**A NOVA SCOTIA ARTIST**

Many have gazed upon the portrait of Queen Victoria adorning the walls of the Legislative Council Chamber, and some have praised and some have criticized, while none have withheld admiration. The painter of the picture is a Nova Scotian, Mr. Barrett, whose grandfather was an officer in the British army and one of the directors of the making of the Citadel Hill in its present form. The artist was born in Gaspereau, Kings Co., where he lived till the age of twelve, evincing the artistic gift at a very early date. When eleven years old, the paternal present of a box of colors vastly stimulated his talents and ambitions, and his first picture in oil drawn at that time is still reserved as a memento. The young Artist's thirteenth year found him in Halifax, whither the family had removed. When twenty-four he went to Boston, like most ambitious young men of that period, to seek fame and fortune, where he has beloved pursuit. A part of the summer he usually spends in Halifax, where he meets old friends and accepts orders for the work of his gifted brush. Among his more ambitious productions are life-sized portraits of Cardinal O'Connell, Archbishop Anderson, Nathaniel Willis, Queen Victoria and others. His special gifts are color and portraiture, of Nova Scotians should know more about this gifted son of our province that they might the more appreciate him. A quiet, amiable man with a dreamy blue eye, living for his art, is the best description of our foremost living master of the brush and palette.

**Hopes For One-Cent Letters**

Postmaster General Burleson of the United States told the National Association of Postmasters that if revenues from second class mail were increased "extravagance for useless political service" in the rural mail system were curtailed, and payment to railroads for mail transportation under the new space basis were reduced he could recommend to Congress next year that letter postage be reduced to one cent.

**Remember the Boys When Preserving Fruit**

Time for preserving and canning fruit has come round once more, and the Red Cross reminds each housewife while preparing a store for her own family to think of the boys in the Red Cross Hospitals overseas. They long for homemade preserves and write such grateful letters about what they received last season.

The fruit should be put up in quart gem jars, with screw tops, using rubber rings. Full particulars will be found in the latest Red Cross Bulletin for June, to be had at the Red Cross Office. It also contains directions for packing the jars for shipment.

Many of our readers throughout the Province are especially interested in our boys at Aldershot. Where there are so many men gathered together, a certain proportion are bound to fall ill, and a field hospital is now in full operation there. The Kentville Red Cross Society have been able to render much valuable service to the men in the field hospital, and the society sends a visiting committee each week with reading matter, games, delicacies, etc., for the men. This all costs money. The Kentville Red Cross is itself most generous in the matter, and the Provincial Red Cross has contributed -150 from the Provincial funds, but many societies through the Province would like to send contributions in their favor.

**Prohibition in Halifax**

Reports from the business men, clergymen of all denominations, railroad officials, street car conductors, in short, from all classes of citizens for the past three weeks, from the 1st of July up to the 21st of July, testify to the beneficial result of the closing of the licensed bar room.

Former anti-prohibitionists frankly state that they did not believe conditions in this city could have been so changed for the better.

The vigilance of the police is to be commended.

The licensees deserve credit for the respect shown for the Temperance Act. The police records show that from the 1st day of July to the 21st of July last year, under license, there were 116 arrests for drunkenness and 42 arrests for disturbance, resisting arrest and interfering with the police, and for the same period this year under prohibition, there were 9 arrests for drunkenness and 3 for disturbance. That is for 1915, there were 158 and for 1916 there were 12 arrests. The past three weeks demonstrate the value of well enforced prohibition.

British—Fighting has continued in the village of Pozieres. In others of the front there has been considerable artillery activity.

French—On the right bank of the Meuse, our infantry occupied a redoubt west of the Thiaumontwork, taking 5 machine guns and 40 prisoners.

Russia—Forces operating in Turkish Armenia are steadily advancing upon the fortified town of Erzings.

Italian—Italian attacks in the Astico region to gain possession of Monte Cimont are making good progress.

German—The only advantage gained by the British on Sunday was the penetration of a few houses in the village of Pozieres, for which the attackers paid heavy and sanguine losses.



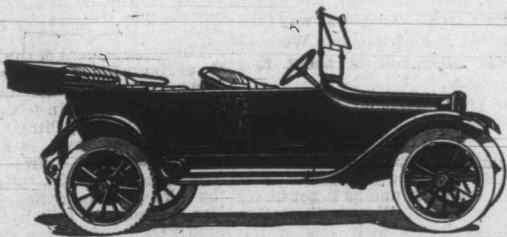

#### Russians Captured 1000 Prisoners

Petrograd, July 25, via London, July 26—The official communication from General Headquarters issued this evening, reads:

"On the front near the River Stonevke an affluent of the Styr the passage of our troops continues without interruption under fire of the enemy. During today's offensive we took 1,000 prisoners, and also four cannon and five machine guns, which we turned against the enemy."

