## SCHOOLS DEBATE.

### Dr. Alward's Amendment Voted

#### Down.

#### Regulations Supported by Both Sides of the House.

(Continued from last issue.)

Hon. Mr. Tweedie said: He for one was willing to stand or fall by his conduct in this matter. Twenty years ago he had been elected on the school question; he had endeavored to allay the religious animosities that then existed, and by no act of his since then had he endeavored to interfere with the principle of free non-sectarian schools. No one who had the welfare of the province at heart ought to desire to see the terrible condition of those early years revived. The question should be fully discussed by the committee of the whole house where all that was said and done would go before the people, who could make or break a government at any time. On motion of Hon. Mr. White the question was laid before a committee of the whole house.

On Wednesday on the order of the day being reached, Hon. Mr. White, seconded by Mr. Robinson, moved the following resolution:

To strike out all after the word "resolved" and insert the following: "That the petition number 29 of Henry Chestnut, William Lemont, J. A. Vanwart, and 113 other ratepayers of the county of York, praying that such orders and regulations be carried to a committee of the whole house for the purpose of the free school law; that all regulations contrary thereto may be rescinded and that the administration of the law may place all on a footing of equality, together with returns laid before the house in answer to a resolution of Mr. Sievwright, No. 28, moved on Saturday, 29th inst., calling for all copies of orders in council, regulations of the board of education, instructions of the chief superintendent with reference to the Bathurst school question; and that it be an instruction to the committee to consider the allegations and prayers of the said petition, and all papers, evidence and matters included in, and referred to, in the said return, and that such committee have power to report their opinions and recommendations in the premises."

Mr. Stockton said that this was one of the most important questions that had ever come before the house. He felt that a crisis had been reached in the administration of the school law in a certain part of this province. He was not prepared to say that the Sisters of Charity were not qualified to teach in the public schools, but he thought the system should be as uniform as possible, and if Sisters of Charity did not have to come to Fredericton to pass their examinations in the same privilege should be extended to all. He was not finding fault with these examinations and never had done so, but suppose when an examination was being held at Bathurst, two or three young ladies had wished to be examined in the same way as the sisters were being examined, would the right have been granted?

Hon. Mr. Blair—Certainly it would.

Mr. Stockton said he had done all he possibly could during the past two years to remove the difficulty existing at Bathurst and bring about harmony. The legislature could not give its time and attention to a wretched object. He asked why the public school building at Bathurst was not occupied.

Mr. Sievwright said that it was fully occupied at the present time, with the exception of one room, which was too small.

Mr. Stockton said the attorney-general was attempting to laugh the question down. He might stifle the question here, but it would not be stifled in the country.

Mr. Sievwright—Who is at fault? Mr. Stockton—The fault is with the trustees.

Mr. Sievwright—You are right.

Hon. Mr. Blair followed to Dr. Stockton, and Mr. Alward replied and moved the amendment proposed by Mr. Sievwright. Moved as an amendment to the following, viz: "And that the committee be authorized and empowered to examine witnesses under oath, to call for persons and papers and to report the evidence to this house."

The debate was continued after recess by Messrs. Emmons, Howe, Flewelling, Lablouis, Powell, Mitchell, Kilian, Gogaine, Pitts, Sievwright, O'Brien (Charlotte), Shaw, Hill and Mott.

Mr. Alward's amendment was then put and lost on the following division:—  
Yeas—Messrs. Stockton, Powell, Shaw, Smith (St. John), Alward, Howe, Pinder, Allen, Perry, 9.  
Nays—Messrs. Blair, Mitchell, Emmons, Tweedie, Lablouis, Connell, Gogaine, Lewis, Pitts, Russell, Theriault, Blanchard, Kilian, Flewelling, Scovill, O'Brien (Northumberland), Dibblee, Robinson, Dunn, McLeod, Wells, Ferris, O'Brien (Charlotte), Hill, 22.

Hon. Mr. White's amendment was then carried on a reverse vote, except that Mr. Powell voted for the amendment and Mr. Pitts against it.

Hon. Mr. Blair moved that the house do, on Thursday, resolve itself into a committee of the whole to consider the resolution—Carried.

The debate on the school question was resumed by Dr. Alward, who reiterated a statement made by Pitts on Monday to the effect: "Before a gathering of people I heard it stated that one of the Roman Catholic priests visited a school taught by a Protestant teacher and requested her to teach the Roman Catholic catechism in school." Mr. Sievwright—I offer the hon. gentleman two telegrams from Miss Alexander, denying that statement.

