7,000 Lives Lost in Storm and Earthquake

Storm Leaves Death and Disaster Along Atlantic Coast--Balkan Fighting Becomes Serious as League Prepares to Meet.

PHILONE BRINGS DEATH TO THOUSANDS.
BARACHI, British India, Oct. 24.—The vessels have been sunk in the sea Gulf in the worst cyclone in the history of the present generation. Death list is estimated as between seven and ten thousand.

PEOPLE PERISH IN PERSIAN GULF.
BARACHI, British India, Oct. 25.—The details of the disaster caused by the storm in the Persian Gulf continue to be reported of great loss of life and property. It is believed that several thousand persons perished in the storm which was accompanied by an earthquake. The pearl-fishing fleet has been wiped out of existence and more than two hundred small boats were sunk. Many acres of date palms were levelled.

21 DEATHS DUE TO STORM ON ATLANTIC COAST.
NEW YORK, Oct. 25.—Two devastating wind storms struck the Atlantic coast of the United States to-day, resulting in at least twenty-one deaths and many injured. The storm started north from Alabama, where sixteen are reported killed in a tornado. Two fishermen were drowned off Rockaway and in Woburn, Mass., one man was killed, many injured slightly and five hundred dwellings damaged. At Baltimore seventeen navy seaplanes were torn from their moorings and carried away to sea; seven were lost and all the others were badly damaged.

10 KILLED BY CYCLONE IN ALABAMA.
TROY, Alabama, Oct. 25.—Ten are known dead and many are injured in a damaging cyclone which swept Pike County yesterday.

23 SEAPLANES BLOWN AWAY.
BALTIMORE, Oct. 25.—Twenty-two United States Navy seaplanes, moored at Baltimore harbour broke away to-day and disappeared beyond Chesapeake Bay; they were unoccupied. Another private plane also broke from its moorings and disappeared. None had been recovered up till Saturday evening.

BULGARIA WILL RESIST INVADERS.
SOFIA, Oct. 24.—Bulgaria is sending troops into the "war areas" and has decided to make a stand, as far as her limited military strength permits, in case the Greeks continue to invade territory granted her under the Treaty of Neuilly.

GREEKS BOMBARDING BULGARIAN TOWNS.
SOFIA, Oct. 25.—Bulgarian official agency reported that Greek artillery to-day bombarded two villages, killing and wounding a number of people. Greek troops to-day continued to occupy Bulgarian territory and evidenced no intention of retreating.

EXTRAORDINARY SESSION OF THE LEAGUE IN PARIS.
PARIS, Oct. 25.—At the very moment when members of the League of Nations Council are hurrying to Paris for an extraordinary session to discuss the situation in Greco-Bulgarian border, these two countries continue belligerent acts, the Greeks bombarding two towns hitherto not told in the news, and according to counter reports, Bulgarians are occupying Greek territory.

PROVINCIAL AMERICANS PLEDGE SUPPORT OF LEAGUE.
NEW YORK, Oct. 24.—Charles Evans Hughes, former United States Secretary of State, and leader in Republican ranks, has pledged himself on record as a supporter of a permanent Court of International Justice set up by the League of Nations, and another prominent Republican, Ellis Root, also former Secretary of State, has fallen in behind Hughes. Support of the two Repub-

licans for International Court, came last night, when the Pilgrim Society of the United States tendered a dinner in honor of Sir Robert Horne, former Chancellor of Exchequer, Great Britain.

TOBACCO BUSINESS PAYS.
SOMERVILLE, N.J., Oct. 24.—The will of James B. Duke, tobacco magnate, disposing of his estate, estimated at one hundred and fifty million dollars, has been filed for probate, leaving the greater part to his thirteen year old daughter, Doris, and providing over seventeen millions for the Duke endowment, established last year.

STORM DAMAGE IN HALIFAX.
HALIFAX, Oct. 25.—The storm which struck this coast this morning caused considerable damage to business houses which had signs blown down and windows blown in, and all cellars flooded with water. Rain fell all day, driven by a fifty mile gale. No marine mishaps are reported.

