



War News

Messages Received Previous to 9 A.M.

OFFICIAL.

LONDON, Jan. 29. Headquarters in France report the capture, northeast of Loos, of an enemy infantry attack, under cover of heavy fire. There has been minor artillery activity at various points elsewhere hostile attacks were repulsed west of the Arras Lens road near Neuville, north of Rocquigny and northeast of Arras.

The enemy gained a footing in the advanced trenches south of Givenchy. A French airship, "bombed" from the air.

In the Caucasus a large Turkish column was crushed west of Nulda near Khryskale, between Erzerum and Mush has been occupied. In Persia a large Turkish force was defeated south of Lake Urmiah.

BONAR LAW.

NEWSPAPERS COMMENT ON AMERICAN NOTE.

LONDON, Jan. 29. A summary of Lansing's proposal in submarine warfare, reached London too late for editorial comment. The late editions of morning newspapers all give it a prominent place.

The Express has a column headed "Lansing's Proposal," which says, "Backing up Pirates, America's preposterous suggestion."

and adds briefly that the proposal amounts to a "flag charter" for submarines to hold up merchant vessels and ask that the merchantmen previously have been deprived of all means of defence. The rest of the newspaper concludes, is left to German promises.

ALLIES ACCEPT FULL RESPONSIBILITY.

NEW YORK, Jan. 29. The London correspondent of the New York Herald cables this morning as follows: "I am in a position to state that henceforth in all matters, including blockade, seizure of contraband mails, submarine policy and other questions, replies to notes from the United States, and other neutral countries will be in the name of the Allies, including even Belgium, Serbia and Montenegro, that France, Russia, Italy and Great Britain accept full and joint responsibility for the war measures and that the motto of the Allies is that they are hardmen, one for all, for all one."

CONCERNING THE 'APPAM'.

LONDON, Jan. 29. The mystery of the liner Appam, which first place in the news of the morning newspapers to-day, and they all agreed that the prospect that she will ever come into port may be regarded as hopeless. Shipping experts believe that the steamer sank about Jan. 16th, northwest of Madeira.

OFFICIAL.
LONDON, Jan. 29. Headquarters in France report the capture, northeast of Loos, of an enemy infantry attack, under cover of heavy fire. There has been mining activity at various points. Elsewhere hostile attacks were repulsed. At the Arras Lens road near Neville, north of Rocquincourt, the enemy gained a footing in the advanced trenches south of Givenchy. A French airship bombarded President.

In the Caucasus a large Turkish force was crushed west of Nulak. Khyzale, between Erzerum and Mesh has been occupied. In Persia a large Turkish force was defeated south of Lake Urumlah.

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CONCERNING THE APPAM.

LONDON, Jan. 29. The mystery of the Liner Appam, takes first place in the news of the morning newspapers to-day, and they are all agreed that the prospect that she will ever come into port may be regarded as hopeless. Shipping experts believe that the steamer sank about Jan. 16th, northwest of Madeira.

From prevailing winds it is figured that the catastrophe occurred some distance north of a point where the lifeboat was found. At the London office of the Elder Dempster Line, agents of the steamer, the belief was expressed that the total loss of life would aggregate 201; 87 first class, 81 second class passengers, and 130 members of the crew. Most of the passengers were English and residents of London, while the majority of the crew were natives of Liverpool. Capt. H. C. Harrison was one of the oldest and most reliable officers in the company's employ.

THE PARIS AIR RAID.

PARIS, Jan. 30. Zeppelins were heard over Paris at 9.30 last night. Soon after about a dozen bombs were dropped, killing six and injuring thirty men. Three women and two children were killed by one of the bombs dropped by the raiders, when a house was destroyed. The other occupants were wounded. At other points there was only material damage. The city was completely darkened in anticipation of a raid. Fire engines and squads of trumpeters went through the city, sounding the alarm. Searchlights were in operation. The noise of the aeroplanes was heard in several directions. At midnight President Poincaré, accompanied by the military governor of Paris, and the Prefect of Police visited the locality where several bombs fell. Investigation revealed additional casualties. Inspection of one ruined house disclosed that two persons had been killed in their beds. In a drug store which had been reduced to a pile of ruins, the bodies of a woman and child were found at another point. The force of the explosion was so great that trees were uprooted and flung on the roofs of distant houses.

