





Estimate German Army at 4,800,000

Without Allowing for Losses, Swiss Put Force Under Arms at That Figure.

London, Oct. 3 .- According to a Central News despatch from Berne, Swiss nilitary men estimate that Germany serves. A German army corps includes about 50,000 men on a war footing. Of these twenty-four are in France, six in Belgium, thirteen in East Prussia and eleven between Thor and Cracow.

There are in addition, the despatch adds, 1,500,000 men probably of the Landstrum and the volunteers serving in the interior, while 600,000 fresh recruits are reported to be in training ufficiently advanced for them to eady for service in November.