In the Caucasus our offensive towards Erzincan continues. The Turks, closely followed by our troops, are fleeing, abandoning along the road cannons, rifles and munitions."

#### Russians Advancing

Petrograd, via London, July 25—Some Russian detachments already reached positions about ten miles from the Turkish fortified town of Erzincan in Armenia, says the Russian official statement given out here today.

Jack Price of Moncton was in command of the party. The arrival at noon created quite a sensation around the local depot. The prisoners were immediately marched to the Detention camp.—Amherst News, July 14.

#### The British Capture Mine-Laying Submarine

London, July 20—The first official announcement that Great Britain had captured a German mine laying submarine of the U-35 class, was made in the House of Commons today by Thomas James MacNamara, financial secretary of the Admiralty, who said that one of these vessels would be brought to London to be viewed by the public.

One week from today, August 4th, the people of the British Empire will commemorate what may be regarded as unquestionably the greatest, most potent event in the history of the world—the declaration of war by Great Britain, on the Powerful German nation. On Friday, August 4th, 1916, there are many outstanding features of this world-war that we must remember and recall.

Those of us who saw the demonstrations of patriotism and fervor on the night of August 4th, 1916, will never forget what we saw. We saw the outflow of a pent-up enthusiasm held in check during those dark days and weeks prior to the entrance of Great Britain into the struggle, dark days and weeks with the spectre of war like a grim giant shadow pulled over the land and creeping into the innermost circle of every home.

The outbreak of hostilities in wars gone by has always constituted the great calamity. Not so in this case. The world has seen calamitous events during the two years just closing, but no calamity in our declaration of war on this bully of Europe.

When cables flashed the news it came as a relief, the snapping a tension, becoming unbearable.

We declared war, and against what odds! The German Emperor told us we had "a contemptible little army." We had a little army but it was not contemptible. Even the Mad Man of Europe will not deny that today. We had a little army but we had more. We had the will and the means to build up a big army, and we straightway set about doing it. But threading the great fabric of the national sentiment, we sought and found something before which armies and emperors count as naught. We sought and found a welding and fusing force that bound the British Empire into one mighty whole. We found a realization of those faithful lines:

"I shall know that your good is mine, You shall know that my strength endures;  
In the Day of Armageddon, in the last great fight of all,  
That our house shall stand together and the pillars shall not fall."

The world has passed through two years of the greatest martial struggle it has known.

These have been trying years and months and days for the British people and our Allies. Kitchener said this war would last three years. Kitchener is gone—but, we are only beginning to learn that this master military genius read the future progress of this war as he would have read on open book. Kitchener asked Greater Britain for men in millions and Greater Britain gave them freely.

The declaration of war by Great Britain gave the world into the great melting pot. We of the British Empire contributed the best we had to contribute. Victory is not near but it is in sight. We have made, are making the blood sacrifice. That sacrifice will not be made in vain.

**J. WHITCOMB RILEY HAS PASSED AWAY**

Indianapolis, Ind., July 22—Whitcomb Riley, the Hoosier poet and friend of children, died about 11 o'clock tonight as a direct result of a heat attack suffered earlier in the day. The poet appeared to have recovered late in the evening, and his physicians gave out the statement at the time that there was nothing alarming in his condition.

Later, however, the patient weakened and failed rapidly until the end came.

**Greatest Russian Victory of the Year**

**Turks Receive a Terrible Blow by Fall of Erzingham**

London, July 26—Erzingham, the powerfully fortified Turkish town of Central Armenia, has fallen before the Russian onslaughts.

The most important base of the Ottoman troops in Asia Minor and the headquarters of the Tenth Turkish Army Corps, the stronghold was captured by the Grand Duke Nicholas with astonishing ease and swiftness. Yesterday the Russians were re-

ported at least ten miles from the fortress and it was presumed here that the Turks would make a strong stand in order to give time for the removal of the garrison and all military supplies.

As it was, the Russians pushed ahead at the ordinary pace of an army on the march and encountered little opposition, either in front of the town or from within.

**Third Line of German Trenches Smashed by British**

**British Hold Key to Powerful Fortifications**

London, July 26—The capture of the last of Pozieres reported by General Haig early today, though it involves the clearing of only a few acres of ground, has rejoined all Britain, and greatly encouraged the belief that the Allied offensive will win through. For, more than the ground actually won, the success means the first breaking of the German third line since the fiasco of La Basse nearly eighteen months ago. Success against the German veterans at a time when it was evident they had put forth all their strength, and at a place they had resolved to hold at any cost, and finally the capture of heights which are the key both to the powerfully fortified Albert ridge, including the bloody ground of Longueval, Guillemont, Combles and the Four-

aux Wood, and to the plains sloping toward Bapaume beyond.