GERMAN NATIONALISTS RESIGN.
BERLIN, Oct. 25.—Nationalist members of the German Cabinet (three members) resigned to-day as a protest against the Locarno Security Pact.

SEAMEN'S STRIKE CRACKING.
BRISBANE, Australia, Oct. 25.—The seamen's strike here received a set-back to-day when two steamers, manned by volunteer Union men, left the port of Sydney.

AUSTEN CHAMBERLAIN LORD REC-TOR OF GLASGOW UNIVERSITY.
GLASGOW, Oct. 25.—Austen Chamberlain, British Foreign Secretary, was elected Lord Rector of Glasgow University yesterday, when he received 1342 votes. G. K. Chesterton received 968 and Sidney Webb, former President of the Board of Trade, 255. The final campaign of the students was featured by the use of twenty thousand ripe eggs which were thrown at their last meetings and turned the whole campus and buildings into a filthy mess.

NORWEGIAN STEAMER IN DISTRESS.
LONDON, Oct. 25.—Lloyds report Norwegian steamer Elven, from Rotterdam for Sydney, in distress in mid Atlantic, with steering gear smashed and lifeboats carried away. The American Trader has gone to her assistance.

Bolshevism and Barbarism

A most curious and penetrating little essay on the "hard work and no comfort" conditions now prevailing in Moscow is given in a communication to the "Times." It is more than hinted that this state of excessive hardship is part of a Communist policy. An attempt is being made to forge an altogether new type of citizen—one trained to welcome privation. Old people, it is said, are seldom seen in Moscow, and the younger generation has no experience of any other life. They have to be content with the bare means of existence, and are taught that any comforts enjoyed outside Russia are in the wicked hands of those who oppress the proletariat. A story told of one of the fortunates who have retained any of their property illustrates the general wretchedness most vividly. He has access to three rooms in his former mansion, but a part of one is boarded off for the use of twenty university students. Their privileges are an iron bedstead covered with a few rags apiece, and one meal a day at the university, and the equivalent of five shillings a week on which to keep themselves. 




"When Next We Talk of Unemployment"

"Carlyle was right: 'Blessed is he who has found his work; let him ask no other blessedness,'" writes "G.J." in the Manchester Guardian, after recalling Rutherford's story of the man who retired from business, and was only too glad to go back to work again. "G.J." however, pursues this theme further to the present industrial situation, and adds:—
 "And then one thinks of the vast, grim tragedy of the workless which casts its long black shadow over our nation's life. God forgive us if we do not think of it!
 "Is there anyone who reads these words who knows what it is to be able to work, to be willing to work, and yet unable to find work?
 "Perhaps not; but here are words—almost intolerable in their bare simplicity and force—which may help us to imagine what it means:—
 "How foreign, hard, repellent are the streets in which such a man is a stranger, alone amidst a crowd of people all intent upon their own occupation whilst he has none! At noon, when business is at its height, he, with nothing to do, sits down on a seat in an open place, or, may be, on the doorstep of an empty house, un-tilted the little parcel he has brought with him and eats his dry bread.
 "He casts up in his mind the shops he has visited; he reflects that he has taken all the more promising first, and that not more than two or three are left. He thinks of the vast waste of the city all around him; its miles of houses; and he has a more vivid sense of abandonment than if he were on a plank in the middle of the Atlantic.