Twenty-four persons were killed and twenty-seven injured by the Zeppelin raid over Paris, yesterday, according to an official statement given to-day. Ten of the wounded were placed in hospitals, owing to the severity of their injuries.

DURHAM MINERS' UNION FAVOR MILITARY SERVICE BILL.

LONDON, Jan. 30. The Durham Miners' Union took a ballot to-day on the question, whether they should support the Military Service Bill. The vote resulted in a majority of 7,596 in favor of the bill. The totals were, for the bill 34,715; against the bill 26,819. Twenty thousand miners refrained from voting, while thirty thousand were unable to cast their ballots because the men were in the army.

PARIS VISITED BY AIR RAIDS.

PARIS, Jan. 30. Hun air raiders dropped bombs on Paris at midnight; one house was destroyed. There has been heavy fighting in Loos region. The Germans carried several saps after bombardment, but were driven out by the British. Further progress has been made by French forces. Sections of trenches taken by Germans on Friday, were recaptured yesterday.

JOINED RELIEF EXPEDITION.

LONDON, Jan. 30. Lieut-General Lake, who recently took over the supreme command of the British forces in Mesopotamia, succeeding General Nixon, has, according to an official announcement, joined the relief expedition under General Aylmer, at Wadi. He reports the weather conditions bad, the whole country is deep in mud, making movements of troops difficult.

WILSON AT PITTSBURG.

PITTSBURG, Jan. 30. President Wilson, opening here to-day his six-day programme, speaking in the Middle West of nation preparedness, told the throng which packed the Memorial Hall, that the test of national preparedness lay not with Congress, but with the young men of the country in their answer to the call to volunteer, and on their employers, who should oppose no obstacle to a free response. The President said in part: "I have great enthusiasm for rendering America spiritually efficient. Plans for our military efficiency do not provide for a great army. We want only an army necessary for the uses of peace, but we want, back of that army, a trained body of men. These men should be civilians, men who know that the arts of peace come before the arts of war. I am sorry this is a campaign year. I hope this question will not be partisan. No man should attempt to make political capital of it, and I would be ashamed of any friends of mine who take a different view. Where nations are engaged, as many are now, they are liable to be steadfastly intent on their purposes. When the actions of other nations affect America, it is hard to turn them from their purposes. It has been very difficult to maintain peace, but I am a friend of peace. There have been hourly dangers, often it has been impossible to control the situation, because others were involved. As your responsible servant, I must tell you that dangers are constant. I must go out and tell the people that new circum-

stances have arisen, which make it necessary that America defend itself."

LONDON OFFICIAL.

LONDON, Jan. 30.

Yesterday evening, after a heavy bombardment, the enemy entered some of our saps near Carnoy. Counter attacks, early this morning, drove them out. The enemy left some dead and wounded behind. Hostile shelling in this area continued to-day. Hostile bombing attacks about the Quarries, near Givenchy, were repulsed last night. This morning, shelling about Loos has been very heavy, but now has diminished a little. Our artillery replied vigorously to the enemy's fire. It has, in addition, carried out bombardments at other points of the line, doing considerable damage to hostile trenches.

SUEZ CANAL THE OBJECTIVE.

LONDON, Jan. 29. All Turkish, as well as German sentiment is for an immediate advance in the Suez Canal, says the Daily Mail's correspondent, in describing further impressions, gained on his trip to the Balkans. Owing to his dark complexion and the fact that he wore a fez, and also because of his perfect knowledge of German and French, which are the medium of communication among foreigners, the correspondent was able to talk to all classes of people without suspicion. The correspondent says that the three Turco-German objectives are Persia, Caucasus and Egypt. Regarding the advance of the British toward Bagdad a prominent Turk is quoted as having said to the correspondent: "We were very frightened when we heard that the British were coming, as our defences were in a bad condition, and contained only a few old guns, but when spies told us that General Townsend's force was small we took courage, and held it in check until reinforcements arrived. Now, thanks to Allah, they will never reach our holy city. Their reinforcements are too late."