BATHURST, March 28.  
John Sievwright, M. P. P.—  
The trustees of my district never coerced me into teaching the Roman Catholic catechism, or indeed any other catechism. I have taught the catechism in the school for a month, but I have only done so by my own free will and not by constraint from trustees or anybody else.

## PROLOGUE.

### Domestic Parliament, Closes its Session.

On Saturday last, the Dominion parliament prorogued. The governor, general Lord Stanley, addressed the members, as follows:

Honorable Gentlemen of the Senate:—  
Gentlemen of the House of Commons:—  
In relieving you from attendance in parliament this year, I congratulate you upon the energy and promptitude with which you have disposed of the duties of the session just ended and upon the useful legislation which has resulted therefrom.

The assembly at Paris of the Belting arbitration tribunal gives reason to think that the differences which have existed between the government of the United States and the government of the Dominion have been satisfactorily adjusted, while the nomination of the prime minister of Canada as one of the arbitrators offers its guarantee that the interests of our sealer will be properly and thoroughly safeguarded.

The treaty of commerce which was negotiated with France on behalf of Canada has been laid before you, together with the correspondence which passed during the negotiations, but owing to the late period of the session at which the treaty was received and the pendency of communications as to its bearing in respect of the most favorable introduction of the treaty and the interpretation of certain clauses, my government has thought it advisable to postpone for the present its ratification by parliament.

I thank you for the ample provision you have made to protect the country from the possible introduction of cholera, and I trust that the precautions taken will result in guarding against any danger from that source.

The liberal provisions made for the representation of Canada at the Paris convention to make a worthy exhibit of her resources and progress among the nations of the world.

The various acts which you have placed on the statute book will contribute to the maintenance of public security and the continued progress of the country.

Gentlemen of the House of Commons:—  
I thank you for the liberal provision you have made for the requirement of the public service.

Honorable Gentlemen of the Senate:—  
Gentlemen of the House of Commons:—  
I feel with deep regret that the period of my official connection with the Dominion is drawing near to a close and in all probability I am taking leave of you for the last time. Let this should be the case I desire to express myself in the present occasion to express my abiding interest in all that concerns the welfare of Canada and my sincere affection to her people who have never failed to testify their loyalty to the person and the throne of our sovereign and show kindness and consideration to her representatives. It will be my earnest desire to be of service to the Dominion, and I shall continue to cherish feelings of the warmest solicitude for the welfare and prosperity of those amongst whom I have been placed during the past five years that the blessing of Almighty God may at all times attend you.

The session has been famous rather for what has not been done, than for any useful legislation enacted. It was believed that there would be considerable changes made in the tariff but Foster has asked for another year of high taxes, two hundred per cent. Sir John Thompson has been present about half the time; since his departure it has been nothing but quarrels between Mr. Foster and his cabinet. The tariff has been raised by Mr. Foster, to ratify the French treaty, has put Sir Charles Tupper in a dilemma, and either he or Foster will have to take a back seat.

Proposition two—That regulations be made to provide for the granting of persons holding certificates from the superior of any religious order, or where such persons hold no such certificate, that provision be made for the examination of such persons, at their place of residence or school rooms.

Reply—Any persons who have undergone training at a recognized training or normal school of another country, or who holds a diploma from a chartered college or university, is eligible for examination for license under regulation 30 of the regulations of the board of education. The certificate of the superior of any of the Roman Catholic teaching orders is recognized as rendering the holder eligible for such examination, and it would not be necessary for such persons to attend the New Brunswick training school. When such certificates are not held attendance upon the training school is required.

On the strength of this order the Roman Catholics of the province who had remained out of the public school system, and maintained their own separate schools, immediately withdrew all further opposition and came in under the law, and so continued down to the present time. Whatever opinion any member might entertain as to the expediency of having entered into that arrangement, no one could now dispute but that it was a matter of fair compact or contract between the government and the Roman Catholic representatives, when, by that arrangement, all trouble and agitation ceased; and when we recognize from that moment down to the present, no complaint has been made to the knowledge of the board of education, with regard to the adoption or continued operation of that arrangement, was it not now too late in any point of view to ask that this question should be reopened, and that the struggle of those days should be revived? When the present government came in power they felt that they would be justified in putting on record a regulation which would not in terms discriminate in favor of any denomination, and they passed an order similar in terms to that which was found in the manual of '92, and the same in identical language. That regulation (31) read as follows: "Licensing of teachers—Persons eligible for examination: That he has obtained professional classification at the provincial normal school or has received a certification of qualification from some other recognized normal or training school for teachers after attendance thereof of not less than one school year."

