IVANHOE.

CHAPTER VII.
(Continued.)

The condition of the English nation was at this time sufficiently miserable. King Richard was absent a prisoner, and in the power of the perfidious and cruel Duke of Austria. Even the very place of his captivity was uncertain, and his fate but very imperfectly known to the generality of his subjects, who were, in the meantime, a prey to every species of sullen oppression.

Prince John, in league with Philip of France, Cœur-de-Lion's mortal enemy was using every species of influence with the Duke of Austria, to prolong the captivity of his brother Richard, to whom he stood indebted for so many favors. In the meantime, he was strengthening his own faction in the kingdom, of which he proposed to dispute the succession, in case of the king's death, with the legitimate heir, Arthur Duke of Brittany, son of Geoffrey Plantagenet, the elder brother of John. This usurpation, it is well known, he afterwards effected. His own character being light, profligate, and perfidious, John easily attached to his person and faction, not only all who had reason to dread the resentment of Richard for criminal proceedings during his absence, but also the numerous class of "lawless resolute," whom the crusades had turned back on their country, accomplished in the vices of the East, impoverished in substance, and hardened in character, and who placed their hopes of harvest in civil commotion.

To these causes of public distress and apprehension, must be added, the multitude of outlaws, who, driven to despair by the oppression of the feudal nobility, and the severe exercise of the forest laws, banded together in large gangs, and, keeping possession of the forests and the wastes, set at defiance the justice and magistracy of the country. The nobles themselves, each fortified within his own castle, and playing the petty sovereign over his own dominions, were the leaders of bands scarce less lawless and oppressive than those of the avowed depredators. To maintain these retainers, and to support the extravagance and magnificence which their pride induced them to affect, the nobility borrowed sums of money from the Jews at the most usurious interest, which gnawed into their estates like consuming fire, and, by so doing, induced their creditors some act of unprincipled violence.

Under the various burdens imposed by this unhappy state of affairs, the people of England suffered deeply for the present, and yet had more dreadful cause to fear the future. To augment their misery, a contagious disorder of a dangerous nature spread through the land, and rendered more virulent by the uncleanness, the indifferency, food, and the wretched lodging of the lower classes, swept off many whose fate the survivors were tempted to envy, as exempting them from the evils which were to come.

Yet amid these accumulated distresses, the poor as well as the rich, the vulgar as well as the noble, in the event of a tournament, which was the grand spectacle of that age, felt as much interested as the half-starved citizen of Madrid, who has not a real left to buy provisions for their family, feels in the issue of a bull-fight. Neither duty nor infirmity could keep youth or age from such exhibitions. The Passage of Arms, as it was called, which was to take place at Ashby, in the county of Leicestershire, as champions of the first renown were to take the field in the presence of Prince John himself, who was expected to grace the lists, had attracted universal attention, and an immense confluence of persons of all ranks hastened upon the appointed morning to the place of combat.

The scene was singularly romantic. On the verge of a wood, which approached to within a mile of the town of Ashby, was an extensive meadow of the finest and most beautiful green turf, surrounded on one side by the forest, and fringed on the other by straggling oak trees, some of which had grown to an immense size. The ground, as if fashioned on purpose for the martial display which was intended, sloped gradually down on all sides to a level bottom, which was enclosed for the lists with strong palisades, forming a space of a quarter of a mile in length, and about half as broad. The form of the enclosure was an oblong square, save that the corners were considerably rounded off, in order to afford more convenience for the spectators. The openings for the entry of the combatants were at the northern and southern extremities of the lists, accessible by strong wooden gates, each wide enough to admit two horsemen riding abreast. At each of these portals were stationed two heralds, attended by six trumpets, as many pursuivants, and a strong body of men-at-arms for maintaining order, and ascertaining the quality of the knights who propose to engage in this martial game.

On a platform beyond the southern entrance, formed by a natural elevation of the ground, were pitched five magnificent pavilions, adorned with pennons of russet and black, the chosen colors of the five knights challengers. The cords of the tents were of the same color.

RAPID SETTLEMENT OF OUR CROWN LANDS UNDER THE FREE GRANTS ACT.

We think, after all, we will be able to glory soon in having given our support last winter to the local government.

Upon our honor, though, there were times when our heart sorely misgave us for saying so much, on risk, for the new found party.

The farmer concludes whether his harvest has been good or bad after he has gathered in his crops and summed up the total: We judge of a government by its harvest, which is the sum total of what its legislation has been the means of producing.

If, as has been said, and very correctly said, the future prosperity of the province depends upon the settlement of our vacant Crown Lands, then a vigorous settlement, by a sturdy class of settlers, is the most important result legislation can have.

It will be seen that the total number of applicants for Crown Lands during the past year is 761; but the total number for the year 1878 was only 191.

But we will do the Surveyor General the justice of complimenting him on his general management of the department. The settlement of the Provincial lands during the year has been at the head of the department quintuples that of the previous year; while the prospects are that in six or seven years more, little of our valuable lands will remain unsettled.

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OUR NEXT LOCAL SESSION.

THERE is no reason why the next session of our Local Legislature, or indeed any session of it should be dragged out to nine or ten weeks. Last winter of course this could not be helped, as there were so many new fledged politicians in the House who wanted to test their wings.

So it took several weeks for the legislators to find out where they stood, and who their friends were. Then too it was the time of the year when gossip mongers infested the barrooms and the street corners; and many was the scurrilous story told of what the Government was going to do.

And then too another task lay for Mr. Blair, which took up much of the Country's time, and that was to make a political Protestant of Hon. William Elder. Right well the cunning opposition leader knew that in poor Mr. Elder's armor there was one weak spot.

But this year let us hope it will be different. There will be no want of confidence vote, unless indeed Mr. Blair may think it his duty to move one because the Government permitted the storms to come and sweep away so much of the public works to the north.