GERMAN CONSUL ARRESTED.

ATHENS, Jan. 30. A landing squad of five or six men embarked from a torpedo boat at Re-limo, in Crete yesterday afternoon, and arrested at his hotel the former German Consul at Canea, who is said to have been acting recently as an agent for Krupp. He was taken aboard the torpedo boat.

MANUFACTURING BIG GUNS.

LONDON, Jan. 29. According to despatches from Petrograd it is estimated that two army corps of Turks are shut up in Erzerum. Russian correspondents on the western front have sent word to Petrograd that the Germans are reported to be manufacturing new 22-inch guns for use in the spring campaign.

PASHA UNITES WITH ITALIAN FORCES.

PARIS, Jan. 29. A despatch from Rome says that Essad Pasha has effected a junction with the Italian forces in Albania. It adds that he is fortifying positions at Avlona and other points further south in Albania, and is confident that he will be able effectively to stop the advance of the Austro-Hungarian forces.

SIR FRANCIS HENRY LOVELL DEAD.

LONDON, Jan. 29. Sir Francis Henry Lovell, Dean of the London School of Tropical Medicine, is dead.

QUEEN WILHELMINA SUFFERING FROM MUMPS.

HAGUE, Jan. 29. The illness of the Queen is taking a satisfactory course. She is suffering from mumps.

Once upon a time I knew a young man who liked to boast that he was fond of very few people. "Yes, there are some people I like well enough," he would say, "but, t h e r e ' s scarcely anyone who's necessary to me, scarcely anyone I'm really fond of."

A few days ago I met this young man again, or rather the man who used to be. He isn't so young now, in fact he is travelling rapidly toward the end of the thirties; there are grey hairs among the black (don't you love iron-grey hair? That is the one feature the heroes of my childhood have in common with my ideal of to-day); and lines, fine character lines, on the face that used to be so boyish. His manner, too, had changed. It was gentler, less self-confident, he was less childishly eager to talk about himself, more interested in others.

We fell to talking of old times, and somehow the subject of his one-time boast came up and I asked him if it were still true.

He had grown fond of people.

"No," he said, "it isn't. I was thinking that very subject over the other day, and I found there were quite a few people I had grown fond of."

"What brought about the change?" I asked.

"Well," he said, slowly, "I've been growing older, and I like to think I've been getting a little better educated, too."

"Does that make you fonder of people?"

"Yes," he said; "because I mean better educated in the heart, rather than the mind."

The young man that was not the only person I ever heard boast of not being fond of people. I've heard a good many others make more or less the same boast. They seemed to think it did them credit in some way, proved their superiority, their discrimination, their self-sufficiency.

To my mind it does them no credit at all. If a man boasted that he didn't like books, we should know he lacked mental education. When a person boasts that he doesn't like people, it shows there is something deficient in his heart education.

"People are the most interesting, worth-while, broadening, deepening things one can possibly study.

To understand people one must be fond of them."

And to understand people one must be fond of them, as Thackeray was fond of them, as Judge Lindsay is fond of them, as Prison Commissioner Osborne or Jane Addams is fond of them.

Every true friendship you form, every sentiment of true sympathy you feel, develops your character.

The young man that has become at least twice as likeable as he used to be. I have heard half a dozen people comment on the change since he came back. They don't know the reason, but you and I do. It is heart education, and by that token, isn't heart education a pretty fine thing to acquire?

Says Nation May Have to Choose Bread or Beer.

London, Jan. 21.—"Before long the country may have to choose between bread and beer," said Sir Alfred A. Booth, chairman of the Cunard Company, in an interview yesterday, citing the brewing and distilling industry as one that was absorbing the services of the ships of the country on a gigantic scale. The net result of this, he said, was only a decrease in national efficiency.

Sir Alfred expressed the highest satisfaction at the announcement of Walter Runciman, President of the Board of Trade, that articles not strictly necessary might have to be shut out of the country.