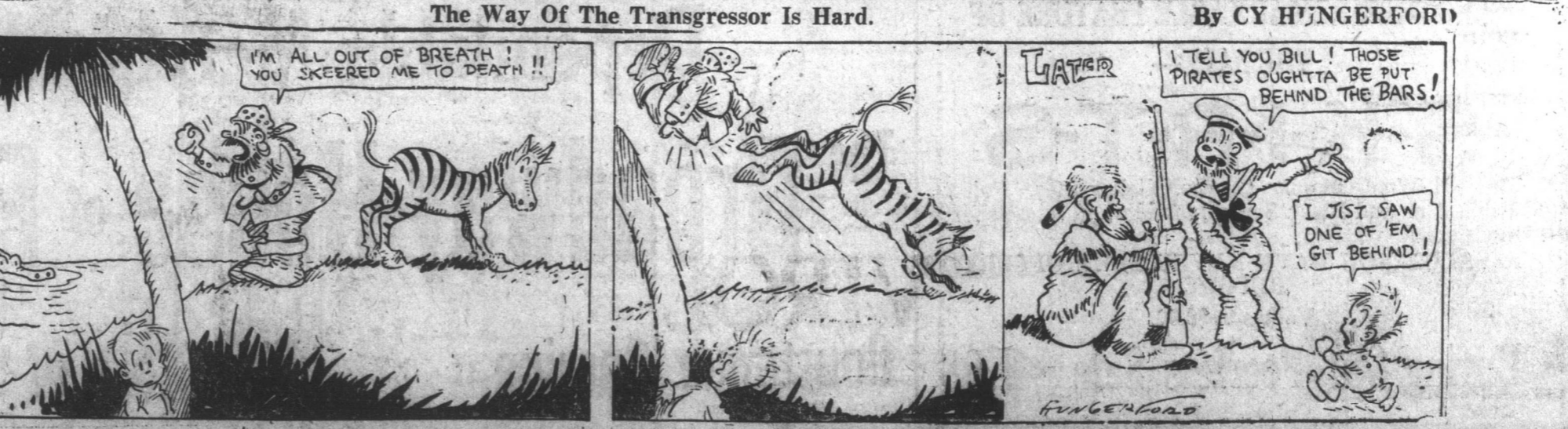

Wins Musical Degree

MISS MARY MEANEY.

Fellow of Trinity College of Music Awarded Miss Meaney.
 To the Presentation Convent, Cathedral Square, of this city, goes the honor of being the first to have the Degree of Fellow of Trinity College, London, England, granted to one of its musical students. The successful candidate is Miss Mary Meaney, who won the distinction in this summer's examination, which was conducted by the Trinity College of Music Examiners, Mr. Vincent, who in his report to the Board referred in commendatory terms to the ability displayed by Miss Meaney in her rendition of the difficult music which the degree of Fellowship demands.
 Miss Meaney began her musical training in 1916 at the age of 10, and each successive year passed examinations with honors in each grade, including A.T.C.L. and L.T.C.L. 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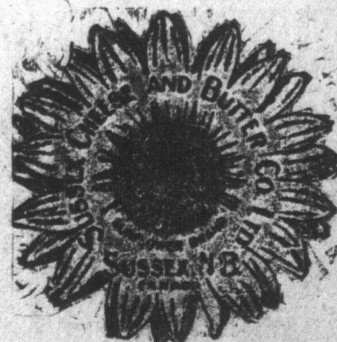

A Castle in the Air

STORY OF LEGACY PROVES TO BE UNTRUE.

Man Without Degree Poses As Doctor.

From basking in the reflected glory of a supposed inheritance of £70,000 in cash and two ancient manor houses, in England and Scotland, worth between £50,000 and £60,000 more, to the prisoners' dock in a police court at Winnipeg, Manitoba, was the sudden transition undergone by a Saskatchewan man, who was formerly owner of a fox farm at Wilkie, Saskatchewan, and later practised as a physician at Codette. Branded as a liar, and convicted on seven charges of fraud, he was sent to Stony Mountain Penitentiary for two years with hard labor. Accused Arthur Francis Blake, is stated to have built and equipped a hospital at Nipewin, a pioneer town in Northern Saskatchewan, and a few months ago he announced himself the beneficiary under a most unusual will, which, he claimed, had been made by his uncle. What is declared to be a gigantic hoax, perpetrated with a criminal motive, was carried out by Blake while living in Saskatchewan in February last. Claiming to be Captain A. F. Blake, with military distinction and honors, and holder of the Belgian Croix de Guerre, he presented himself to be the inheritor of his late uncle's estates of Killmeron Castle, in Forfarshire, Scotland, and Wootton Manor, Sussex, England, providing he carried out certain strange clauses in the will. He claimed that his uncle, Colonel Arthur G. Blake, made the following stipulations:—

