Twenty-four girl students of the University of Wisconsin, at Madison, Wis., will be paid forty cents an hour next winter to blow blue clouds of

free. For eighteen months these students have been the subject of an investigation by Professor O'Shea, who is seeking to determine what effect, if any, tobacco has on the mental faculties of the users. The test will last another

six months. One of the purposes of the investigation is to see if tobacco has the same effect on girls that it produces on

Just what the test has shown to date Professor O'Shea will not tell. He will make a complete report

when it is finished. Simultaneously similar investigations are being made at other universities. In these schools, however, the examinations are to determine the effect of tobacco on the physical body and the morals. Professor O'Shea is pecializing on the mental effects only. Other universities at which examinations are being conducted are John Hopkins, University of Michigan, Leand-Stanford, Harvard, and Cornell.

The investigators will make their reports at the same time and their oint findings will be published. Since chewing is also included in he test. Professor O'Shea is prepared to raise the pay a little as an added inducement when he collects his class of co-eds.

"This work is being carried on for scientific purposes only," Professor O'Shea explained. "It is not in the inerest of any propaganda whatever. Personally we do not care whether tobacco is harmful or not. All we want is the scientific truth, which we will publish to the world."

The students to whom the invitations are being made have no idea what the test will show. The Professor has been very careful to keep them in he dark on that subject.

AN ACT TO PROVIDE FOR THE STANDARDIZATION OF CODFISH!

WHEREAS it is essential in the interests of the Colony that the methods of preparing and exporting codfish which are at present in use should be regulated and improved; Be it enacted by the Governor, the Legislative Council and House

of Assembly, in Legislative Session convened, as follows:-1. There shall be a Commission to be appointed by His Excellency the Governor-in-Council, which shall be known as the Codfish Standardization Commission.

2. The said Commission shall consist of not less than five or more than eleven persons, of whom the Minister of Marine and Fisheries shall be one, ex officio, and shall be the Chairman. 3. It shall be e duty of the said Commission to prepare and draft rules and rulations for the improvement of the manner aft rules and rulations for the improvement of the manner which salt of 7sh (hereinafter called fish) is prepared for

d, and in particular governing the following say: matters, that is (1) The manner of catching, splitting, cleaning, salting, dry ing, curing, pickling and preparing fish for sale and export; and generally, all and singular the operations involved in the preparation of salt codfish, from the catching of the fish to the production of the finished article.

(2) The culling, selecting, assorting, standardizing, and determination of the different types or varieties of fish, with a view to the establishment of grades thereof in the local and foreign markets and to the ensuring, so far as possible, of suitability for the several markets.

(3) The stowage, storage, packing, inspection, and weighing of fish and marketing of packages.

(4) The lading, stowage, protection, dunnageing, covering, and all other matters connected with the carriage and onveyance of fish whether within this Colony or from this Colony to other countries, and whether in ships, vehicles, or any other modes of conveyance. (5) The establishments of standards of size, type, condition,

grade and quality of fish, and the means of determining and enforcing the same. (6) The fixing of differences between the prices of different

sizes, types, conditions, grades and qualities in the local markets, and the provision of methods for accurately determining such sizes, types, conditions, grades and quali-(7) The fixing of panalties for the breach of any of the rules and regulations to be made as aforesaid. Specific penal-ties shall be fixed for breach of each particular rule and

All such rules and regulations shall be laid before His Excellency the Governor-in-Council for approval, and if when so approved and published in the Royal Gazette shall at the expiration of 15 days from the date of the Proclamation have the force and

effect of Law if incorporated in this Act.







AIR MAIL CHARGES.

The announcement of the comple tion of a contract with the Handley-Page Aeroplane Company for the carriage of mails between London and Amsterdam at a charge of threepence (6 cents) per ounce over the ordinary foreign postal fee well illustrates the supineness of Government departments. The curious thing is that, though the truth of criticism has been recognized so far as the Amsterdam service is concerned, the Paris charge still stands as high as two shillings (50c.) per ounce, an anachronism that will soon have to

be altered.

LIFE-SAVING GEAR AT SEA. W. Schermuly, whose life's activity seems mainly to have been devoted to the invention of life-saving apparatus at sea, started his career as a sailor in the old Warspite training ship. Unfortunately, the Warspite was burnt out during the war or he might have given the trade domonstration of his invention from her deck instead of from the rival ship, the Worcester. The Schermuly partable rocket apparatus has been on the market for a number of years, and issued by many of the most important mail and passenger steamship lines. Mr. Schermuly has now invented a new steel-cased rocket for line-throwing purposes. It is claimed that this rocket marks a great advance over the present style, as it is immune from climatic effects and possesses no stick. Its throwing range of nearly four hundred yards is also an improvement on the old performance. The inventor's boat-releasing gear is so simple in design that its practicability at first is apt to be overlooked. Instead of two ropes which two men have to release imultaneously, the gear consists of one rope, continued along the centre of the boat fore and aft. The release is effected by means of a small lever pulled over by the man in charge of the boat, the boat always being on an even keel when entering the water.



