M. S. A. EVADERS AT NEW GERMANY MILITARY POSSE FIRED ON MILITARY POLICE TO BE TAKEN REGARDLESS OF COST

Provost Marshal Heads Party Which Leaves Guelph For the Purpose of Arresting Men Who Shot at Officers Near the Berbinch Home.

Guelph, March 10.—Consequent upon the New Germany shooting on Sunday morning, when military police tried to arrest two evaders of the M. S. A., a party left here this morning to take into custody Mr. and Mrs. Berbiuch. The military police say that two sons, who fired on the police while resisting arrest, will be taken no matter what the cost. The provost marshal arrived in the city this morning.

Major J. Hirsch, head of the military police of this district, with a small force of men has left the city, and is believed to have gone to Little Germany, the German colony just outside of Guelph, where yesterday morning a pitched battle occurred between military police and two alleged M. S. A. evaders, in the course of which one of the policemen was seriously wounded in the head by a rifle bullet fired by one of

Amsterdam, March 19.—The Berlin Workmen's Council has decided to issue an order officially calling off the general strike in the German capital, says a Berlin message, presumably filed on Sunday night, which says decision was taken "late today." 
