Commander of Anti-Soviet Forces Lands Additional Troops in Kuban Ports in Order To Encourage Uprisings Against Reds-Cavalry Cuts Off the Bolshevik Forces Along Dnieper.

Constantinople, Aug. 21.-Gen. Wrangel, the anti-Bolshevik commander in Southern Russia, has landed three additional invading forces in Kuban ports with the purpose of encouraging Kuban uprisings against the Bolsheviki. The landing parties are reported to aggregate over 10,000. Gen. Wrangel took 5,000 prisoners on the lower Dnieper, in the Alechi region, where he permitted the Bolsheviki to cross the river and then cut them off by a speedy cavalry charge.

Fears Are Entertained That Empire Will Be Forced Into a Costly Military Campaign—British Officers Are Murdered and Railways Cut—Natives Claim That They Are Not Allowed Voice in Administration of Country's Affairs -70,000 British and Indian Soldiers Now On Ground.

London, Aug. 21.—Fears are expressed here that recent events in Mesopotamia will involve Great Britain in a costly military campaign. Official reports show that the country is in a state of anarchistic rebellion against the British administration, particularly northeast and west of Bagdad and between Bagdad and Mohul. British garrisons have been invested, railways cut and British officers murdered. According to official accounts, the situation is much graver than has been revealed in the official dispatches. Only last night the India office issued a statement confirming the disaster to a British force at Shas Raba, Mesopotamia, last Sunday. It adds that the wife of Mr. Buchanan, an irrigation officer, who was killed, was captured by the Arabs, but is reported to be safe and being well treated. Her child is believed to be with her. Already there are 70,000 British and Indian troops in Mesopotamia and 10,000 or more with artillery are on their way thither from India, but apparently many more such reinforcements will be required to restore order.

The revolt is presumed to be against the methods of the British administration. Under the mandate in Mesopotamia, Great Britain undertakes to establish local autonomy, and the Arabs complain that they are allowed no share in the administration.

APPLE AND PEAR BLIGHT. [Experimental Farms Note.] Blight of apple and pear is a specific Blight of apple and pear is a specino and contagious disease. Some varieties of pears are more susceptible to this disease than are others. There are three places on the tree where blight commonly occurs, the blossoms, twigs and larger limbs or trunk. The names blossom-blight, twig-blight and body-blight or canker are commonly used, but it should be remembered that these are different manifestations of the same but it should be remembered that these are different manifestations of the same disease. The bacteria which cause blight grow as parasites in the inner bark tissue and kill it. The individual bacteria are too small to be seen by the unaided eye. Nevertheless they are present by millions. They live over the winter at the edge of the cankers on the limbs and trunk. When warm weather comes in the spring they multiply to the extent that they ooze out in small drops near the edge of the canker. It is at this point that the new season's destruction begins.

Bees and other insects are attracted by the ooze and after their bodies have become smeared with it they carry the bacteria from place to place. In this way, bees deposit bacteria in the blossoms that they visit and a few days later the blossoms wilt and turn black. In a similar manner other insects in their roaming, inoculate a few bacteria into the bark here and there, and twig blight results. All this could be avoided by the grower of apples and pears if the cankers from which the ooze comes were eradicated during the winter. The cankers are irregular and slightly sunken areas of bark usually separated from healthy bark by a definite crack. By cutting into the canker it will be found that the bark is dry and brown. To remove the canker make a spindle-shaped cut with a sharp-pointed knife, always keeping the outline of the cut at least a half inch outside the edge of the canker. The ends of the cut are brought to a sharp point to facilitate healing. After this outline cut has been made just deep enough to cut through to the wood, the bark is peeled off. Adhering shreds of bark should be removed and the wood scraped. It is advisable to wash the wound with corrosive sublimate solution (one tablet to a pint of water), which should be carried in a glass bottle and applied with a sponge. Although canker eradication is very important there are other sources of infection in the spring which need attention. Badly infected trees should be cut down and burned. Wild crab apple trees and hawthorns are often blighted and they should be reneed attention. Badly infected trees should be cut down and burned. Wild crab apple trees and hawthorns are often blighted and they should be removed from the vicinity of the orchard. Care should be taken also that any twigs which were blighted the past season are removed. They are evident during the winter by the fact that the dead leaves cling to them. All suckers or water sprouts should be removed several times during the season. The operations outlined above must be carried out thoroughly if benefit is to be gained from them. They all serve to reduce the chances of infection the next spring if they are finished before any warm weather occurs. During the spring and early summer the grower should make careful inspections two or three times a week walking down each row. All blighted blossoms should be removed by breaking off the spur. Blighted twigs should be broken or cut off several Inches below the evident blackening. If cut with a tool the end of the twig should be swabbed with corrosive sublimate. All these control measures demand care and time, but they result in reducing the blight to a minimum.

