those killed cannot be found. There is not a remnant or bone to be found of the postal clerks, the express messenger, or the two ladies going from Bucyrus to Espayville. The financial loss by the wreck cannot be estimated. It is reported that in the mail burned there was about \$80,000.

This is only what was in registered packages. The express matter was all burned except 36 silver bricks worth \$75,000. Fifty or 60 pieces of baggage were descroyed. Their value is unknown.

TWELVE ARE DEAD.

WOOSTER, O., Sept. 22.—The remains of the unknown victims of the railroad accident at Shreve were fully identified this morning as Mrs. Sheally, named Miss Annie Campbell, of Bucyrus, O., en route to Espeyville, Pa. The total number of dead is twelve and none are missing.

LANCASTER, Pa., Sept. 22.—The wreck on the Pennsylvania road near Rheems yesterday was caused by Engineer Jacob Michael, of the Philadelphia express, mistaking the westbound freight train for the Pacific express. Fireman Wm. Colwell, of Philadelphia, had every bone in his body broken. Fignieer Samuel II. Tilly jumped down a 20-toot embankment and was severely injured in the legs. Engineer Jacob Michael and his fireman, Harry Neal, of the Philadelphia express, both of whom were in the recent Harrisburg wreck, jumped and escaped serious injury although badly bruised and cut.

Hamburg, Sept. 23.—The official figures for yesterday place the number of new cases of cholera at 149, and deaths at 49. They also give 50 new cases and 20 deaths that have not heretofore been reported. The official figures are far below those given by the newspaper correspondents here.
