And, through the whole book, many wrongly—divided syllables, left as exercises for younger students, for whom it will suffice to divide syllables according to sound.

**Desiderata which the book "English Accentuation"  
intends to supply.**

- 1st Short, easy rules, for the accentuation of English words, with chief exceptions.
- 2nd Simple, comprehensive data for the correct pronunciation of almost all English words—about three hundred thousand :
- 3rd An extensive list of English words coming from foreign languages, with figured pronunciation, and accent.
- 4th An easy, infallible rule to pronounce correctly the double *th*.
- 5 A graded system of vowels and consonants; the latter, arranged systematically; the former, with their twenty-five regular sounds, and chief exceptions.
- 6 A double work on mute vowels and consonants; two lists of principal irregularities.
- 7 Through the whole book, a general transition from easier to more difficult matter, by means of asterisks, and of varied type, showing what beginners should skip at first; what should come afterwards. The beginner learns his letters; then he spells and reads easy words; the more advanced student exercises himself on harder or rarer terms; the scholar in Sciences, Philosophy, Theology, finds therein his rules for the generality of technical expressions in which these difficult matters abound.
- 8 Figured pronunciation of syllables, and sufficiently abundant accent. Conventional signs, few, and not fatiguing to the eye, afford one an opportunity of detecting the finest distinctions of sounds, the most delicate shades of English pronunciation.

- Modern spelling, according to the highest authorities, is treated of.
- 9 A review, without signs, of a great many things already studied enables one to judge of his progress.
  - 10 The exceptions given in small type, distinct from the rest, to help both eye and memory.
  - 11 Some pages of practical exercises for analysis, distinct pronunciation, and spelling.
  - 12 Only five rules for the accent; Illustrations, to show the simplicity and comprehensiveness of the rules.
  - 13 Moderate prices. One book of less than a hundred pages, destined to be complete for all purposes of spelling and reading.
  - 13 The possibility of obtaining in a few months more knowledge in accentuation and in reading than in twenty years without rules.

**(FOR TEACHERS AND ADVANCED STUDENTS).**

Philological Associations of England and America, assisted by the Spelling Ref. Association, all of them containing a great number of recognized authorities in linguistic science, in England, Canada, and the U. S. of America,—have given rules and limitations, for the dropping or changing of useless vowels and consonants—Accordingly, when no trouble arises thereby:

I

**ARE DROPPED:**

- 1st a, from ea, sounding e short.

Ex.: feather, leather, lead, leaven, leavened, etc., are equally well written:..... fether, lether, led, leven, levened, etc.

2nd e, or ue final, when silent:

Ex.: are, have, sieve, catalogue, prologue, league, colleague, etc., may be written: ar, hav, siv, catalog, prolog, leag, colleag, preventiv, preventivly, manacl, oracl, risn, changeabl, changeableness, etc.; chemical words: chlorin, bromin, i'odin, fluorin, cä'sein, albumin, bro'min, chlor'id, bromid, sulfid, ni'trid, paraffin, etc.

3rd u, in final our: hon'or, val'or, Saviour, behavior, parlor, etc.

4th u, after g, when useless; and in pure English words: gauntlet, guard, guess. guarantee', etc., are equally well spelt and written: gantlet, gard, gess, garantee', gar'anty, gest, gilt, guilty, etc.

5th t, in tch: catch, latch, patch, watch, watched, fetch, fetched, etc., may be written:... cach, lach, pach, wach, wacht, fech, fecht, hicht, etc.

6th gh, when silent: though, through, furlough, *not* borrough, *nor* thor'ough may be written: thô, thru, furlo.

## II ARE CHANGED:

1st o, or ou, into u, in words requiring that sound:

Ex.: come, love, dove, above, tongue, rough, tough, etc., may well be written: cum, luv, duv, abuv, tung, ruf, tuf, luvabl, dubbl, trubl, etc.

2nd d, or ed, to t, when sounding t:

looked, locked, docked, tipped, dropped, etc.  
may be written: lookt, lockt, dockt, tipt, dropt, flockt, blockt, etc.