Central Veterans' Council Issues Statement of Warning To War Pensioners,

The Central Veterans' Council at a pecial meeting last evening arrived at a conclusion that it would not be advisable for all pensioners receiving a disability pension to accept it in one amount, as proposed by the Government. The council has had several special meetings to discuss this matter, and at each one gave the matter a thorough probing. The following is a report submitted to the council by Col. J. P. French and F. B. Lavender, president and secretary, respectively: To all Pensioners of the Great War in

the City of London:
The Central Veterans' Council London, composed of delegates from the Army and Navy Association, the Great War Veterans' Association, and the Grand Army of United Veterans, having thoroughly investigated and dissed the proposals made by the special parliamentary committee appointed by the Dominion Government on pen-sions and gratuities, has unanimously decided to advise all veterans who come under the scheme not to accept the lump sum payment in lieu of their yearensions for the following reasons: ly pensions for the following reasons:

(1) A man drawing a 5 per cent disability pension of \$45 per annum would receive a lump sum of \$300 from the Government, whereas if the man was only 30 years of age, and by the "law of average" he would live for another 30 years he would receive altogether \$1,350; consequently, he would lose \$1,050 by accepting the lump sum payment.

(2) A man of 30 years of age, drawa 10 per cent disability pension d receive \$90 per year pension, or desires to commute he would get would receive \$30 per year pension, or if he desires to commute he would get \$500, whereas if he lived for another 30 years he would receive altogether \$2,700, thereby losing a total of \$2,100 by accepting a lump sum payment.

(3) According to life insurance risks, a man aged 30, drawing a 10 per cent pension of \$30 per annum, would receive approximately \$1,440.

The above amounts are figured out at money being worth 4½ per cent per annum which is a very conservative estimate.

Therefore, it is quite obvious to all concerned that they would lose very considerably by accepting the lump sum payment.

## **CO-OPERATIVE HOME CLUB FOR MOTHERS PROVES A SUCCESS**

New York Experiment Accomplishes Wonders Along New Lines.

NEW YORK, Aug. 20 .- West Ninety-Second street, in the block between the Park and the "L," was amazed to see itself one night recently "all dolled up" for a block party exactly as if the year of our Lord was still 1917-1918 when that kind of festivity was common in New York. The block was roped off and at either end sat pretty ticket sellers who easily persuaded the curious passersby to come in by payment of a small fee and enjoy themselves. There was a band that played for dancing at the end nearest the park, there were flags galore and so many lights under Oriental shades that the use of the conventional term innumerable is for once almost permissible. see itself one night recently "all dolled

The building at No. 60 in this block was the centre from which all the gay features of this party emanated, and it was for what this building holds that these features were inaugurated. This is just what it purports to be—a Mothers' Co-operative Club, and while we have rules, as every well conducted home must have them, ours are not widely different from home rules. "The impression has gone abroad that we are a Jewish society; that is due to the personnel, but the directors and officers are broad minded, unprejudiced and unsectarian women of the world, whose aim is to accomplish a good thing in a fine way without being hampered by parochial ideas and to fill a real want that everybody acquainted with the situation must admit exists. "Our children show by their facial characteristics that they come from various races, and every child received with its mother is taught morality in a universal way, the kind of ideals of honor and truth, fidelity and patriotism that are found, or should be found, in every religious sect.

"These are big words to use with regard to little children and in fact our little ones are permitted to grow up naturally without too much stress being laid on matured systems of ethics. We look after their growing bodies and minds, but we do nothing calcuiated to force either one.

"Everything is done here on a liberal scale; the table is of the best but simple foods, the rooms are more than comfortable, they are prettily furnished, and we try to look out for the mothers' comfort as well as that of their

children. To do it satisfactorily eats up a great deal of money, but we don't expect to ask aid to make up a deficit at the end of the year. at the end of the year.

"A great many women besides those named in the prospectus are interested in our success, feeling that the aim is high and the need great. These wohigh and the need great. These wo-men help us out with personal effort; they can be called on to do almost anything for the club, and they would reply with donations if that were ne-cessary. We don't want it ever to be-come so. Among these workers for us

are as many Gentile as there are Jewish women.

