States Brewers' Association. Notwithstanding the increase, which the report contends indicates that the country is prosperous, the spread of prohibition has affected the trade considerably, it is declared.

"No doubt a good deal of bottled beer is going into the dry territory," the report reads, "but it is not enough to offset the loss of the draft beer saloon trade. The beer business is mainly a city business, and in good times a steady increase may be count-

ed upon." The whiskey bill of the United States for the year, according to the report, is \$146,973,000, an increase of nearly \$8,000,000, or 5.66 per cent over the proceeding 12 months.





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
