Earthquake Horror in Italy.
A VILLAGE OF 1,300 INHABITANTS OBLITERATED.
Rome, Nov. 18.—Liguria and the whole province of Calabria in Southern Italy were violently shaken by an earthquake last evening. There was much damage and many people were killed. Troops have been sent out to help the families driven panic-stricken from their homes.
Reports of the disasters are meagre, but suffice to show that there was great loss of life. Proscopio a village of 1,200 inhabitants in the Reggio di Calabria, was obliterated. Virtually all the buildings were thrown into ruins. The number of deaths is not known. In one church 47 persons were buried alive under the walls. The last authoritative report was that the list of dead is well above 60.
In another village of the same province eight persons were killed outright by falling buildings. The damage to property is enormous. Troops and officials are going to the relief of suffering districts. King Humbert sent several donations from his private purse.
The province of Reggio di Calabria suffered most from the earthquake. Several towns in the adjacent provinces of Calabria and Basilicata were shaken severely. In Tripoli 20 buildings were laid in ruins and several persons killed. Mileto and Cassano were shaken to the ground, but the teachers and pupils escaped a few minutes before the action.

Colonial Expansion.
London, November 14.—Flora Shaw, a prominent Australian, read a paper at the Colonial Institute in London on "Colonial Expansion." She contended that the prosperity of the colonies depended upon the prompt development of steamship and electric cable services, retraining and encouraging the demands of the Ottawa conference.
The Times, commenting upon the paper, says that it is true that the colonies are rapidly expanding, but it is no less true that they are extremely deficient in means of communication with the mother country. It remarks that the superiority of an international system of shipping trade implies a relaxation of existing tariff duties, and that colonies will assuredly discover themselves in a very short time, and will take steps to bring the change about.

China Will Not Accept.
Shanghai, November 18.—It is rumored Japan minimum demands are the surrender of the Chinese port, and the payment of an indemnity of \$125,000,000. Japan to hold Port Arthur, Wei Hai Wei, and the Formosan ports until the indemnity is paid. There is no prospect of China assenting to such terms.
London, November 17.—A correspondent at Peking says: The Chinese fleet is at Wei Hai Wei. It is a formidable force of Chinese gunboats, and the Chinese fleet is preparing for battle. Colonel Hanseken, commander-in-chief of the Chinese army is organizing a force of Chinese soldiers to fight against the Japanese and threaten their communications in the north.