"I don't believe," Sir Alfred continued, "that the supply of either ships or transport facilities ashore can be increased to any great extent without encroaching on what is required for the effective prosecution of the war."

"At present the strain on port and inland transport facilities is almost

greater than the strain caused by the shortage in tonnage."

Farm Animals in U.S.

Washington, Jan. 18.—Farm animals in the United States on January 1, were valued at \$6,002,784,000, an increase of \$33,831,000, about 6 per cent over January 1, 1915. Farm cattle on January 1, the Department of Agriculture reports, included 21,988,000 milk cows, an increase of 3.4 per cent over 1915; 39,453,000 other cattle, an increase of 6.4 per cent; 49,162,000 sheep, a decrease of 1.6 per cent, and 66,947,000 swine, an increase of 5.3 per cent.

Horses numbered 21,126,000, a decrease of one-tenth of 1 per cent; and mules, 4,556,000, an increase of 1.9 per cent.

HENRY BLAIR.

His Grace the Archbishop's Address

TO HIS PEOPLE ON FINANCE MATTERS.

Dearly Beloved Brethren,—

In a sermon which I preached in the Cathedral during the month of October, reviewing the financial affairs of the Archdiocese, I intimated that at the close of the year a statement would be submitted to the congregation. You will remember that on that occasion I outlined the measures which I proposed to take for dealing with our financial situation. I stated that it was my intention to raise a loan for the liquidation of present indebtedness and for the undertaking of necessary ecclesiastical works in the near future. In pursuance of that policy two appeals were made to the congregation, one for subscribers to the new loan and a second to increase the Offertory Collections to such an extent as to make the new loan possible. It affords me very great pleasure to be able to state that both these appeals met with a response exceeding my anticipations.

Within a month after the circular letters setting forth the details of the new loan were issued I had applications covering the amount required and since that time further application to the extent of nearly \$25,000.00 have been made. All arrangements in connection with the new loan of the Corporation were finalized at the end of the year and the Trust Deed was signed by the Trustees and the Corporation. I have to express to the subscribers and to the others whose applications we have not been able to meet my appreciation of the spirit in which they entered into our Church finances. Their readiness to invest their money in Church securities reveals a spirit of loyalty to the Church and a desire to co-operate with us in our works that is beyond all praise. As I stated on a previous occasion, they will have the satisfaction of knowing that not alone are they making a remunerative investment but that their money at the same time is being utilized to forward the interests of the Church. The loan has been utilized for the paying off of all Diocesan indebtedness so that we are now free from debt. The balance—something over \$40,000.00—is on deposit at the Bank and will be expended upon ecclesiastical and educational works in the spring.

The second appeal made to the congregation was to increase the Offertory Collections. That appeal also met with a generous response. On the Sunday following my pronouncement from the pulpit the offertory collections were practically doubled and they have been in the main keeping up to that standard ever since. From the inauguration of the new system until the end of the year the Offertory Collections at Sunday Masses totaled \$2,293.17 or an average of \$299.00 a Sunday. Of that amount \$1,300.00 went to the liquidation of the old loan due the Bank and the balance \$493.17 was added to the revenue of the Cathedral for current expenses. Whilst the increase in the Offertory Collections has been most gratifying, at the same time, we shall not feel satisfied until the Offertory Collections average \$350 a Sunday. The sum of \$100.00 a Sunday is required for the purpose of the new loan. The balance of the Offertory Collections is all that we have with which to defray the very heavy expenses in connection with the Cathedral. The ordinary running expenses of the Cathedral, for light and heat, salaries and wages total nearly \$4,000.00 a year. In order to meet these expenses we should, therefore, require at least \$700.00 a Sunday over and above the amount required for the purposes of the loan. I, therefore, once again appeal to the Cathedral congregation to realize their obligations in this respect and to furnish us with sufficient funds to meet our ordinary current expenses. This can be done without involving any very heavy sacrifices on the part of the congregation. It only means that all should be prepared to bear their just and fair share of the burdens of Church expenses. I need not point out that there has been a large amount of work done on the Cathedral during the past year. The expenditure on its interior decoration and renovation was approximately \$13,000.00, all of which has been paid. That amount includes the magnificent new altar rail which is such an ornament to our Cathedral, the gift of the late Mrs. Morris, sister of the late Archbishop Hewley. Now that such has been done to beautify the interior of the Cathedral it should be, and I am sure it is, the wish and desire of us all that the Cathedral should be kept as far as possible in its present condition. This can be done only by the co-operation and the assistance of the congregation, every one of whom should have an individual interest in this Church. I feel sure that co-operation and assistance will be freely and generously given, because I know that our sentiments with regard to this noble Cathedral are the sentiments of the Psalmist of old: "We have loved, O Lord, the beauty of Thy