1. He must visit his mother's birth place in Umballa, India.
2. Visit the spot in South Africa where his father was killed during the Boer War.
3. Remain in Canada until Nov. 20, 1927.
4. After that date make his home at Wootton Manor, having carried out the other conditions.
5. Marry some time before Jan. 1, 1930.
6. Encourage the Sussex fox hunt and be a member of the same.

Blake stated that his father was Captain Thomas Gerald Blake, only brother of the uncle who had just died. His father had given his life for the Empire on the South African field in the 1901 campaign. The police found that although he practised as a doctor, no one had proof of Blake's professional standing, and that he had been obtaining his instruments under false pretences. His landlady was also short of a considerable sum for board and lodging. Blake was arrested in Winnipeg, charged with cashing a number of worthless cheques. At the trial he said he had built a

hospital in Saskatchewan, pictures of which were published. The hospital, he added, had never been opened. He substantiated an account of his military exploits during the Great War, which credited him with several decorations and a bag of 26 enemy planes and balloons. According to word received in Winnipeg from the chief constable of Fifeshire, Scotland, the whole story of the legacy is a pure invention. A Killmeron Castle exists, it is true, but it is occupied at present by its owner, Lady Low, whose family has never heard of Blake. A warrant for Blake's arrest is out, and is to be served by Saskatchewan Provincial Police as soon as the Manitoba term is finished. Further inquiries from Scotland Yard brought the information that Blake had served a sentence of ten years' penal servitude when convicted of theft as a cadet in the Royal Irish Constabulary. The fake heir, however, spoke of this as purely "political wrangle," and declared that other "Blacks and Tans," were sentenced with him, and "several of us got out in four months."

Titulesco has reached a tentative agreement with the British Government for the funding of Rumania's £26,000,000 war debt to Great Britain. The debt will be liquidated in 40 years under the tentative agreement with a 3-1-2 per cent annual payment covering interest and amortization charges.

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The Besco Inquiry Commission Named

MONTREAL.—Dr. H. P. MacPherson, president rector of St. Francis Xavier University, Antigonish, N.S., and Hume Cronyn, a prominent business man of London, Ont., and member of parliament from 1917 to 1921, will under the chairmanship of Sir Andrew Rae Duncan, of London, a chairman of the advisory committee to the British Department of Mines, constitute the commission of inquiry into the coal mining industry of Nova Scotia, according to an announcement by Premier E. N. Rhodes.

Sir Andrew will bring with him a technical expert of the British Mines Department, and the government of Nova Scotia will supply whatever technical and clerical assistance the commission may require, the premier stated. The date of the opening session of the commission, the premier announced, depends on the time of the arrival of Sir Andrew, but it is expected it will be sometime this month. The premier stated that the terms of reference to the commission will be very wide and provide for a thorough inquiry.—Financial Post.

Easy Lessons in AUCTION BRIDGE

New Series by WYNNE FERGUSON

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ARTICLE No. 1

Auction is a game of contrasts. One hand will play well and the next one badly; that is, on one hand you will get all the "breaks," and on the next, everything will go wrong. It is a game of such infinite variety that no player can ever hope to master all its quirks and turns. Even the best of players lose their judgment at times and allow their own hand to influence their bidding to their disadvantage when they should realize that their partner has an unusual, freak hand. The other night, the writer noticed two examples of this failure to be on the lookout for the unusual or freak type of hand.

