

STRIKERS TERRORIZE CITY

Policeman Is Killed and Children Injured in Antwerp.

Antwerp, Sept. 3.-The strikers continued to terrorize the city this evening. They killed a policeman, and several children were injured from the indiscriminate shooting. Matters reached such a pitch tonight that the authorities were obliged to send out a drummer to summon the militia. At the same time reinforcements of gendarmes are coming in from the sur-

rounding country.

At nightfall a detachment of forty policemen charged a gathering of turbulent strikers with drawn sabres. They swept everything before them, and the strikers scattered and fled in a panic. In other parts of the city strikers overturned trucks, containing bales of cotton and other goods, which they burned. The docks of the Red Star line are outside the disturbed district and have not been attacked. The situation is declared to be fully

as serious as that which prevailed at the time of the famous strike of 1900.



THE "ALL RED" ROUTE

A London Dispatch Says It Is To Be Put Through.

London, Sept. 4 .- Lord Strathcona states that he is entirely confident of the ultimate success of the "All Red" route. A steamship company has made a definite offer to undertake a fast Atlantie service for a subsidy of £500,000, whereof the Canadian Government is prepared to bear half. The scheme will make Halifax the chief point of entry for the express service between Europe and the North American continent. This will be good for Canada, and a great advantage to Britain. It is not believed the new route will be confined to passenger and express service. Lord Strathcona added he had had a splendid voyage. "The Oceanic is a fine boat," he said, "but we do want something a little faster."

The Chronicle, referring to the "All Red" route, says it can no longer be said that Canada is expecting the mother country to give her benefits without making an equivalent contribution herself. The grant of £250,000 is a very large amount for a state whose revenue is £16,000,000

ACCIDENT AT THE LIGHTHOUSE

Gas Buay Explodes Injuring Keepers Henry and Arthur

Chatham, Sept. 4.-A serious accident happened at 2:30 yesterday afternoon at the lighthouse at the mouth of the river, whereby Henry and Arthur Cartier, lighthouse-keepers, are suffering from severe burns about the face and hands.

About a week ago the gas buoy at the mouth of the river went out, and yesterday some new carbide was sent from the city for the purpose of recharging the buoy. Henry and Arthur Cartier went out in the tug "Vic" to pour in the carbide, and while they were charging the buoy the accident happened. Contrary to their expectations and knowledge, the inside of the buoy was damp, Seven or eight cans of the carbide were poured in when several hundred pounds of the fluid exploded-ignited by the dampness inside the buoy.

Both men were standing on the buoy when the explosion occurred, and both were thrown a considerable distance. Arthur was pitched into the water through the force of the explosion, and Henry was thrown clear off the buoy and landed on the deck of the tug. Henry's arms and face were badly burned, while Arthur sustained severe burns on his face.

Dr. McColl, of Tilbury, was called and the wounds of the two men were dressed, and although they are suffering a great deal of pain, their injuries are not considered as serious as they might have been.


