

THE LOCAL HOUSE.
Mon. Mr. Hardy's license Resolutions Under Debate.

In the legislature yesterday Mr. Hardy's liquor license resolutions were discussed at length. The object of the resolutions was to increase the revenue from this source \$96,000 to \$200,000, an increase of \$104,000. This would be effected by adding \$60 to the price of tavern and shop licenses in cities and lesser amounts in towns and townships. The government, he contended, had the right to regulate the amount of fees, even if the dominion act were valid, but he had no doubt that it would be declared invalid. The premier referred to the hostility of the dominion government in relation to come to any mutual arrangement in regard to the controversy. He had written to the Ontario authorities asking them to abstain from interfering with the question until a decision might be got from the privy council. Sir John Macdonald, however, refused to do anything further than honor the receipt of the communication. The premier said under the circumstances he would be justified in passing any legislation that would prevent the dominion government from keeping the country in the state of confusion into which the two acts threw it. The rest of the evening was taken up in a desultory debate in which nothing was decided.

Arrests in the Crown Lands Improvement Fund.

A deputation composed of twenty-seven reeves and deputy reeves of this province waited on Mr. Mowat and Mr. A. M. Ross Monday with respect to the crown lands improvement fund. Mr. O'Connor introduced the deputation. An order in council was passed in 1877, providing that one-fifth of the receipts from the sale of crown lands should be returned to the municipalities for to be applied on the roads. In 1861 the order in council was revoked and another issued for the same purpose in 1867 by the provincial government. In the interim between 1861 and 1867 certain moneys were received on account of lands sold prior to 1861, which the government of Old Canada did not pay to the municipalities or to the provincial government, and which now remains a charge against the dominion government. The object of the deputation was to induce the provincial government to advance at least the principal which amounts to about \$120,000, pending a settlement with the dominion government. The extent to which some municipalities are concerned may be judged by stating that the township of Oroy has \$48,510 due on this account for principle alone, after deducting 6 per cent for management. It is stated that another township's claim amounts to \$10,000 for principle. The matter will receive attention from the government.

Disposed of at Last.

A long-pending trial was disposed of by Judge Boyd yesterday. On Jan. 18, 1883, F. D. Brown, a contractor, and four of his workmen were charged in the police court with forcible entry and detainer. H. L. Hime was the prosecutor. The defendant broke down a gate and carried bricks and mortar through Hime's property to construct the addition to the office of the Evening Canadian. The case was fought in two civil courts at Osgoode hall, and Hime won each time. The action in the police court was of a criminal nature, and Mr. Denison sent the five defendants for trial. Yesterday Mr. Brown pleaded guilty through the lawyers to forcible entry and was fined \$5 by Judge Boyd. The charge against the four workmen was not pressed, and they were acquitted.

City Matters Before the Legislature.

Before the private bills committee yesterday Mayor Beavert, Ald. Turner and City Solicitor McWilliams appeared to promote the bill authorizing the city of Toronto to institute an issue of corporation stock for drainage works. A number of prominent ratespayers appeared, including Messrs. Manning, James French, Martin McCole, Ald. Hall, R. Reynolds, with their solicitor, Charles Durand, appeared to oppose the bill. After some up with the Mayor withdrew the bill. The committee then took up Mr. Clarke's bill concerning the Toronto city sewerage works, the expropriation of lands for public use, the perfecting of the water-works, etc. The bill was allowed to stand over till next Friday.

The Female Book Agent.

When the Manitoba legislature meets it is the intention of the attorney-general to move that the dominion license act be adopted by that province in its entirety as the provincial act, and if this is done it is one does away with all conflict of authority between the two acts, inasmuch as parties fined under the provincial act are also fined under the dominion act, and vice-versa.

THE OLD WORLD IN BRIEF.

The steamer Bertha collided with the bark Amelia at Gibraltar, and nine persons were drowned. Great stagnation exists in the shipping interests upon the Tyne. Over 100 vessels and 1500 men are idle. A small body of Chinese soldiers assailed several Europeans at Shanghai. They were wounded with bayonets. The Cork traders have decided to take part in the funeral of Jerome Collins of the Jeannette expedition. Seventeen of the crew of the bark Trinidad from Pensacola, report that they abandoned the vessel in a waterlogged condition Feb. 24. The captain and remainder of the crew refused to quit the ship. The funeral of the late United States Minister Hunt took place at the American chapel at St. Petersburg yesterday. The Russian ministers, diplomatic corps, court officials and resident Americans were present.

At Philadelphia yesterday, John McGinnis was hanged for the murder of his mother-in-law. Two thousand persons met at the Cooper Union, New York, last night, to celebrate Emmet's anniversary. SLAVERY IN CHINA.

Barthless Capture of Boys and Girls-The Cruel Fate of Rebel-Infamous Markets of Hong Kong. Male slaves in China are few compared with females. The former are descendants of ghebs captured in war, while the latter, with the noblest sacrifice have voluntarily sold themselves to perpetual bondage to save their parents and families from penury and death. Some horrible disclosures have lately been made of poor wretches kidnaped and sold into perpetual bondage. One of these wretches, a Chinese named Ho, had been degraded and punished. Perhaps the most horrible cruelty is that described in the columns of a Chinese newspaper four or five years ago. The story is hardly credible, and is too sickening to linger over. The bad facts are these, that in some inland provinces, where a blue light is shown, their bodies are compressed, the head is allowed to grow at the expense of the body to abnormal proportions, and when the body has grown it is released and exhibited in Chinese circuses as the latest importation from the East. It is said that many die under the process, while the majority become imbeciles.