The dealer with the following hand:
Hearts—A, 7
Clubs—A, 9, 4, 2
Diamonds—A, Q, J, 8
Spades—A, K, 4

bid one no-trump. Second hand passed and the dealer's partner bid two hearts. Fourth hand passed and the dealer bid two no-trump. When his partner bid three hearts, the dealer failed to realize that if his partner had a justifiable three heart bid, they had a sure game in hearts, and bid three no-trump although there was no sure game in no-trump. The 100 aces were too much for his judgment and as a result he went down three tricks undoubted, a net loss of 50 points on a hand that would have scored game at hearts. His partner's hand was as follows:
Hearts—Q, J, 10, 9, 6, 4
Clubs—Q, 6, 3
Diamonds—10, 9, 7
Spades—5

Don't allow 100 aces to impair your judgment.

Safe-Moving Device Saves Dangerous Labor

Experience had taught John A. Wagner, of Baltimore, Md., how hard it was to load and unload safes in trucks. He lessened the danger of this moving job by inventing a device that puts rollers, block, and tackle to work instead of muscle.

The safe is slid on a platform that is even with the top of the street curb. Its rear wheels rest on a heavy steel ledge, the bottom part of an upright carrying frame to which the safe is strapped securely. The frame then is tilted back and slides over a long roller that is set in at the end of the truck. With the help of ropes drawn through a winch or block and fall behind the driver's seat, it is pulled up until it rests on its back in the truck, ready for the trip.

Unloading the safe at its destination is accomplished by the same process, except that it is done in reverse order.

How a Business Man Gets His Orders

"It is the personal touch in business that pays. If British manufacturers would make it felt in the markets of the world there would be a revival in British overseas trade."

This statement was made by Mr. Henry J. Pratt, of Messrs. H. J. Lord Birkenhead Raps the Press

MAKES CAUSTIC REFERENCE TO "YOUNG GENTLEMEN FROM FLEET STREET."

LONDON, Oct. 16.—(C.P.)—Lord Birkenhead, Secretary of State for India, made some caustic references to the London newspapermen in an address to the Constitutional Club to-day.

"I wish you could enlist in the Cabinet a few of the young gentlemen from Fleet Street," he said. "It would enormously reduce the gravity of our anxieties and accelerate the conduct of the Government's business, because they know everything. They are prepared in five minutes, in five lines, to tell me everything I should do in India."

Admitting that he himself had escaped criticism much better than he had expected, Lord Birkenhead wound up with this parting shot at the Press men:

"We (the Cabinet Members) are represented as a collection of bloody-minded ruffians, who are preparing now to involve the nation in an unnecessary war with the Turks."

Motorist of Future May Carry Extra Gas Tanks in His Pocket

A new type of motor car which would receive its power from hydrogen and the driver of which could carry extra tanks in his vest pocket, is the prediction of Professor J. C. McLennan, head of the physics department of the University of Toronto and famous for his discoveries and researches with helium.

Professor McLennan states that the proposed motor, unlike the principle of the gas engine, would not receive its energy from the burning of hydrogen, but the driving force would be produced by the dissolution of the hydrogen atoms into those of helium. If this could be done, he says, the energy so produced would be enormous, for, as he points out, one ounce of hydrogen is sufficient to create enough energy to heat six million tons of water from freezing-point to boiling.

Great progress has been made in the development of the atomic theory since it was first discovered by Dalton 150 years ago, says Professor McLennan. The atom is so small that it can't be seen by ordinary microscopes, but lately a new instrument has been constructed that exposes it to view.—Toronto Daily Star.

Know Your Car.

The wheel bearings of an auto require very little attention. For this reason motorists are inclined to take the condition of the wheel bearings for granted. But complete neglect usually means a repair bill and sometimes a bad accident.

Properly cared for, the wheel bearings will outlast the other moving parts of the car. You can keep them in good condition by following these rules:

1. Thoroughly clean all wheel bearings at least once every 5000 miles. Be sure to remove all of the old grease. Gasoline or kerosene should be used for cleaning.
2. Examine the surface of each ball with minute care and discard any that show even the faintest sign of a crack.
3. Replace broken rollers or balls with new ones only after you have made certain, by the use of a micrometer, that the new parts are precisely the same diameter as the other balls or rollers in the bearing.
4. Reassemble the bearing and pack it carefully with a high grade of soft cup grease.
5. Adjust the ball bearing so that it will turn freely without perceptible play. Set the roller bearing so that there is just perceptible play—Popular Science.