3rd gh, ph, tof, when pronounced f:

enough, laugh, laughter, laughable, phase, phrase, etc.  
are written:..... enuf, laf, lafter, laf'able, fase, frase, fotometer.  
frenology, fiebotomy, filosofy, trof, etc.

4th s, to z, when sounded z. Ex.: abuze (v.), use, uze, usual, or uzual, aivize  
adviz'abl, surprize', advertize, premize', exercize, demon'etize, etc.

5th Double consonants, to single consonant, when second one is useless:

Ex.: bill, pill, battle, cattle, rattle, nettle, settle, pontiff, bailiff, Finn, will, etc.  
= bil, pil, batl, catl, ratl, netl, setl, pontif, bailif, Fin, wil, etc.

## III NO REFORM ADMISSIBLE:

When trubl could arize thereby; 6 cases:

1st When a different pronunciation would result:

Ex.: plag, vag, ag, bog, bal, rol, dol, pul, etc., do not sound the same,  
as plague, vague, ä'gue, bögue, ball, roll, doll, pull, etc.

2nd When too strange a word would be produced:

Ex.: acer, for, acro, ledg, wedg, sledg, casq, etc., for ledge, wedge, sledge, casque, etc.

3rd When a useful distinction would be lost:

Ex.: *dost*, and *dust*; *son*, *sun*; *none*, *nun*; *bomb*, *bum*.

4th When the root of the word or its history would be destroyed:

Ex.: *nun* for *none* (no one); *dun* for *done* (do).

5th When the word could not be easily recognized;  
or when there would be equivocation:

Ex.: *rite* for *write* or *right*, or *wright*; *nee* for *knee*; *noc* for *knock*,  
*bum* for *bomb*. All these words received different meanings.

6th In words of foreign languages, when not sufficiently anglicized:

Ex.: *fatigue*, *intrigue*, *Pontius Pilate*.

N. B. If one has not the list of the few thousand reformed words adopted  
by the scientific Associations of England and America, one  
must be very prudent in that spelling reform-matter.

Page H: 13rd line, add: *alder*, *alderman*, *aldern*, *alderny*, *Algaté*,

Page 70, U long commencing a word, is in some respect

Exc.: *u*, of negative *un*; of prepositions *up*, *upon*; or before *x*.

These lines may have been true when written, over forty years ago.

Are they true now? This small book pretends to give the answer, in five Rules, no more; and in Illustrations with few exceptions.

### \*\* Important Observation:

Many foreigners experience trouble in pronouncing "th." Yet it can be learnt in two minutes, and it is impossible to mispronounce it, if one has no great defect of tongue, and does what follows:

— B —

**\*\*\* Rule for the Th :**

Apply the extremity of the tongue to the inside tip of upper teeth, separated from lower teeth, and try to pronounce the first half of the sound Z<sub>e</sub> for "th" soft, or the first half of the sound S<sub>e</sub> for "th" sharp, then, quick as lightning, remove the tongue from the teeth, and pronounce the rest of the syllable.

**EXAMPLES :**

Z<sub>e</sub>, modified by the teeth, + ē = thē; + āt = thāt; × ūse = those.

S<sub>e</sub>, modified by the teeth, + īck = thīck; + īn = thīn; + istle = thistle.

\* Teachers should never allow a bright boy, or any one in general, to give to *th*, the sound of *d*, *t*, *s*, or *z*.

It is sheer negligence on the part of the pupil : supposing the teacher teaches properly.

For, then, *Th* is pronounced right, no matter how hard one tries to mispronounce it.

## EXPLANATION.

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\* Likely more than one half of all the knowledge required to read English properly... consists in being able to distinguish the accented syllable. The syllable that precedes, and the one that follows the accent, are considerably obscured. It is often impossible to distinguish the vowel by the sound. The displacement of the accent alters sometimes both the meaning and the sound of the word, as for instance in minute, conjure, august, instinct, compact, acad'emy academ'ic, academic'ian.

