Ferryboats and tugs are swept out of their courses by the drift ice, and every ounce of power in them is required to reach their slips. The boats which land at the battery have to run battering rams to part

the ice in their slips. Mails from the west and east are from 6 to 10 hours late. Snow is not to blame for this so much as the inability of the locomotives to keep steam up under the great outside cold pressure.
