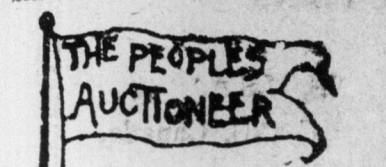

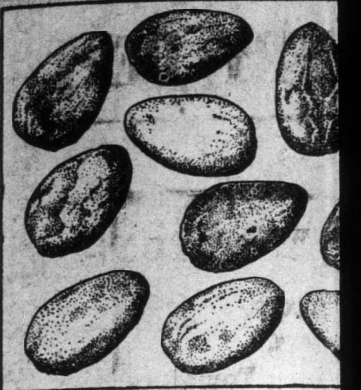

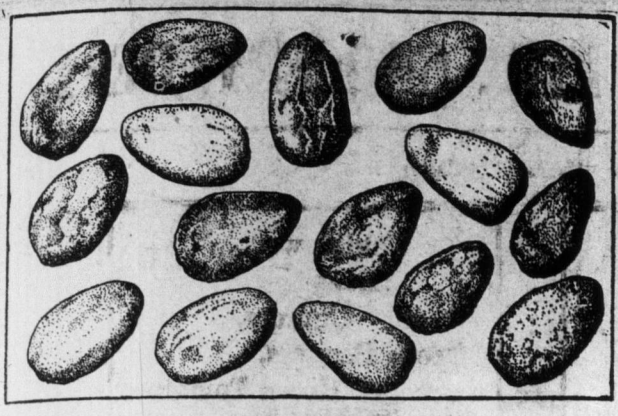

Do you exist for your house or does your house exist for you?
The other day I went to call on a woman who had just moved into a beautiful new house. She has been planning and working for the change many years and it is indeed a handsome building.
But I do not have any trouble to keep from breaking the tenth commandment in my thoughts of her.
Indeed no. On the contrary I am sorry for her.
For she is so obsessed by her worship of that house that she exists to serve it instead of subserving it to her pleasure and comfort, and making a real home of it.
Let me give you a few illustrations. The bathroom in her new house—I refuse to call it a home—is exquisite. It is all white and blue and the fixtures are copper. Now to keep these fixtures bright, their own-ers, takes her exactly one hour and a half three times a week. That's four hours and a half a week. And yet my friend said regretfully, "Some lovely people called on me when we first came but I simply haven't had time to return their call."

Again, there is a brand new gas range in the kitchen. It has every convenience of attachment that modern ingenuity can devise and it was absolutely spotless. My friend is a notable housekeeper but the immaculateness of this was wonderful even for her and I said so. "Well, you see," she explained, "I hardly use it at all because I hate to get it mused up. I have my old range down cellar and I do most of my cooking there." And yet my hostess told me she didn't know when she had been so tired as this fall. She thought it was the bad weather.
It was a very warm day when I called, and yet not a window in any of the chambers was open. "We haven't had the windows open any more than we could possibly help this summer," she explained. "You know that lets in the dust and this white woodwork soils so easily."
It is a good thing to have beautiful possessions but it is not a good thing to be possessed by them.

The World's Most Famous Detective.

The world's most famous detective is about to retire in the person of Superintendent Frank Frost who for six years has been at the head of the Criminal Investigation Department at Scotland Yard.
Physically, he is unlike the general idea of a detective as could be, being chubby of face and innocent in expression. His twinkling blue eyes help to give him the appearance of a benevolent uncle. He is not only the most famous, but also the most popular policeman in the world. Even hardened criminals refer to him as "Frankie."

He is tremendously powerful in physique, and is one of the few men who can tear a pack of cards in two. He can bend a sixpence between his fingers, and to his amazing strength, he has often owed his life. On one occasion he dragged out of an anarchist den two men who he badly wanted, gripping the coat-collars of the two in his left hand and keeping off two other men with his right fist.
He has had so many narrow escapes from death as any hero in a penny dreadful. On one occasion an armed criminal, whom Frost had been tracking down, told him that when he had seen him, some days before, the great detective behind him in the street, he had stopped in a doorway determined to blow the detective's brains out, and then his own. But the detective chanced to turn up a side street.

As an example as Superintendent Frost's shrewdness, the story is told of how he went to clear up the mystery of the death of a man who was found head downwards in a water-butt.
Murder was suspected but Frost declared at once there had been no murder, and that the man had merely overbalanced.
"Impossible!" a colleague exclaimed, and got up beside the butt and leant over. In a flash his boots were pointing towards the sky. If he had been alone the butt would have had its second victim.

Dogs And Doors.