"In the block party which we held all of our neighbors without regard to creed turned in and helped to make it a success. The women baked cakes, cookies, bread and pies in great profusion, and then came and helped to sell them. Others brought donations of fancy work children's layettes, flowers. fancy work, children's layettes, flowers, etc., while still others dressed up in costumes and told fortunes or did anything they could turn their hand to and helped increase the fund we required to pay our bills for the roof carden garden

"That was an expensive outlay, but was undertaken without too many misgivings. You see it was appointed misgivings. You see it was appointed so that we can heat it and use it in the winter time. It will be a great solace to the children and none of the expense of it will be felt by our cooperative boarders. Whatever we can do to make the club attractive and beneficial to our little people we mean to do, but we are not increasing the board bill to pay for added attractions.

OTTAWA, Aug 20 .- Export liquor

without a license or permit from the oard of license commissioners. Magistrate Askwith has decided this o be the lawful interpretation of the Ontario temperance act, and he handed down judgment in police court this morning in the case of Edgar Lemaire, manager of the Great West Wine Company of this city, who was charged with keeping liquor for sale contrary to the provisions of the liquor law.

Lemaire was fined \$300 and costs, with an alternative of three months in jail. Magistrate Askwith's judgment is an extremely important one, in view of the fact that expert cunsel for the defence claimed that the board of liceuse commissioners were powerless to say who should and who should not

defence claimed that the board of liceuse commissioners were powerless to say who should and who should not be granted export licenses. The case was much disputed in police court one week ago on the ground that a recent judgment handed down by Mr. Justice Masten held that any person could operate an export liquor business, in spite of the license department, providing that a warehouse was equipped with the facilities required by law.

The Great West Wine Company loses 140 cases of liquor, valued at \$3.500, which was seized by the local police.

The counsel for the defence afterwards stated that there would be an appeal from the decision.



"In Hungary," it said, "a piece of the Middle Ages has suddenly established itself in the midst of a Europe which is given over to revolutions. While everywhere else the class to which the authors of the war belonged has been deprived of the possibility of deciding the fate of the people, the new Magyar test penitently turns back to its officient. state penitently turns back to its offi

cers and nobles.

"That Hungary is going to have a king seems certain. Horthy does not conceal that he stands for the re-election of the old Hungarian kingdom within its historic frontiers. This program, if it is carried out, will lead to a conflict with all of Hungary's neighbors." For aid Hungary is looking to Pan-

Germans, it was charged, and they were greatly pleased when the first news of the revolt of Wolfgang Kapp, which rocked Germany, and, for a moment, threatened to place the militarists again in power in Berlin, came to them. 

A feature of the evening session was the address of H. J. Symington, coun-sel for the province of Manitoba, who characterized the application of the rallways as "arrogant and inconsis-

The railways, without submitting to proper procedure, he said, had simply decided that they wanted an ilncrease and that they must get it before September 1.
"I submit." said Mr. Symington,
"that this board cannot possibly do
justice to this important case and give any sort of judgment between now and September 1."

D'Arcy Scott, a former member of the railway board, who preceded Mr. Symington, speaking for the Government of Saskatchewan and the Canadian Dairymen's Association, was strongly opposed to any increase in rates being given to the C. P. R. The position of the company was by no means serious, he argued, and no harm would be done if it were called upon to pay present dividends out of accumulated surpluses for a time. If the board decided that there should be an increase it should be based on the

should be applied, he thought, west of Fort William.

G. R. Gearey, corporation counsel for Toronto, like Mr. Scott, thought it would not hurt the C. P. R. to wait a while. His proposal was that no rate increases should be granted until the C. P. R. has actually experienced a deficit and met it. Then it would be time for the company, in view of its great resources in reserve, to come back to the board seeking relief.

PARIS, Aug. 20.—The success of the Poles in throwing back the Bolsheviki in the battle of Warsaw was "a Polish victory," the French General Weygand told delegations at Warsaw, who had come to tell him that he was the most popular man in Poland, and was proclaimed by all as the Savior of Warsaw.'

Advices received here from the Polish capital quote General Weygand in his response to the delegations as

"Preparatory military operations were executed by the Polish generals according to the Polish plan. My role, as well as that of other French officers, was limited to filling certain gaps in the details of execution. It is the Polish nation that has been its own savior.

"This magnificent victory consolidates the Polish state, whose existence is indispensable to France's existence. Germany, who had hoped to resume relations with the Soviets and to throw Red armies against the enemy across the Rhine, must renounce for the moment such means of annuling the Versailles treaty. If the Polish leaders know how to profit by victory, I am convinced that the Bolshevik army will soon cease to exist."
