

Boer and Empire "STAND TOGETHER OR HANG SEPARATELY."

Commissioner for Commerce on 1 Continent, made a remarkable speec according to Reuter, at a banque given in his honour by the Rotterdan Chamber of Commerce. In a eulogy o the British Empire he said it was dif ficult for anyone who had not grow up in the atmosphere of the gradua growth of the Imperial Constitu to appreciate it. It was not the world of a year or a few years; it was thing that had grown as gradual and as imperceptibly as a tree. T sowing and the germination of the seed was also as unobtrusive and as imperceptible. We who had seen it growth during all its stages did feel surprised when he saw its mination in the fully-grown tree standing before us. The Imperial relationship was a thing unique in the history of the world. The position could best be described as an hereditary bond, partnership or confederation of free nations; or, better still, a "British Imperial League of Nations, each one enjoying absolute freedom of action. Alluding to the perils of such a free convention in time of war, he added: Of course, such power should be exercised with the greatest car tion; but their instincts not only of self-preservation, but of justice, se timent, and loyalty to one anoth would always guide each one of then to do just the right thing at the right oment. We know instuitively that each may hang separately.
