

New York, April 5.—The elaborate plans of Howard C. Griffith to raid the American League with the aid of the minor organizations will fail. The players in the American League realize that there is neither sufficient moral nor financial strength behind the movement to warrant the abrogation of their contracts with their respective clubs. their respective clubs.

respect the reserve rule, they are likely to cause more or less trouble unless they can be induced to subscribe to the national agreement. They will not, how-ever, engage men under contract to other eagues after the season opens. Several players who are expected to play on major league teams have signed, it is claimed, with Tri-State organizations. Manager Hamilton, or Harrisburg, one of the strongest teams in this league, claims that several of the players who have not yet signed contracts for the season, intend to accept offers made to them by the different teams in his or-

SMOOTH SAILING FOR QUOIT CLUB


Club Decides to Have Grounds Difficulties Overcome and Good Season Assured Talk of Tournament.


