Nearly 1,000 of the sufferers from the Liberator crash are more than 69 years old, and many of them are invalids.

of the Austrian economist, Hertzka, as set forth in his book "Freiland," from which the colony will take its name. Each emigrant has subscribed \$250, and the general public has raised many thousands more.

Among the contributors are several persons of exalted station, Julius Wilhelm will lead the first party, which will be followed a few weeks later by a party of 40 more. Several dectors and engineers will accompany the colonists.

Eventually a free tariff would add to the prosperity of the country and the fullness of the treasury, but the people are unreasonable and cannot always reach their hand through time to catch the profits of their self-sacrifice.

Present to Dufferin's Son.

PARIS, Dec. 21.—Sir Edwark Blount, acting in behalf of the British colony, presented a silver salver to-day to Lord sented a silver salver to-day to Lord Terence Blackwood, son of the Marquis of Dufferin, and Lady Blackwood, formerly Miss Davis, of New York. The presentation took place at the British Embassy. In replying to Sir Edward's speech Lord Terence Blackwood referred to his recent marriage, to the warm welcome which his American wife had received in England, and the cordiality shown by the British colony in Paris. The kindness of the British colony was valued most highly, he said, by his wife, who had left for him the friends and associations of her youth. One Home Rule Rill at a Time.

Mr. Gladstone said he doubted if the Government could obtain the same amount of information from England, Scotland and Wales as it could from Ireland, justifying such a scheme. Disastrous Fire in Sheffield. London, Dec. 21.—The building occu-pied by Harvey & Sons, drapers, in Shef-

The confisgration was the worst that has visited Sheffield in many years. The building occupied by Hovery & Sons, and two other buildings were completely destroyed. Three other buildings, one of which was occupied by Mr. Herner, a dealer in paintings and other art works, were gutted. Many buildings in the vicinity were badly damaged.

The assistants of Hovey & Son slept in the buildings. They were not aroused until the fire gained headway. Then a seene of panic followed. Many girls would have plunged from the windows had it not been for their cooler-headed companions, who held them back. A number escaped in their night clothes. They found the passage a mass of flames. Without hesitation they plunged through the fire, and were more or less injured. Some of them had hair and cychrows burned off, and faces and arms badly scorched. Three other buildings were gutted and many buildings in the vicinity damaged. The total loss by the fire is placed at £500,000.

Foreign vessels bringing coal as ballast to New Orleans and other southern ports even now compete with the coals of Pennsylvania and West Virginia. ow compete with the coals of Pennsy ania and West Virginia. HICH LICENSE VS. PROHIBITION

Contrasted by Mr. Fanning to the Former's Disadvantage.

Consumption of Liquor in Nebraska and Kansas a Proof-Rev. Robert Aylward Speaks.

A fine rally in the interests of temperance was held Wednesday in the London West Methodist Church, when Mr. M. J. Fanning, the laber orator, delivered his third address. Rev. Robert Aylward was in the chair and spoke foreibly for prohibition, giving his reasons for supporting it. In the first place, he wanted to rid the country of the terrible curse of strong drink. There was a tremendous responsibility resting upon every man and spoke in the country of the terrible curse of strong drink. drink. There was a tremendous respectively resting upon every man a sibility resting upon every man a woman in connection with this question woman in their terribly damaging effects.

drink. There was a tremendous responsibility resting upon every man and woman in connection with this question. Aside from their terribly damaging effects, alcoholic liquors were entirely uscless. He made this statement after having consulted all the most eminent medical authorities in the world. Sir Andrew Clark, Dr. Guy Wilkes, and Prof. Wilkinson, the great physiologists, were a unit in affirming that alcohol was positively injurious to the human system. As a beverage it was noison. As a medicine its efficacy was debatable. If it were a good thing to sell liquors every one should have a fair show in disposing of these commodities. The very licensing of the traffic, for which men were willing to pay highly, was an admission that the traffic was wrong. Squalor and crime and indigence were the only tangible results of the consumption of strong drink.

Mr. Fanning very effectively contrasted prohibition and high license to the disadvantage of the latter. In Nebraska was to be seen the best high license system in the world. Kanans was the best prohibition State, Both these States adopted these regulations in 1881. They were both agricultural communities, and were side by side. Here was a fair field for comparison. In Nebraska in 1885, four years after the adoption of high license (\$1,000 was the minimum fee) 66, 290 barrels of beer had been consumed. The figures for the year following, given in round numbers, were: 1886, 84,000; 1887, 108,000; 1888, 124,000; 1889, 136,000; 1890, 139,000; 1891, 146,000. There was a slight decline in 1892, but that was the year in which the campaign had been conducted for constitutional prohibition; the saloon-keepers were then on their good behaviour. While there had thus been an enormous increase in the demand for liquor in Nebraska, the very opposite was the case in Kansas, where prohibition prevailed. From a comparison of the figures of the two States it would be seen that Nebraska, with a population of 1,000,000, approximately, consumed 75 times as much liquor as Kansas, with a numerical inhabitancy of 1,500,000.

What is the elect of prohibition upon the material condition of the nation? As examples he would compare the prohibition States of Masne, New Hampshire and Vermont with the high license States of Masnachusetts, Rhode Island and Connecticut. Thus was the New England galaxy of States equally divided. During the past ten years the per capita increase of wealth in the former three had been \$160.94, as compared with \$44.77 in the latter three.



Death of an Old Resident.

An old and esteemed resident of London for nearly 45 years died Wednesday night in the person of Mr. Francis Westlake, aged 75 years. He was attacked by an apoplectic stroke Sunday night, and though he recovered consciousness medical skill could only alleviate his sufferings until death. Mr. Westlake was a native of Crediton, Devonshire, England, and was descended from a well known family there. He took to the sea and became a ship captain, in which capacity he was twice shipwrecked in storms, but managed in each case to save his crews. Having amassed considerable wealth he settled, with his wife, in London in 1849 and embarked in the confectionery business, erecting a factory on Maple street, and acquiring the largest trade in the west at that time. Twenty-five years ago the building was reduced to ashes, but deceased at once rebuilt a larger establishment. He eventually gave up active business and lived retired, though latterly he was in partnership with his son. In his earlier days he was among the foremost in everything calculated to aid the Forest City and in public and charitable movements. He helped in forming the Mechanics' In-Death of an Old Resident.

everything calculated to aid the Forest City and in public and charitable movements. He helped in forming the Mechanics' Institute, and was the founder and the first president of the St. George's Society in London, of which he was made a life-member. He devoted a great deal of time and money to Masonry. He was formerly a prominent figure in the Grand Register of Canada, of which he was deputy grand master of Ontario for a term. He was also one of the promoters of the Masonic Mutual, in which he took out the first insurance policy. Owing to differences he left the craft, and with others instituted the Grand Register of Ontario, so cailed, in which furisdiction he was grand lecturer as well as senior deacon of Eden Lodge, this city. He had a splendid con-

lecturer as well as senior deacon of Eden Lodge, this city. He had a splendid constitution, and was always vigorous and alert, never knowing a day's sickness. He had great energy and a cheerful temperament, which was a source of his popularity. Deceased was twice married. His first wife, Miss Susannah Clove, died 21 years ago. His second, Mrs. Ayers, widow of ex-Warden Ayers, of Middlesex, still survives him. Two children are left—F. G. Westlake, photographer, and Mrs. L. J. Rossie, both of London.