The army experts expect tonight that the British offensive will take a new spurt as soon as the captured ground can be consolidated. The statement that two trenches to the west have already been cleared is believed to show that General Haig is already pushing on along the Bapaume Road, and that he will soon be on the flank, and perhaps in the rear, of the ridge of forts he has been unable to seize by direct assaults. On his right, too, he is now in a much better position, since from the new positions guns can enfilade the powerful fortifications of Thiepval, and of the almost impregnable Leipsig redoubt. All these positions are expected to in British hands soon.

**Serious Accident on Dominion Atlantic Ry.**

**Baggage-master Melville Woodman Seriously Injured**

The Dominion Atlantic Railway which has been singularly free from accidents was the scene of a serious one Wednesday afternoon at about four o'clock.

The eastbound Yarmouth-Middleton accommodation train in charge of Conductor George Williams and Driver Charles Churchill had just taken water at the tank, and as it got under way for the Weymouth station a car, loaded with lumber, left the rails going over an embankment many feet below and partially derailed the locomotive which fortunately did not leave the bridge.

The passengers, all of whom were in the rear coach were uninjured. Conductor Williams and Driver Churchill also escaped being hurt. Fireman Pitman of Yarmouth jumped from the locomotive and is seriously injured. Brakeman Stanley Burrill of Brazil Lake was also quite badly hurt, but will recover.

Baggage-master Melvin Woodman of Cambridge, Kings Co., was rushed by special train to

Halifax Hospital, accompanied by Dr. McDonald of Meteghan. His chances for recovery are slight.

The management of the D. A. R. at Kentville has done everything possible for the injured men. A special train from Yarmouth conveyed Pitman and Burrill to that town. Another special arrived from Yarmouth at midnight, bringing the wife of the dying man, Mrs. Woodman is a native of Smith Cove, and was visiting friends in Yarmouth when she received the sad news.

In the meantime two special trains were rushed from Kentville, one in charge of Conductor Dan McIvor with an auxiliary crew in order to pave the road clear in time for the regular trains next day. The other special in charge of Conductor Win Conrad was brought to Weymouth to convey Woodman to the Halifax Hospital.

Mr. and Mrs. Melville Woodman were residents of Kentville prior to their departure for Yarmouth. Their many friends will deeply regret to hear of this sad accident.

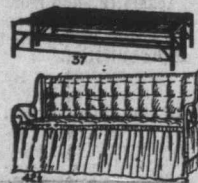

#### Fierce Hand-to-Hand Fighting on British Front

London, July 25—There were fierce hand-to-hand combats and bomb fighting at various points along the front in Northern France during the day, says an official statement given out by the War Office tonight. An attack by German infantry on the village of Pozieres from the northeast was driven back by British artillery fire.

The statement follows: "Throughout the day there has been fierce hand-to-hand combats and bomb fighting at various places along the battlefront. The Germans attempted an infantry attack on Pozieres from the northeast this afternoon, but were driven back by our artillery fire.  
 "Between the Ancre and the sea no important incident occurred."

Paris, July 23—The fighting in the fortified village of Pozieres between the British and the Germans is described as follows by an officer who was wounded in the struggle:  
 "Early Sunday morning, at the moment the signal for the attack was given after a frightfully intense bombardment, the English infantry rushed to the entrance of the village, carried it brilliantly and occupied the first houses. At 11.30 o'clock the Germans counter-attacked. Their onset was extraordinary, doubtless because their courage had been stimulated, by ether, as one could tell from the odor."

### Fatal Accident on D. A. R. Track

A very sad accident occurred Wednesday morning resulting in the death of Mrs. McCall, wife of Private Frank McCall, now on active service in France. The deceased was formerly Miss May Stillman. She is survived by her father, her husband and 3 small children.

The funeral service was held yesterday afternoon & was conducted by Rev. T. C. Mellor. Deceased was 23 years of age.

### Dr. Wilfrid E. Harris Died on Tuesday

Dr. Wilfrid E. Harris died at Boston on Tuesday afternoon as the result of being shot by Dr. Atwood, a few days previous at his office. Dr. Harris began to sink rapidly on Monday afternoon, and all through the night the end was momentarily expected. For the few days the injured doctor's wife and niece have been almost constantly at his bedside. Dr. Atwood has shown no emotion whatever since the evening of the day the crime was committed. No arrangements have been announced for the funeral.

Dr. Harris was a native of Kings County and President of the Massachusetts college of Osteopathy. He was son of the late T. R. Harris, M.P.P. and brother of Mr. Fred E. Harris of Aylesford. He was 45 years of age and had made a great success of his profession, ranking as one of the pioneer osteopaths in the United States. He was at one time President of the Canadian Club in Boston and was highly esteemed in that city as well as in his native province.
