It is rather difficult to describe the various appliances without linustrations. The generators, as they are called, are of various shapes and sizes, dependant upon the use for which they are designed, they include appliances for treatment of the arm, shoulder, elbow, hip, leg, knee, spine, stomach, feet and whole body. They are made entirely of aluminium, which renders them light and easily handled. The first charge against us was that we had transferred cargo in United States waters without first en-tening at a custom house. This was based on the fact that we had our hatches off when seized, a perfectly na-tural occurrence when it is considered that we had been through a gale during which our cargo had shifted. To my own knowledge, not an ounce of cargo was transferred in Port Etches, or in any other United States waters. Seeing that