Many editorial columns say noth not forceful because it lacks the power of ideas. The writer, hampered by the groveling policy of the paper discusses frivial subjects generally but when he comes to real issues does little more than retell the news story with explanations. The expressions of the paper are identical. But the eader is not so easily deluded. He feels the editor's fear to state his convictions boldly and he sees in the editorial a lack of personality, force and vision. Pressing local question in which the paper's position might have considerable influence are passsubjects, discussion of which is no likely to offend.

The contrast is found in the news paper that takes a decided and altogether vicious stand on every ques Some editors permit personal considerations to a far greater extent than is for the public good. They oppose everything that does not mee with their approval. Thus far their policy is good, but they hold up for ridicule these parties and persons editor's theory is that he alone is right: the rest of the world, that does not side with him, is wrong, and being wrong has no right to its opinions or to an expression of them. Nero As a Musician.

Of course Nero did not play on odern fiddle when Rome burned

every schoolboy knows that, becaus fiddles were not known in his timenot for many years after, but it i not improbable that he sang during the conflagration, for we have some

little data on his musical training. His musical career started in child

listening to his 'music master and practising far into the night. Then, says a writer, Nero made the fatal discovery that he had a voice and so he diverted his attention to vocal music. His voice was said to be high, thin and husky, but what vocal teacher would have had the courage to reveal this fact to the domineer ing emperor? The teacher must rather have said: "Ah, your Majesty, what a voice! What tone! What roundness! What sweetness! What power! Only the lark soaring over

the Tiber could be its equal." Now none of the artists of to-day could equal the care Nero took of his vocal organ. Part of the day he spent lying on his back, with a sheet of lead upon his stomach or chest This lead sheet was supposed to improve his breathing. His food was selected with a view to bettering his voice. If his vocal quality was not quite up to the mark he took an eme-

In order not to strain his voice he refused to deliver addresses to his army. Nero's teacher was always at hand, and if the music-mad emperor used his voice incorrectly the teacher had orders to clap a napkin over his mouth.

Nero made his debut at Naples in A.D. 63. It was sensational, for an earthquake occurred which wrecked the building where the concert took place. His other "appearances" took place in Rome-in the palace and at the public games.

Awaiting Vengeance.

Vengeance for the assassination of Essad Pasha, head of the Albanian delegation in Paris, France, is being quietly awaited by a "blood brother" of the Balkan leader, according to a circumstantial story by a French writer.

This man, now rich and influential in France, the story goes, was one of several poor young men who thirty years ago met Essad Pasha, then known as the "Black Dagger of Abdul Hamid" in Constantinople, when he crowded into a card game and insisted upon playing with them. Fearing Essad Pasha, they protested they were too poor to play with him, but he insisted, emphasizing it by placing his revolver on the table as a threat. To meet this, the "blood brother" put down his dagger, poi said. Essad Pasha showed his sur-

prise, then his pleasure. "Young man," he exclaimed, "this is the first time any one has dared defy me. Men like you are rare."

Essad Pasha took his own dagger, opened a vein in his wrist and also in that of the young man, each sucked a few drops of blood from the other, and they became "blood brothers," according to Albanian customs, sworn to avenge each other's deaths. "I am ready," this brother now is

quoted as saving, "to keep my oath, but I have confidence that French will make it unnecessary for me to interfere." Rustem Aveni, arrested on the

spot for shooting down Essad Pasha, as the latter was entering his automobile in the down-town district of Paris recently, is awaiting trial. He was a student who posed as the avenger of Albanian wrongs.

Round The World By Boat. Captain A. L. Napper, an English

man, is proposing to start on a oneman voyage round the world in a motor-boat. This will be a unique achievement so far as this new kind of craft is concerned, but similar long distance voyages in ordinary small and fragile boats have frequently been accomplished quite successfully. 25 years ago, for instance, Captain Joshua Slocum sailed a tiny cockle-shell of a craft measuring less than thirtyseven feet in length right round the globe. Sailing, rowing and drifting he travelled more than forty-six thousand miles in three years, two months, two days thirteen hours. Many times, too the Atlantic has been crossed in small boats; and some years ago, a foolhardy individual tried to cross cooped up in a barrel weighted with lead to make it stand upright, and fitted with a sliding man-hold and a collapsible mast. He was drowned. In 1886, again, three men navigated a small boat called the "Homeward Bound" from Port Natal, in South Africa, to Dover. While, some few years back, four members of the crew of the British ship "Manila" torpedoed by a Hun raider in the Pacific, voyag-ed in the ship's small lifeboat to Pago-Pago, 1,200 miles distant.


