

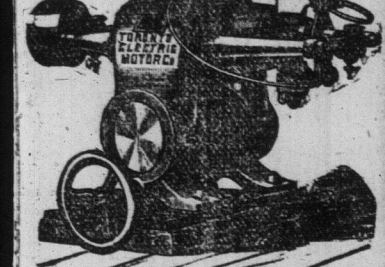

HOUSE MAY MEET NEXT MONTH

Mr Mackenzie Bowell likely to meet Parliament before appealing to the country.

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Ottawa, Jan. 22.—There was no meeting of Council to-day, and consequently there is nothing to do at the meeting of Parliament.

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AN INCREASED SUBSIDY.

Manitoba Gains \$300,000 a Year by the Re-adjustment.

Ottawa, Ont., Jan. 22.—Attorney-General Sifton and Treasurer McMillan have been asking for an increase of the Provincial subsidy, on the basis of 200,000 people.

The Provincial Ministers got an official reply from Mr. Foster, stating that the Government will not agree to pay an increase on the subsidy on the basis of 200,000 people.

At the last election Sir Edmund Leachman was elected by 4170 votes, defeating Mr. H. Empey, Home Ruler, who received 3500 votes.

In this election Mr. Empey is again the Liberal candidate and he is supported by the Conservative Party.

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SHOT DOWN IN BROOKLYN STREETS

The Military Open Fire on the Rioters—One Man Killed—No Prospect of a Settlement.

Jan. 22.—Mobs of violence continued in the presence of troops in Brooklyn to-day. Troops fired upon the mobs to-night. The 7000 men of the First and Second Brigades had not restored order, and the Third Brigade had been notified to be in readiness to proceed to the scene of the strife short notice.

The car companies made some progress toward resuming traffic. More cars were run on the lines which have been opened for two or three days, and two new lines were opened. In one case troops and police lined the route for blocks and shot at people in windows who threw missiles, and the other troops, A. charged with the duty of keeping the cars in the hands of the mob. Both these affairs will be reported to the court.

Lighted disturbances were reported from various parts of the city. There were only a dozen arrests in all. The Mayor has issued an additional proclamation as follows:

Whereas the mobs which have prevailed first in this community, must be respected by all and must be ordered upon all occasions if it is to be maintained as a law-abiding city.

The situation grew more serious during the day. To-night the outbreak was most serious. The breach between the striking employees of the trolleys and the company has been widened by the day's work.

Master Workman Martin J. Connelly in the afternoon, and a marked feature of the rioting was a peaceful assemblage of workmen, seized their papers and walked to the scene of the disturbance.

The militia admit throwing out a column of soldiers for two blocks from the Broadway and Broadway in his face for two hours, while the cars were operated by the trolley company. They deny being looted and papers.

Fifteen flames who were on strike of the trolley company in the day were ordered back to work by Connelly, but when he heard of the affair at Olddollar street, he would all the lines to quit work in the morning.

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Laurier Has No New Policy

The Liberals Stand on the Old Platform—No Change of Direction.

Montreal, Jan. 22.—The Liberal campaign was opened by a meeting in this city to-night, at which nearly 8000 people were present to hear a speech from Mr. Laurier.

The Windsor Hall was packed to overflowing, and long fully occupied. The doors had to be closed, and many people were unable to gain admittance.

Mr. Laurier, Sir Oliver Mowat and Mr. Patterson appeared on the platform and they were greeted with tumultuous applause.

Among the other prominent Liberals present were: James Sutherland, M.P., B. E. H. M.P., and Mr. J. G. Marchand, leader of the Quebec Liberals.

Mr. Laurier, who was the first speaker, said he believed that English history was today fully repeating the same drama which was played in Canada in 1898.

At 9.30 o'clock yesterday morning Archibald Levitt, aged 19, was taken to the General Hospital in the ambulance. He is the nephew of the Agricultural College at Guelph, and had arrived in Montreal from his home in Caledonia, Que., intending to proceed to Guelph.

The injuries he sustained consist of severe lacerations of the face and neck, and a body. No bones were broken, but his wounds are of a very painful character.