For every pound expended by British men and women in 1924 in the purchase of Dominion products more than 18s. 6d. was received back, chiefly in the purchase of British manufactured products, whereas for every pound expended in foreign countries less than 14s. was received back in purchases from Great Britain," says the Canadian Gazette.

"Why blame the Government for the trade tendencies we do not like? If shookeepers find that people insist on having British and Empire goods, they will stock them in preference to foreign articles. Under 40 per cent. of the wheat imported into this country last year was Empire grown, and the adverse balance in twelve months was £200,000,000.

"Let us bestir ourselves all round to help ourselves."

U.S. Government BREEDS BUGS TO TEST INSECT POWDER.

In a strange nursery on the banks of the Potomac, the U.S. Government keeps a host of fleas, mosquitoes, mites, and flies. When fully grown, they serve to test poisons that are sold throughout the country for extermination of insects.

Among the most valued assistants on the bug farm are four dogs, two cats, and 125 chickens, who produce bumper crops of fleas and mites. To get first-hand information on whether advertised mosquito and chigger preparations do all that they should, a human worker in the laboratory daubs the stuff on one arm and spends the afternoon fishing on a chigger-mosquito infested bank.

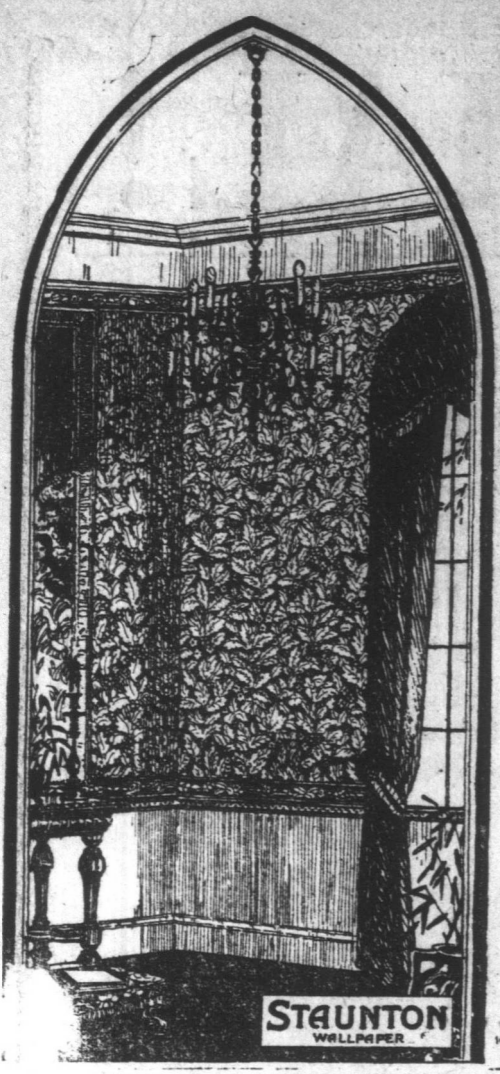

The Telephone Rates

Editor Evening Telegram:
Dear Sir—A few days ago I received a printed notice reading as follows:—

NOTICE.

"Rates For Telephone Service. Commencing January 1st, 1926, the following rates for Telephone Service in St. John's will be effective:

per annum
"Business Telephone Service (including Private Branch Exchange trunk lines) . . . \$50.00
"Residence, private line . . . 37.50
"Residence, two-party line . . . 30.00
"Residence, four-party line . . . 25.00
"Bills will be mailed to subscribers during the first week of January and first week of July in each year, covering the usual six month period. The customary practice of delivering bills by collectors will be discontinued.

"A discount of 20 per cent. will be allowed on the above rates if payment is made at the Company's office before January 15th and July 15th respectively.

"This discount does not apply to accounts owing for toll calls, extension telephones, etc., the rates for which have not been increased, or accounts in arrears; but all such must be paid in full before any discount can be obtained.