With rules well understood and applied systematically, one can make, in the accentuation, and consequently in the reading of English, more progress in a few months, than without rules, in twenty-five years.

First are given general Rules: four Rules for purely English words, and a fifth one for foreign words, only partly anglicized. Probably over two hundred thousand words are included in these Rules; in fact, about all the purely English words existing or likely to exist in a proximate future time. Therefore this book is intended to give as much experience in reading as ten big books in-folio could. Then follow Illustrations, that is Explanations, to cause the Rule to be better understood, to exercice the eye, as well as the ear, and render the accentuation almost ins-

tinctive, even for foreigners, and in a short time. After that, the exceptions, and in some cases, the chief exceptions, are indicated. They are comparatively very few; sometimes, one in a thousand words.

This is so true, that people with a poor memory or a slow ear, could neglect these exceptions, and still accent properly over ninety-eight per cent of all purely English words.

The work terminates by a general Review to better imprint the Rules on one's mind; to permit analysis, and to render accentuation quasi infallible.

\* The Teacher should insist on having the explanation given by the Student in respect to the accentuation of words, when profit can be derived thereby. The Student should write either on the blackboard, on a slate, or a slip of paper the mispronounced word, and indicate the orthoepic signs. The eye is nicely trained, and the ear's power, egregiously increased. All illustrations are not of equal importance. Special signs \* (asterisks) indicate that relative value.

Generally, it would be better for the teacher to exercise the pupils on a few Illustrations, and to require them to get ready to read the same without fault in the Review.

The columns of that Review should be read, horizontally by beginners; vertically, by the others.

The numbers correspond to the same numbers in the body of the book.

There are a few exceptions, to drill the pupils.

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## RULES OF ACCENTUATION.

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\* **1<sup>st</sup> Lemma.**—All polysyllables receive one accent; compound words, and long words may receive a second one called secondary accent; very long words, three accents. The secondary accent follows the same rules as the primary one.

Ex. *Con'stitūtional'ity, An'thony's-fire'*.

Monosyllables take an accent when there is a special reason, for instance, to strike the imagination, for showing emphasis, energy, etc.

Ex. I want not' to read', but' to speak'; oh yes'. I do' wish it.

\*\* **2<sup>nd</sup> Lemma.**—The accented syllable is pronounced more forcibly, is conspicuous among the others; it aims at keeping the sonority for itself, and it renders the accompanying syllables rather obscure and comparatively insignificant. The student should be trained to analyze syllables, to indicate where the accent should be localized, and why; he should be compelled to pronounce obscurely obscure vowels.

The eye is soon trained to it, the ear is drilled; the whole thing appears natural.

\*\*\* **Rule 1<sup>st</sup> or Rule A.** The root of the word, and the sonority of syllables have a great influence on the position of the accent. They settle the accent if no other rule prevents it. Moreover, all the other Rules refer more or less to this one. Ex. *abōut', renōwn'*.

The following Corollaries are very important. They train the eye to recognize syllables that are obscure, or, at least, syllables which reject the accent.

**Obs. 1.**—Syllables less, ness, ous, and many others, are short when accompanying obscure syllables: obscure, in other cases. Examples: cārē'lessnēss, fair'nēss.

**2.**—The aforesaid final syllables generally are not taken into consideration, when computation is made of syllables, respecting the accentuation. Example: rā"tio is a dactyl; rāt"ional does not count any more than ratio. It is worth a dactyl; rāt"ionalism, and rāt"ionally, would be worth dactyls just the same as rā't"io, and follow rule B.

\* In Latin words, sometimes the vowel of the accented syllable, and always the long vowels are pronounced long in English. Letter I final is always long in these English words.

Examples: Āli'bi, fi'eri-fā"ciās; nōlle-prōsequi, ālijās, acū'men. Words from other languages will also have Illustrations.

In Continental languages, a, e, i are generally pronounced: a, as a; in māt or a in fat'her; e, as e in mēt, or a in māte; i, as i in pīn or e in miēn.