Few of the contemporaries of James McNeill Whistler cared to match their wit against his, for the artist's sharp tongue was almost as famous as his paintings. Yet there is one such encounter recorded in J. J. Conway's "Footprints of Famous Americans in Paris," in which the honors must be awarded to Whistler's adversary.
Whistler was at the height of his artistic fame, when a French poodler of which he was very fond, became ill. The artist immediately called in Sir Morell Mackenzie, the famous throat specialist. The renowned physician was not much pleased at being invited to diagnose the illness of a dog. However, he held his peace, prescribed, pocketed his fee, and drove away. The next day he sent an urgent message to Whistler, asking him to call quickly.
On his arrival, Sir Morell gravely ushered him in, and said, without a smile, "How do you do, Mr. Whistler? I wanted to see about having my front door painted?"

The Graball Philosophy.

The Hon. P. T. McGrath is as shifty in argument as he is changeable in political allegiance. He abandons the ground of his argument with as much facility as he changes his political coat. He attempts to measure a man's value by the political patronage he receives, and then disowns the child of his own imagination and tries to father it off on us. We pointed out that if a man was to be estimated by this measure some strange results would come out. The Hon. P. T. McGrath would be as great as his grabs. But his greatness would be measured by his own bushel, not by ours. His greatness would be thrust upon him by his own graball philosophy and not by our philosophy, or even by merit. According to the McGrath bushel, the Hon. D. Morrison would tower like a colossus over such a pigmy as Sir Edward Morris. His merit as Minister of Justice and member of the Executive must transcend all the occupants of these offices who have preceded him or sit with him. No other man has obtained such a grab as the Hon. Donald received in so short a time. He outclasses them all when measured by the McGrath bushel, but not when measured by merit. As an exponent of McGrath's graball philosophy he is unique. Even Mr. McGrath does not approach him. Brother Thomas of the Custom House did try to get in the Morrison class, but we have not heard of his success. Mr. John Gibbs has proved his greatness under the McGrath philosophy, but not under ours, by grabbing millions of acres of the public domain and a job in the Post Office. The People's Party is thronged with great men when measured by the McGrath bushel, and who are remarkably small when examined on their merits. Indeed no party has ever had such a collection of men who are great by grabs as the People's Party has. It is a new philosophy to estimate the wisdom, statecraft and ability of a man by his grabs. But Mr. McGrath has done so. He has introduced the principle and he must abide by it. According to his philosophy, not according to ours, John Bright will come out as a nonentity, while a Gibbs is a star of the first magnitude in statesmanship because of the family grabs.

Shale Areas Surveyed.

Mr. J. A. McLellan of St. George's who has been in town finalizing matters in connection with the survey of R. J. Oxley's shale areas on the Upper Humber River, returns home by this evening's train. The survey was rushed ahead so that Mr. J. Marshall Hall, A. R. S. M., who has been examining these areas might know the exact boundaries. Mr. Hall expressed himself as greatly pleased with the way in which the survey had been done. Of all the areas taken up in the Deer Lake Region for shale, Mr. Oxley has been the only one to have a survey made and the boundaries located, and this has been an expensive and heavy job as the country is for the most part, heavily wooded.

Quite a Snowfall.

As the express which arrived to-day, was crossing the Gaff Topsails last night there was quite a blizzard on and about four inches of snow covered the ground.

Dislocated His Shoulder.

While the "gunman" of Boat House Lane was at play the other night his son became so frightened that he took refuge in a hay loft from which he fell and dislocated his shoulder. He was taken to the hospital for treatment yesterday.

Infectious Disease Reported.

The number of infectious diseases reported during the week to the Health Authorities are: three of scarlet fever, two of diphtheria, one of the latter resulting in death. There are now in the Fever Hospital seventeen cases of scarlet, four of diphtheria and one of smallpox under treatment at home one case of typhoid and six of diphtheria.

Church Union.

This morning we asked Canon Bolt, Secretary-Treasurer of the Diocesan Synod, if he had seen the report that the Bishops of Montreal, Fredericton and Nova Scotia contemplated visiting Newfoundland to invite the members of the Church of England here to enter into a union with the Church of England in Canada. In reply he said the Bishop was away, but he knew nothing of the movement reported. Twenty years ago the matter had been discussed in the Synod, but since then nothing had been done. He was inclined to discount the report owing to the political gloss which had been given to the report. We cannot conceive it possible that any such invitation could be advanced as a step towards political union. Other churches in Newfoundland are joined to their sister churches in Canada, but no one seriously advances this as a step towards Confederation. Nor do we consider it likely that any three Canadian Bishops of the Church of England in Canada would convert themselves into Confederation missionaries. It would be derogatory to their office. This gloss is in all probability the vain imagining of some ill-informed reporter. We believe that Newfoundland does not want Confederation, and is not prepared to welcome Confederation missionaries, although Newfoundland would warmly welcome the visit of Canadian ecclesiastical dignitaries, and no doubt the Church of England would give a courteous hearing to an invitation for Church Union and leave the Diocesan Synod to decide it on its merits.