"The accidental omission to mail a telephone bill to a subscriber or the non-receipt of same through delay in the mail delivery, etc., before the dates specified, will not entitle the subscriber to any discount after these dates.

"Should a subscriber not receive his bill for telephone service before the 10th inst, he should phone or call at the office before the dates mentioned.

"AVALON TELEPHONE CO., LTD.
"St. John's, Oct., 1925."

I am a subscriber to the Telephone service supplied this city and have been for a number of years past. I presume a similar notice has been received by every person, firm or Company that uses the telephone service.

I dislike the idea of an increase in cost of the phones and the suggestion that the Avalon Telephone Co., Ltd., has a right to increase the cost of the service whenever they feel disposed to do so, and I resent the manner in which the proposed increase is communicated to telephone subscribers. I think the community generally and the business community particularly should not allow this high-handed conduct of the Telephone Co. to pass without challenge. On all sides one hears objection, but nobody appears to be sufficiently interested to move in the matter. I propose to appeal to all parties interested in having telephone service to wake up and realize what the present action of the Telephone Co. means and what it means in the future. Three questions arise for consideration:

1. Has the Telephone Co. the right to increase the rates as proposed?
2. If they have a right, is there any limit to the increase in rates that they may make from time to time?
3. If they have the right to make such increase, what is the most effective way for Telephone subscribers to fight them?

If we remain passive and allow ourselves to be placed at the mercy of the Telephone Co. what is there to prevent the rates being further raised on our next year, and so on in each succeeding year?

I would suggest that a meeting of Telephone Subscribers be held without delay for the purpose of organizing to protect ourselves against the apparently extortionate demands of the Telephone Co. I use the expression "apparently extortionate demands" advisedly, for the notice above referred to does not attempt to suggest any reason for the increased rates, and I presume if there was a justifiable reason that the Company would be only too glad to have informed subscribers.

Let us first ascertain what is the nature of the franchise granted to this Company; secondly let us ascertain if that franchise gives the Company the right to fix the rates for service at whatever figure they please; thirdly let us call upon the Government to create a permanent Public Utilities Board or Commission with jurisdiction enabling it to curb unreasonable or extortionate demands from the Company; and fourthly, if nothing else can be done, let us decide in a body to relinquish the Telephone Service and have the instruments removed from our respective premises.

I do not intend to let this matter rest here and I hope to have the cooperation of all Telephone Subscribers in my efforts to protect ourselves against the Company.

I enclose my card for your own information and thank you in advance for space for this letter.

Thanksgiving Sunday

COCHRANE STREET CENTENNIAL CHURCH.

Large congregations, impressive services and generous giving marked Thanksgiving Sunday at Cochrane Street Church. The presence of Dr. Chown, late General Superintendent of the Methodist Church, as the preacher for the day, formed an attraction, for Dr. Chown's utterances are always eloquent and weighty, and there are few men of wider outlook and keener vision. For nearly a quarter of a century he kept the question of church union before the people of Canada. By his public utterances as well as by his writings he endeavored to foster the movement, and it was his great joy on the 10th June last to write two million of the people engaged Christianity in the place of churchianity, the spirit of the Christ, instead of the artificial distinctions of the denominations. And in the great hour of triumph the spirit of this man of God was shown in his abnegation of self and his nomination of another for the office of Moderator of the United Church. There is no need to search for the secret of his power and influence. It is no wonder that his name is known over the world, and that his counsel is prized in all the parliaments of religion.

His text in the morning was: "Ye shall be holy, because I am holy." We must believe that holiness is the supreme law of living. Holiness is written upon every manifestation that God has made to man. The law is binding, and while we stand on the rock, we are safe, while off the rock is destruction. If we conform to the conditions

imposed upon us, it serves us. God says, "I will baptize you with fire." God is a consuming fire. This is God's law. If we do not wish to conform, we should get outside God's jurisdiction—which is impossible.