Mr. Stockton—That is not the same as regulation 30 published in the manual of '89.

Hon. Mr. Blair—The regulation 30, published in 1887, under the same heading, specified that he has undergone training at a recognized normal school of another country for the period of one year or an annual session.

Hon. Mr. Blair claimed that the two regulations were practically the same. The change in phraseology was made without the slightest desire of extending special favor to any denomination, but because it looked unreasonable to retain the words "in another country" in the regulation, the intention being that any normal or training school matter whether at home or abroad might be recognized by the board of education. It struck him as rather absurd in view of the tremendous agitation which had been got up in various parts of the province, that this question should now settle down to a mere dispute about the phraseology of these regulations. It would take more than the ingenuity of the hon. member for St. John to establish that the phraseology of these regulations pointed in any shape to the adoption or recognition of sectarian schools. The resolution he would propose to the house, seconded by Hon. Mr. White, on this branch of the subject, was as follows:

Resolved, That at the time of the passing of the common schools act of 1871 and for several years thereafter, the Roman Catholic people in many sections of the province continued to maintain separate schools at their own expense while paying school rates in support of the public schools; that the state of feeling in the public mind in consequence of this division of opinion became so grave and serious that it was deemed advisable by the government of that day that steps should be taken to quiet the agitation and induce the Catholic people to accept the law; that at the conference on the 6th of August, A. D. 1875, between certain representative Roman Catholics and the then executive government—and which government had been sustained at the previous general election known as the school law election of 1874 and was composed exclusively of Protestant members—an arrangement was recommended to the board of education that the certificate of the superior of any of the Roman Catholic teaching orders of the qualification of an applicant and that he or she had attended one year at any recognized normal school should be taken to be sufficient to render the holder thereof eligible for examination for license under the regulations of the board of education, without requiring the attendance of the applicant at the provincial normal school; that immediately upon the said arrangement being entered into the same was made known through the press without any public protest or objection, and was thereupon accepted by the Roman Catholic people who closed their separate schools and came in under the school law and have so continued till the present time; that, while the members of the house regard the arrangements entered into as afore-said as being in the nature of a public compact which it would now be both unjust and inexpedient to open up or rescind, we heartily approve the early action of the present government in so enlarging the scope of the present arrangement as to admit a region (see regulation 31 school manual for 1892) whereby the holder of similar certificate from a training or normal school whether or not connected with any religious denomination of Christians, is equally entitled to apply for examination for license without attending the provincial training school at Fredericton; and further

Resolved, That in the opinion of this committee neither the said original arrangement nor the said regulation 31 contravenes the non-sectarian principle of the free common school law of 1871.

Mr. Stockton said that the regulations of 1892 certainly put all on a footing of equality, so that in this respect there could be no just cause of complaint hereafter. He congratulated the board of education upon the change that had been made.

Mr. Mitchell—Do you really think it is an improvement?

Mr. Stockton—Yes, I think it is an improvement. Referring to the resolution he would suggest that the last clause be dropped from it. As far as his present position was concerned he should vote in favor of the maintenance of the compact of 1875.

Hon. Mr. Blair—You state that you are opposed to the concluding section; how

did the arrangement of 1875 contravene the non-sectarian principle of the law? Mr. Stockton—That was a compact entered into in good faith for the sake of peace and harmony though a good many people think that to a certain extent it did not contravene the non-sectarian principle.

Hon. Mr. Blair—What is your view upon that? Mr. Stockton—My view is that there may be circumstances in which it may not contravene that principle, and therefore I wish the concluding clause omitted. Mr. Stockton was perfectly willing to say that he did not think regulation 31 contravened that principle in any way. He supposed that some of his supporters would be dissatisfied with his actions, but he wanted this matter settled. In his own constituency peace and harmony had existed between the two great classes for many years and he would be sorry to see any action taken that would create discord and dissension.

The debate was continued by Messrs. Mitchell, White, Pitts and Siewright, and after recess by Messrs. Pitts, Phinney, Blair and Stockton.

Mr. Stockton moved in amendment— "That in the opinion of the committee it is desirable that the subject matter of the petition be referred to a committee or commission of five independent men with power to examine witnesses under oath and call for persons and papers and report to this house at the next session."