## RULES:

\*\*\* **1<sup>st</sup> Rule A.**—The root of the word, in a few cases, and the sonority of syllables, in almost all cases have the greatest influence in respect to the placing of the accent.

When there is no other Rule, they decide finally.

\*\*\* **2<sup>nd</sup> Rule, Rule B, or Rule of Dactyls.**—The English language is fond of Dactyls, or quasi-Dactyls, that is, of an accented syllable followed by two unaccented syllables. Ex.: cāth'olīc, prōt'ēstant, gēnt'lēman, ād'inj'rāl, rēf'erēnce, rār'ifȳ, sōl'ēmnize, cēl'ēbrāte, māsc'ulīne, dēfic'ient.

A word of many syllables will therefore be dactylic of this kind, when no rule forbids it.

Likely more than 80,000 words are in this Rule.

\*\*\* **3<sup>rd</sup> Rule, Rule C, or Rule of position.**— The penult is accented when it ends by a consonant followed by another consonant belonging, or seeming to belong to the next syllable.

Examples: cōmmit'tee, ūnivér'sal, preven'tive, inspec'tor, rebut'tal.

Over forty thousand words (40,000) are likely included in this Rule.

\*\*\* **4<sup>th</sup> Rule, Rule D, or Rule of Verbs.**—Verbs, prepositions, and words formed from prepositions, take the accent as near as possible the end of the word.

Other words take the accent as near as possible the beginning of the word.

\*\*\* **5<sup>th</sup> Rule.**—English words from foreign languages, still retaining the color of their origin, generally keep the accent they had in the foreign language.

If they are French words, they almost invariably take the accent on the last syllable.

If they are Latin words, they never take the accent on the last syllable, except a'men', which takes two accents.

ILLUSTRATIONS OF THE FOURTH RULE.

It is in this Rule that the Corollaries receive their fullest application. Verbs and Prepositions must have the accent the nearest possible to the end of the word.

But there, why would not the accent be always on the last syllable? Corollaries forbid it.

A few illustrations will suffice: Let us take the third Corollary: Words ending in ace. They cannot take the accent on that final, because "ace" is obscure, or it rejects the accent, unless the

other syllable be still worse, more obscure or more opposed to the accent. This opposition seems, *on some occasion*, to depend on symbolism. It will be the same for the whole list of the Corollaries.

**Observation.**—When Verbs take the accent on the first syllable, nouns or other parts of speech written as the verb, evidently take the accent on the same syllable, according to Rule the 4th.

Ex. Pröfit, verb; will give pröfit, noun: pröm'ise, verb, gives prön'iise, noun.

The same rule holds good for nouns or other parts of speech, taking the accent on the last syllable. Then, of course, the verbs spelt alike, are accented on the last syllable.

Ex. fînânces', noun, gives evidently fînances', verb, according to rule the Fourth.

### COMBINATION OF THE FOUR RULES.

But will there not be confusion between those rules?

They are of easy application. Let us analyse one word.

Let us take for example : *inhēr'ence*. This word comes from *inhere*, a verb, which by Rule 4th must have the accent as near the last syllable as possible.

The final "*here*" is sonorous, therefore, it takes the accent according to 1st Rule. Second Rule has nothing to do with it, because 2nd Rule requires a dactyl only when no other rule interferes. Third Rule has nothing to do here, because we have not two syllables, the one finishing, and the other commencing by a consonant. The fifth rule has nothing to do here, because the word is purely English in form. We consequently have to mind, *for the word inheritance*, only the first Rule. But by the first Rule, it takes the accent on the syllable "*here*" of the verb "*inhēre*" from which it comes, and we have *inhē'rence*.

That first rule applies to almost all derivatives. The exceptions are generally necessitated by harmony or symbolism, and they are so few, that people deficient in memory or in hearing, would not lose much by not minding these few exceptions in regard to thousands, and tens of thousands of words following the rule. Many exceptions, fruit of negligence or ignorance, are destined to disappear.