house and the place where Thy glory dwelleth."

IMPROVING THE EYES.

You cannot change the color or size of the iris, but you can change and improve the white portion of the eye. If this has an ugly yellow look, instead of a clear, pearly or bluish white, nine cases out of ten you are bilious and as soon as you clear out your system thoroughly, the heavy look will be reduced and your eyes will be better.

If the white portion of the eye is bloodshot, and the tiny little veins are red and inflamed, this is practically a feverish condition, which you can reduce by both internal and external treatment. Bath the eyes once a day with salt water, made with distilled water and common table salt, thoroughly dissolved, or you can use a boric acid wash.

Mix ten grains of boric acid with an ounce of distilled water. The best way to drop this into the eye, or to bathe the eyeball, is to use the eye cup. Fill the cup almost full with the soothing lotion and hold the head down so that the eye fits right into the cup. Now slowly roll back your head, holding the cup in position so that it is inverted and the eyeball is literally bathed and cleaned.

If the lower lid is baggy or puffed one of two difficulties exist; either you have some latent kidney trouble or the eyeball is inflamed. If it is case of inflammation, a very simple remedy is this: Mix ten grains of boric acid with an ounce of camphor water—no spirit of camphor. Bathe the inflamed eyes with this and use hot water compresses. When the inflammation has existed for some months and has become almost chronic, you will need a slightly stronger lotion.

RUSSIAN SUCCESSES AGAINST THE TURKS.

PETROGRAD, To-day. The Russian Caucasian operations are widening further to the westward and southward with the possibility, according to semi-official opinion, on a juncture being formed with the British-Mesopotamia expedition. The Russian advance is pushing west of Melazghert, where the important town of Khnyvyskaka, 50 miles south of Erzerum has been captured. At the same time progress is reported in the direction of Van, likewise toward Urnuh, where it is officially announced that Turks have been repulsed with heavy losses. Further southeast in the region of Kandalanski Pass south-east of Hamadan, another Russian victory is reported. Although broken mountainous country intervenes, the latter positions are not far removed from the head of the British column in the vicinity of Kut-el-Amara. It is pointed out the Turks evidently fear a junction, this being indicated by the retreat towards Mush of a large part of their army that was recently reported to have been routed, the evident purpose of the move being to cover Bitlis and Diarbakar. It is admitted that the recent successes of the Russians in the Caucasus operations thus far have no great strategic importance, but are regarded as having a notable moral effect upon the Turkish troops, which military observers point out are readily stamped in an open campaign.

SURROUNDING ERZERUM.

ATHENS, To-day. The Russians are surrounding Erzerum, from which city the Turkish authorities have fled, according to reports reaching here. A strong Russian column is advancing to the Tigris Valley, advices add.

THE SUGGESTED CONFERENCE.

LONDON, To-day. Although the London Times has been suggesting that Sir Robert Borden should pay another visit to England in order to meet the Australian and New Zealand Ministers expected here and thus have some sort of colonial conference, it is not thought likely here that the Canadian Premier will come, so long as the political situation at Ottawa is unsettled. In any case New Zealand is already out of the arrangement at present, as Premier Massey announced that the proposed visit of himself and the ex-Premier has been postponed, owing to pressure of work. Inquiries in London have failed to locate anyone who knows anything about the proposed inter-Dominion Conference of Australian and Canadian representatives which a recent Ottawa cable to London fixed for the month of March.

