

### **Objects** to **Primary Ouestions**

Primary Certificate. I am doubtless voicing the sentiments of every right thinking teacher in the country when say that these papers were perfectly idiculous. First I want it understood hat I am a firm believer in C. H. E. Exams, especially for outport schools. As for attendance, certainly we have many superior schools to-day that vould not exist but for the Council's

To our elementary schools the Primary Grade is the graduate mark. The pupil goes from school with something to certify that he is not an illiterate. This certificate is the goal of the pupil, the one thing to which the teacher can point as what must be reached. In St. John's this inducement is not necessary. 


