Letter For Tidings.

Dar Sisters

When the thermometer is ranging bound in the winters I think you will

much to expect a letter especially when I remember that the last one I wrote never reached you. It left in time but Mrs Smith wrote me that it was delayed en route, so did not reach Amherst in time for Feb. Tidings so was left out in the cold. This one is starting off hot enough so I hope it will make good passage and not share the fate of its predecessor.

The days and weeks are passing very quickly and we hope that ere long the monsoon will be here. Now we long for it. The lives of so many people depend on the rains or rather the crops that follow. We in Chicacole have very much to be thankful for not the least being our ability to sury on the plains and continue our work uninterrupted throughout this trying season.

As I was looking over my diary this morning I thought perhaps you would like to know how I spent our hottest So I am going to try and show you the Chicacole work as I see it. Every morning soon after six I go out and stay until the sun drives me home. Herriman has been my daily companion and together we have tried to make the religion of Jesus Christ real to these people.

They seem willing to believe the facts and say yes we know this is the true way, but to make a personal ap plication to their own lives is what we with me that it is almost too they do not seem ready to do;

the conversation gets too personal they generally remember something they forgot to do or that it is time they were at their cooking. They are atraid of the truth. I have a very good ii-Instration of this in Arsaville. I had a little school among the children, but when Mr Archibald tried to buy land and settle a preacher among them to preach and teach they made a great time and so far have prevented his getting any land. My children have been scattered but after the scare subsides a little I expect them back again. I have two nice little Sunday Schools, one on Sunday morning and the other in the evening. The children are getting along very very nicely, they can sing several hymns and answer quite a tew Bible questions. White I am teaching, the big totks stand around and show quite an interest in the les suns.

The Bible Class that I have had since the first of the year among the Sudra women has not been so well attended lately as the people are so busy going to weddings. They give great dinners and teast for ten days after each wedding. We went to one wedding and stayed ad night to see the whole performance. I wish I had space here to tell of their fantastic dress, torchlight procession, the arrival of the bridgeroom on a white horse. the wedding ceremony, etc etc. will tell you one thing that will be a surprise viz. Until the ceremony was more than hall over the bride and groom had never in their lives seen each others face or exchanged words. He was about twenty-live and she ter. The bride was so loaded down with jewelery that she complained of the weight. Many of the women present had anywhere between two and six hundred dollars worth of lewelery on. Such a waste of money but to have lots of jewels is their greatcat ambition. Some in my class seem very much interested and I enjoy the hour a week spent with them very much indeed.

Two of my Bible women who are

here at the station have not been able to do any work for some time. One has a ittle boy a month old and the other. a little girl born on the Queen's birth Herriman and I have visited tourteen virlages besides the town work during May and I see by my diary that I have made seventy-eight visits dur ing the month. We have found some especially interesting cases and we do pray that those who seem so near the kingdom may have the courage to I will tell you of one come out. woman that I want you to prav especially for. She has said for quite a while that she is believing and since my last talk with ner I teel convinced that she is converted. I have invited her many times to church and she would like to go but her husband ab iects. Last week he said it any of the other women went she might go so Sunday morning when I called there she was air ready but I could not get another won.en to go so she had to stay home.

Her husband always makes it a point to get away when he sees me coming so I have never been able to meet him. When she could not go to meeting we sat down and had a little meeting together. I read to ber about Christ's baptism and pointed out to her that it we wished to be His eniidren we must follow his example. I then prayed with ner asking the Lord to show her his will and help her to do it, after praying I asked her to read pray, and in a few short sentences she have told the Lord that she was a great this sinner but that she believe He had died to save her, and that she felt lie tad torgiven her.

It will be hard for this woman to one leave her home and friends but we stops teel that they cannot be christians and steep remain in heatheman so we uige when Sisters will you Now their coming out. pray that the Holy Spirit may so work in her that she may have the strength to give up att and tollow Christ. I must give you one item of good news before I close we have had the pleasure of welcoming our Lady Apothecary, Mrs Huffton to Chicacole.

Already she has been called to seviout eral cases in the town. t is

in a very few days she hopes to be ining settled and ready for full work. of co.