NO PREMATURE PEACE.

LONDON, To-day. Lord Rosebery, speaking at Edinburgh to-day at a meeting of volunteers, said: "This is not a war of the Kings, Ministers or Generals, but a war of nations. You embody the nation's resolution, that so long as there

Prospero Back

From Last Trip North.

The S. S. Prospero, Capt. A. Keau, returned from the northward this morning, having been as far as Tilt Cove and called at all intervening ports. Very frosty weather was experienced during the trip. She brought a full freight, including 1,200 casks of codfish. The following passengers came:—M. Batstone, R. J. Young, W. Hawkin, S. Skinner, G. Hodder, H. Clarke, T. Waag, E. Crane, Miss Hiscock, Grant, Lookyer and 5 in steerage.

From parties who came on the ship we learn that the herring fishery is still being carried on with remarkable success in Green Bay and the people there are making big money, getting fancy prices for the well cured article, particularly for the Scotch cured herring.

It has been practically decided that the Prospero will not make another trip north this winter. At present ice is making quickly in Green Bay and White Bay.

Horse Runs Away.

At 1 p.m. to-day a horse, owned and driven by Isador Wilansky, tea agent, took flight on Pennywell Road. In its mad career, and owing to the desperate condition of the road in that vicinity, the sleigh collided with a house, doing some damage and wrecking the outfit, with the result that the contents of the vehicle, tea, boxes, etc., were strewn around the road. The horse continued its flight countrywards where it was finally captured. In the mix-up Mr. Wilansky lost some money, but after a diligent search succeeded in recovering it. We are asked to draw the attention of the Council to the state of this road, as at present it is blocked with snow, forcing traffic to take to the sidewalk.

Reids' Boats.

The Argyle left Placentia this morning for the westward. S. S. Glencoe arrived at Burin at 8.30 a.m. to-day going west. The Kyle arrived at Basques at 9.15 a.m. yesterday.

Fourth Division Will Absorb All Enlisted to Date.

Ottawa, Jan. 21.—The fourth division which the Government has offered for service in the field, and which doubtless will be accepted promptly, will absorb practically all of the total enlistment up to date. There will be 90,000 men in the trenches.

Figuring on reinforcements at 150 per cent, the rate which now prevails, there will be requirements for 135,000 at the base. As the forces move across the Channel from England, there will need to be a corresponding movement from Canada to the overseas training depots.

The extent of this will depend very considerably upon conditions at the front and the number of the losses sustained. Under present conditions it would be an easy affair, but in times of severe engagements and losses the drafts would be both steady and large.

On the basis of the present authorized establishment and the prevailing percentage of reinforcements, it is doubtful, therefore, if more than 125,000 men will be maintained in the trenches at one time.

S.S. LADY SYBIL SAILS.—Crossie & Co.'s s.s. Lady Sybil left here on Saturday night with a full cargo of codfish for the Mediterranean market. Previous to her sailing some trouble was experienced in getting a crew together. Eventually a satisfactory understanding was arrived at Saturday afternoon. Capt. Marshall, of H. M. Customs, has gone in command replacing Capt. N. Kennedy, who resigned charge.

No Gun Emplacements Found Near N. Y.

Suspicion of Complainants are Without Slightest Foundation.

New York, N. Y., Jan. 24.—Complaints that concrete emplacements for sea guns have been erected in more than a score of places threatening the defences of New York Harbor, Long Island Sound or the Hudson River, have been investigated by government agents within the last six months. In no instance were the suspicions of the complainants verified.

The reports which reached Washington were however, of such a character as to compel investigation. In one instance the government agents were told that emplacements were being erected in Staten Island to ship guns which could demolish Forts Hamilton and Wadsworth and the lower part of New York City. The investigators were able to discover at the point indicated only a shallow concrete surface for a tennis court. Reports of emplacements in Connecticut to command Long Island Sound and on the Hudson River in range of the navy ordnance depot at Iona Island were found to be equally baseless.




