We do not know any period in the history of Methodism where those belonging to her communion declared more emphatically than they now do, that slavery includes "a combination of all crimes."

While leaving the masses with scriptural sentiments upon this subject, as the Methodist Episcopal Church in the North—the largest and most influential denomination there—has done for many years past, her evoked hostility to slavery has recently been revived by two very different facts. The first of these was the action of the General Conference last May.