"Ye shall be holy." Why? "Because I am holy." This is not a dictate of justice. The purpose of all law is to protect, and all law is lined with love. God's love leads Him to make the very best of us. We need ideals and therefore Jesus Christ has been given to us. Our faith controls our life. If we believe in pleasure, we walk in her ways. If in making money, we take our place in the world markets. If in Jesus Christ, we live the life of holiness. Gazing into the face of Christ we are changed into His image. We can have His image and we can live His life of Holiness if we are prepared to pay the price.

In the evening Dr. Chown preached from the words, "We would see Jesus." What was Christ? I and My Father are one. I am the Truth. I am the Resurrection and the Life. If I be lifted up, will draw all men unto Me. Jesus is as much at home in the throbbing problems of to-day as in those of His day. The great men of the earth acknowledge the greatness of Jesus. God was in Christ reconciling the world unto Himself. There cannot be a fuller manifestation. How did Jesus meet the problems of daily life? I am among you as one that serveth. The Prime Minister of any country is the chief servant. He that would be chief, let him be the servant of all.

The Inflow of Divine Life makes us men. We open our hearts to receive Christ. Our faith is made possible by the sufferings of Christ, and Christ risked everything to save and serve sinners. It is impossible in these short notes to compass the thought

and the pathos and the strength and courtesy of these utterances.

Miss Eleanor Mow says: "Lighteous art Thou, O Lord!" and also the psalm in "As pants the hart." Both were given very beautifully. The choir rendered the anthems and service music with great expression and reverence, most of the music being unaccompanied—the greatest test of a choir. The eloquent sermons, the reverent worship, the inspiring hymns, in which the vast congregations heartily joined, made it a day of joy and gladness indeed, and one to be long remembered.

Superintends Construction of Public Building

Mr. J. J. Spratt left yesterday's express to superintend the construction of the new public building at Corner Brook, which is being erected by the W. I. Bishop Co. The building is of concrete and will contain the Post Office, Customs House and Court House.

Writers at Locarno Boycott Mussolini

Alleged That Italian Premier is Muzzling Press of His Country.—Pale and Haggard.—Asks English Labor Correspondent is Communism Still Going Strong.

Locarno, Switzerland, Oct. 18.—Allegations that Premier Mussolini was muzzling the Italian newspapers caused a majority of the British and French, together with some of the German correspondents, to boycott a press meeting arranged by the Italian delegation to-day to permit the fascist chief to give his views concerning the security conference.

Nevertheless the hotel room set aside for the purpose was filled when Mussolini entered. His appearance was a distinct shock to those who had not seen him since his short visit to Switzerland during the opening days of the Lausanne conference in the summer of 1922. He was pale and haggard, and seemed to have difficulty in giving clarity to his statements, which he had committed to paper.

Proud of Italy's Part.—His most important utterance was that adoption of the Rhine security pact meant the stabilization of general peace throughout Europe as well as along the Rhine. This peace, he declared, would be confirmed by Germany's entrance into the League of Nations. The Rhine pact would also permit the peoples of Europe to settle their pressing economic and financial problems.

Signor Mussolini spoke proudly of Italy's part in the conference, saying that when the negotiations became delicate the Italian had contributed to the attainment of harmony. He was convinced that all the delegations recognized the remarkable importance of Italian adhesion to the pact, which adhesion was given despite the fact that Italy had no common frontier with Germany.

Alluding to Italy's frontier with Austria and to the question of any annexation of Austria to Germany, the Italian premier declared the treaty of Versailles exactly defined the Austrian situation, and made it inalienable.

"All right, this meeting is adjourned."

When he emerged from the conference, he found the hotel lobby filled, the crowd including the boycotting correspondents. Hailing the correspondent of an English Labor paper, he asked, "Is communism still going strong?" to which the journalist replied: "I am not a communist."

Premier Mussolini rejoined, "Pandora me, I am mistaken then." "Yes, as you often are," came a voice from the ranks of the boycotters.

The premier halted as if to make some retort, but either could find no suitable one or thought better of it, and walked on.
