## CANADA'S RELATIONS WITH GREAT BRITAIN.

The present position of Canada forms an old subject of debate, and about this time every year it has of late become the fashion to get up a discussion about annexation or independence, which, after the papers have three weeks, dies out, to come up again in the spring, just when the business in the spring, just when the business of the year is about to open, and particularly when times are a little dull and there is nothing else to talk about. One of the London journals, one in Montreal and another in staid old Quebee, are trying to convince the people that the grand panaeca for all the little evils which at present afflict Canada is the discontinuance of the dependence upon the mother country, and for Canada to emerge from her colonial state to that of a free nation governing herself by her own chosen rulers. Harmless generalities are liberally indulged in, for none of the advocates of independence have mentioned whether they wish Canada to become a republic or a limited monarchy, or for, that matter a despotic one; and until the independence men or annexationists—for there is no very great difference between the views of the two parties—are prepared to show more clearly how a change in the government would benefit us, the number of their conversions will be very limited, and their doctrines viewed with little favor, though the London Free Press may rage and the Hon. John Young imagine a vain thing.