Wants Church Union in Newfoundland.

The bishops of Montreal, Nova Scotia and Fredericton will journey at an early date to Newfoundland, to invite the church of England there to enter into union with the church of England in Canada. This was decided on at the opening session of the provincial synod of Canada, held in Montreal. The immediate cause of the invitation was the necessity of joint work on the Labrador, and a contributory cause was the forthcoming battle between Canada and Newfoundland over the possession of certain portions of Labrador. No attempt was made to disguise the hope that the invitation would be the first step towards not only ecclesiastical union, but political union. — Sydney Post.

There are now in the Fever Hospital seventeen cases of scarlet, four of diphtheria and one of smallpox under treatment at home one case of typhoid and six of diphtheria.

Alive After Hanging.

To Solve a Mystery as Related by An Old Sexton.
Walkerton, Ont., Oct. 19.—This little town is about to see the solving of an old mystery which concerns the burial of John Hag, the only murderer hanged in Bruce. The tale is as sensational as the escape from the Paris Tombs of Joan Valjean. In February, 1868, it seems, a man named Stephen Neubecker, while returning from Seaford with the proceeds from a load of grain he had sold, was robbed and murdered near Formosa by a man who jumped into his sleigh and battered his head with a club. John Hag was convicted of the crime and hanged on December 15th. After being placed in a coffin and given to Geson, caretaker of the cemetery, for burial.
Several years afterwards the sexton told that the rope had never done its work, and that the body had come into his hands alive. He stoutly maintained that an empty casket was lowered into the grave, and that the supposed corpse walked out of the cemetery. The murderer is alleged to have been seen afterwards sending a bar in a Detroit saloon. The proposed sale of the old burial ground to Mr. A. E. Sherrington, whose farm it adjoins, and the consequent order that has gone forth for the removal of the bodies interred there will afford an opportunity to discover what credence can be placed in the old sexton's story.

Special Evening Telegram.

LONDON, To-day.
A three days battle and a Bulgarian turning movement have resulted, according to Sofia accounts, the fall of Kirk Killish and the capture of the Turkish garrison numbering fifty thousand men. That so many Turks have been taken is regarded as impossible and the more likely report is that the Turks retreated in the direction of Bunardissar. The capture of this stronghold, to which the Turks attacked almost the same importance as to Adrianople is confirmed from Constantinople in an official communication, explaining the Turkish army at Kirk Killish is attempting to withdraw in greater strength than had been anticipated. The Turks retreated to south to await reinforcements. The news of the retreat will soon follow. It is generally assumed Abdulah Pasha is still engaged in bringing his main army to Adrianople, the position of that town is critical. An interesting situation will develop should Turks be compelled evacuate Adrianople. It is supposed the next stand of the Turks will be made at Demotica 25 miles south Adrianople, an important strategic position on road Constantinople.

Special to Evening Telegram.

CONSTANTINOPLE, To-day.
A Turkish defeat at east Tundja in Kirk Killish district is now admitted here. An attempt is made however to minimize its importance by representing it as an unsuccessful Turkish movement which owed its failure to a detachment having encountered the main body of the Bulgarian army.

Special Evening Telegram.

BELGRADE, To-day.
Official announcement made here Serbian forces occupied Novipazar, Pristina, Kumanova, Kratovo and Ketschana. Detachments of the Serbian army entered Kumanova this afternoon after annihilating the Turkish batteries. The fighting around the town lasted three days.

The flames, however, had such headway that their efforts were in vain—in an hour the building was but a mass of ruins. Not an article of furniture was saved and a large amount of cash left in the house was also destroyed. Neither house, nor furniture were insured and the loss to the owner is a very serious one. As far as could be ascertained there was no fire left in the kitchen when the Burke people left their home.

German Kaiser's War Chest.

It will be a surprise to many to learn that the German Kaiser has actually a war chest containing some \$60,000,000 in real money. But the news need not cause undue alarm. The huge fund which is kept in the Julius Tower at Spandau, represents the money reserved from the French indemnity payment. Having been withdrawn from circulation, as it were, the community loses interest on the huge sum of something like two million dollars a year.

Julius Tower forms the centre of the centre of the Citadel of Spandau, the most important fortification of Berlin. At the same time from the historical point of view it does not seem a particularly safe place to keep the treasure for repeatedly Spandau has fallen into the hands of an enemy. During the Seven Years War it was captured by the Russians; and from October, 1806, until April 1813, the French held the fortress.