Chairman Killam moved the amendment out of order.

Mr. Stockton appealed to the speaker who confirmed Mr. Killam's decision.

The following amendment was moved by Mr. Powell, seconded by Mr. Phinney: "That in the opinion of the committee the arrangement made between the then existing government and certain others, representative Roman Catholics on the 6th day of August, 1875, was a compromise adopted with the object of securing and preserving public peace and harmony, and it is not deemed desirable in the public interest to depart from the arrangement then entered into."

After further debate Mr. Powell's amendment was lost by the following vote:—

Hon. Mr. Blair moved the following resolution: "Resolved, That regulation number 20 of the board of education passed and in force in the year 1872 was in the words following: Regulation 20, emblems in the school room—Symbols or emblems distinctive of any national or other society, political party or religious organization, shall not be exhibited or employed in the school room, either in its general arrangements or exercises, or on the person of any teacher or pupil; and"

Whereas, On the 12th of December, 1879, the board of education passed the following order: "Ordered that nothing in regulation 20 shall be taken to prevent the wearing of the cross or any other emblem ordinarily worn by the members at large of any denomination of Christians," which amending order was first published in the school manual of the year 1879, and so continued until the year 1875, when it was published in substantially the same form as it is at present, excepting as to the wearing of emblems of any temperance organization; therefore

Whereas, The regulation on that subject now in force is as follows: "Regulation 21, symbols or emblems in the school room—Symbols or emblems distinctive of any national or other society, political party or religious organization, shall not be exhibited or employed in the school room in its general arrangements or exercises," and that nothing herein shall be taken to refer to any peculiarity of the teacher's garb or to the wearing of the cross or other emblems worn by the members of any denomination of Christians or temperance organizations; therefore

Resolved, That in the opinion of the members of this house the said regulation 21 does not contravene the non-sectarian principle of the school law and it is not expedient to alter or amend the same, and the said regulation is hereby approved.

Mr. Blair moved the following: Resolved, That while the leasing or occupancy by a board of school trustees of any building suitable for school purposes is not contrary to the non-sectarian principle of the school law or any regulation of the board of education merely by reason of such building being the property of any religious denomination or Orange, Masonic, temperance or any other society or association, it is expedient that the power of a board of school trustees to lease or occupy such building should be subject to limitations, and the members of this house approve the action of the board of education in providing, as has been provided by regulation number 10, school manual 1892, that "such rooms or buildings, as the case may be, shall be under the supervision and control of the trustees for school purposes during school hours and at such other times as the necessities of the school may require," and that any school house or school house owned by the district shall be first occupied by its or their full seating capacity before additional accommodation shall be leased, unless the chief superintendent of the board of education in consideration of any special circumstances in any case shall otherwise order.

Thursday. After a lengthy discussion on the subject of liens, the house then went into committee on further consideration of public schools.

Hon. Mr. Blair said that as he had already read, if the committee thought further inquiry was necessary as to the difficulty at Bathurst the government were prepared to accede to that feeling. He believed that all evidence needed had already been given, but to meet the view so generally expressed for a further investigation of the Bathurst troubles he would move a resolution to that effect, which he thought would give the most complete answer to the prayer of the petitioners.

Resolved, That the petitioners in the reference to the public schools having practiced, that the legislative assembly may be pleased to give instructions to the board of education as follows:—

1. To rescind orders or resolutions which may have been made and modified in the interest of religious orders.

2. Not to use for school purposes any convent buildings or religious houses so long as the said buildings or houses are occupied in whole or in part by the members of any religious orders.

3. To take the necessary and immediate steps towards securing justice to the Protestant minority at Bathurst and Bathurst village.

To see that the free school law in this province shall hereafter be honestly and impartially administered in the interests of all our citizens and irrespective of either church or creed, and this committee, having considered of the allegations and prayer in the said petition and that in the opinion of the committee the petition as charges that certain regulations of the board of education contravene the non-sectarian principle of the school law come to certain resolutions which have been concurred in by the whole house as to so much of the said petition as alleges that certain regulations of the school law and regulations in the town of Bathurst and Bathurst village, whereby injustice has been done to the Protestant minority, the committee answers, that while it is of opinion that the petitioners should have formulated their charges to the legislative assembly, stating in what respect the public schools at Bathurst town and village are improperly or illegally conducted or differ from the public schools in St. John's district, and generally to enquire into all matters of complaint which the said petitioners complain, it will approve and does hereby
