

Local and Other Items.

The Nova Scotia Legislature has adjourned.

Two barns, one belonging to the Bible Christians, and the other to Mr. B. Leathorn, London, were destroyed by fire on Wednesday night. Loss about \$1200.

A PETITION from the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in Canada in favour of a prohibitory liquor law, was presented in Parliament on Thursday.

The Hon. E. B. Wood is rapidly recovering from his late illness, and his medical adviser expects to entirely cure the paralysis in his legs, with which Mr. Wood has been afflicted for a year or two, and which was brought on by over exertion.

A WESTERN paper speaks of the house-cleaning season as that when divine woman has her own way at the house, while the 'old man' takes his solemn rest from the top of the flour barrel, and sleeping, enjoys the freedom of the interval between his bedroom and the front fence. It is a season of meditation, whitewash and calm, unimpassioned profanity.

A London letter says: "Mr. Gladstone tells his private acquaintances that he regrets he has given so many years to politics. 'How little,' said he the other day to an admirer, 'do politics affect the life of a nation! One single good book influences people a vast deal more.' The result of such reasoning is that the right honourable gentleman proposes to devote himself more exclusively to literature, and I hear that the *Contemporary Review* is to enjoy the benefit of his literary toil."

A new way of proposing marriage is reported, and we give the facts for the benefit of those interested. A gentleman attended a fair in New York, recently, and fell in love (as gentlemen sometimes do) with a demoiselle in the floral temple. He bought a \$10 basket of flowers, and handing her a \$50 bill, said, "If you don't give me the exact change, I'll marry you." The blushing maid handed him back \$30 (she was probably confused), and he remarked, "I thought so." Cards will be out early next week.

THE STRIKE ON THE WELLAND CANAL.—The *St. Catharines News* says:—The strike still continues, and the men have not all returned to work as was expected. On Wednesday morning, although Messrs. John Brown, and Cairns, Morse, Hart & Co. had raised their wages to \$1.33 per day, the laborers refused to work, and drove off the teams and teamsters, and also threatened to break the machines employed in excavation, if work was not stopped. The machines had accordingly to be removed and all work is now suspended.

ROSES.—There was something pathetic in the position of the German florist, who, in the bitterness of his heart exclaimed: "I have so much trouble with the ladies, they come to buy mine roses, they want them hardy, they want them double, they want them fragrant, they want them nice gouter, they want them everydays in one rose. I hope I am not yet you calls one uncallant man, but I have somethings to say to do, ladies, 'Madame I never often see ladies dat 'as beautiful, dat 'as rich, dat 'as good 'temper, dat 'as young, dat 'as clever, dat 'as perfection in one ladies. I see her much now."

It was not only a sacred rite and custom of the semi-civilization mound-builders, but is still practised by the Hydash Indians of Washington Territory. This tribe, having recently lost one of their number, prepared a funeral pyre of wood, on which the body was placed. An aged female stood near with a bottle of liquid, supposed to be whisky, from which she filled a glass at intervals, and threw the contents on the flames, "for which she would give utterance to dismal death-song. This burning of the dead is only practised by the Hydash when away from home, and to prevent the body from falling into the hands of hostile tribes.

PAYMENT OF MEMBERS.—The House of Commons, in private session on Thursday, discussed the question of paying the indemnity and mileage allowance of members who attended the prorogation of the House on the 13th of August last. It is understood that the best authorities were in favor of the legality of these payments, and that the Government will bring down a sum in the supplementary estimate accordingly. The sums due will, it is assumed, be payable to all gentlemen who attended the House on that memorable occasion, although some of them are not members of the new Parliament.

THE threatened horrors of the Indian Famine promises to be more than equalled in Asia Minor. Unfortunately, the Turkish Government cannot borrow money by the million to feed starving people—and probably would not if it could—like the British rulers of India. In the town of Angora alone—the ancient Ankyra where Paul preached to the Galatians—the deaths are said to number 100 daily. For a city whose population cannot exceed 50,000, this is a fearful rate of mortality to start with. The cause of the famine is probably the same as in Bengal—the failure of the early harvest from drought. As the telegram adds that the Tigris is now swollen from heavy rains, the latter harvest will probably be abundant. During the three months to come, however, there is time enough for the ghastly ravages of the last Persian famine to be repeated in Asiatic Turkey.

FACTS FOR THE CURIOUS.—If a tallow candle be placed in a gun and shot at a door it will go through without sustaining any injury; and if a musket ball be fired into water, it will not only rebound, but be flattened as if fired against a substance. A musket ball may be fired through a pane of glass, making a hole the size of the ball, without cracking the glass; if the glass be suspended by a thread it will make no difference, and the thread will not even vibrate. In the Arctic regions when the thermometer is below zero, persons can converse more than a mile distant. Dr. Jamison asserts that he heard every word of a sermon at the distance of two miles. A mother has been distinctly heard talking to her child on a still day across water a mile wide.

JOURNALISTIC FEAT—OR FEET?—A despatch from New York says:—A foot race of ten miles from Thirty-eight st. to Jerome Park, took place this morning between James Gordon Bennett of the *Herald*, and John Whipple, resulting in Bennett's winning, in 1 hour, 46 minutes and 55 seconds. The wager was \$3,000 a side. Large sums of money changed hands on the result.

A lawyer in Bucyrus, Ohio, stated at a temperance meeting that, having seen his father killed by the carelessness of a drunken man, he took a solemn oath never to drink again. "Since that time," he continued, "I have never broken my oath, at least not very much."