Julius Tower itself is constructed of solid blocks of basalt, and it is said that its foundations go down to a depth ten feet lower than the bed of the River Spree. The Kaiser's war fund is reported by those who know to be kept in iron chests inscribed with the names and addresses of commanders of army corps and admirals of fleets. These packages would be immediately dispatched to the officers named in the event of war. Special sums have been set aside for commanders on the frontier in the vicinity of the outbreak of hostilities, and there are also set aside special sums to be used for special purposes, such as the secret service. For the most part this treasure consists of ten and twenty mark pieces; but there are supposed to be quantities of coins of all the great powers, principally France, Great Britain and Russia.

At stated times during the year all this treasure is opened, weighed and counted by army officers specially detailed by the Emperor from all parts of Germany. It is a feature of the count that prior thereto these officers must give their word of honour that they do not know one another. Furthermore, although the war funds are in charge of a special officer at the Tower, he is not always advised of the proceedings beforehand. In such event it is only when the Kaiser's special deputies have finished their task that this officer is called to check up the accounts.

The defence of the Tower is entrusted to the Fourth Grenadier Regiment and a battery of the Third Grenadiers. There is also stationed within the citadel the Third Train Battalion, which is ever ready to conduct the war treasure to the various destinations assigned it.

At irregular hours of the night the interior of the Tower is carefully searched for thieves. During this search the sentinels hold their arms ready to shoot any suspected person. At the very bottom of the Tower, on the water level, there is a guard-room, the inmates of which are detailed to prevent the possibility of robbers gaining entrance to the secret crypts by means of tunnels. Then there is a second guard-room behind the only entrance door. The purpose of this is to defend the entrance and stair-case leading to the vaults.

Each, too, before each of the vaults sentinels are posted and others are constantly passing up and down the staircase. There is a third guard-room under the roof with lookouts in all directions.



The S. S. Solway, Capt. Parsons, arrived here last night at 10 o'clock from the Labrador. Leaving here on the 6th inst., she had it very stormy until she arrived at Emily Harbor, where she reached on the 16th. The weather was so tempestuous that the ship could not transfer her freight to the Stella Maris and had to go to Run by Guess and there shelter until the weather cleared. On the 18th the freight for the Northern Coast was transferred to the Stella Maris. On that day the fishing crews of Holton rowed to Emily Har. and boarded the Solway and on the 19th the fishermen at Smoky and contiguous places were taken on board. Right along to Battle Har. men and women joined the steamer so that she had over 300 passengers on board coming south, most of them of course in the steerage. These were landed at various places in Conception Bay. She brought a large freight of fish, oil, etc., and her saloon passengers for St. John's were G. Moty, P. Gerret, Messrs. Grant, Pond, Learning, Costigan, Rose and Barrett.

Special Evening Telegram.

LONDON, Oct. 24.

While the Balkan nations and Turkey are all generous with official statements as to the progress of the war in other parts of European Turkey, they maintain complete silence regarding the great battle which has been raging for at least two days between Adrianople and Kirk Killiseh, for news for which all the world is waiting. Reports issued from the opposing sides as to other battles show grave discrepancies, but the public is at least able to choose between the two reports. Moreover, even what has been published as to events near Adrianople is largely supposition. British military officers who, for many years, have made the study of Balkan military preparations a specialty, incline to the belief that the Turkish army has been holding the line between Adrianople and Kirk Killiseh with a covering force estimated at thirty thousand men, and that the main Ottoman Army is only now due on the scene. This might account for the Turkish statement to-day that something more definite will be known by to-night, for the arrival of her main army at the front, Turkey is expected to take the offensive. These same army critics say that the Bulgarian Army has advantage of occupying high ground at Kirk Killiseh, and that the Turks must have their full force in order to dislodge them.

Another fierce encounter is in progress around Kumanovo on the way to Uskub, where both Servians and Turks claim the victory. Turkish official reports, on the one hand, say that the Servians have been completely routed, while the Servians assert that they have taken one part of the town and continue to make progress. CONSTANTINOPLE, Oct. 24.

The Servian Army, operating near Kumanovo, has been completely defeated by the Turkish troops defending that town, which is on the way to Uskub. The Servians suffered enormous losses, according to official despatches from the Commander-in-chief of the Turkish Western Army.

SOFIA, Oct. 24.

The Turkish garrison at Adrianople suffered heavy losses during a sortie, which was attempted last night from the North Eastern quarter of the town. They left twelve cannon in the field when they retired. The Bulgarians are now only three miles from the redoubts and fortified positions.

CHICAGO, Oct. 24.

Kirk Killiseh has been captured by the Bulgarian Army, which has been fighting against the Turkish troops for several days. Possession of the fortress opens the way to the Bulgarian advance on Adrianople.

The British Foreign Office has instructed the Customs officials here to detain the Greek ships which have been commandeered by the Greek consul.