**Conclusion.**—In derivatives, the accent tends to be on the same syllable as in the primitive, according to Rule 1st.

Examples: *děp/récāte*, *děp/récatory*; *peruse/s*, *peru/sal*.

B has only one sound, but C has three sounds: S, K, Z

Ch is naturally pronounced tsh : charm, chastity, etc

\*\* Ch is pronounced k in Latin, Greek and Hebrew words.

Therefore, for those who do not know Greek :

F is pronounced v in of, and in words ending by preposition of: thereof, etc.

G is hard before a, o, u, h; it is generally soft before e, i, y,  
except in the following words and their derivatives—almost  
all Anglo-Saxon.

It is equally nasal when these letters are followed by a rich suffix, called corollary, in this book. (See Corollaries: er, or, ur, ish, le, ry, tion, etc.)

\*\* Th is soft at the beginning of the twenty (20) following words :

Than, that, the, thee, their, theirs, there, them, then, thence, these, they, thine, this, thither, those, thou, though, thus, b̄hv.

\* Th is generally sharp at the end of words, except in many verbs, ending chiefly in "the," and in the plural of many nouns. Ex.: Brēath, sharp; brēathe, soft; bāth, sharp; bāthe, soft; bāths, laths, oaths, mouths, pāths, soft.

\* Are soft: booth; verbs mouth, teeth, bequeath, sēthe, brēathe, and others in "the."

\* Th is soft in the middle of many words, specially : bother, fother, fathom, farthing, farther, farthest, gather, lather, lather, other, father, brother, brethren, mother, smother, tether, thither, hither, murther. nēther, hēather, hēathen, fēather, lēather, togeth' er, wēather, whēther, wither, clothing, clothes, (klōthz, or clōz), northern, northerly, southern, southerly (sūth' ern, sūtherly), withal', worthy.

\* S is sharp at beginning of words: sō, safe, sōurce.

\* S=z in as, has, is, his, was (wōz), whereas.

\*\* S=z in general when euphony requires it, and nothing forbids; therefore :

1st S=z: between two vowels:

Ex.: Jesūs-Christ, daisy, devise, pesade, resist, phaze, phrase, pose, oppose, rose, prose, prosn' ic, premise', devise', advise, etc.

2nd S=z between a vowel and

a consonant other than c, k, f, p, ph, r, t.

Examples for 2nd: S between a vowel and a consonant other than c, k, f, p, ph, r, t.

S=z: prism, palsy, wisdom, cosmetic, prismatic, empasm, husband, huswife (hüzif), Mars, measles, Lisbon, lamb's wool, clæanse, discern, tansy, observe, mistletoe, (because t is mute), kinsman, Osnaburg, Wolsey, etc., and by exception: possess (pozzess/), dessert/, hussar/, hussy, dissolve, gossan, discern/ment, etc., etc.

Exc.: S=s although between two vowels, and a special consonant, in:

- \*\* (a): absorb, caseine, case'mate, casf'no, creosote, crusade, dense, tense, desinence, casus, crease, Lü'siad, nos'o..., morose',  
\*\* base, debase, embase, bias, case, encase, cease, decrease, increase, lease, garrison, loose, loosen, mason, muslin, dose, the'sis, basement, basil'ica, basil..., basijn, basis, pusillanimous, pusill...,  
\*\* desolate, else, erysip'elas, esu'rient, magnesite, Peg'asus, pleurisy, presage, presbyōpia. desiderate, desultory, recluse,  
\*\* ransack, ransom, resource, response, rinse, translate, vaseline;  
\*\* in final syllables in sis; sive, sal; sol, sor, after a consonant; and in words of foreign languages: nisi, quasi, osī'ris, pī'solite.

- \*\* 3rd S=z, at the end of words, after a consonant other than c, k, s, f, p, ph, t.
- \* Ex.: bids (bidz), tins, lens, legs, dens, loves; but bits, tips, sticks, phonographs, etc., have a sharp=c, according to Rule : S is sharp after c, k, f, p, ph, t. Nature wills it.
- 4th S=z: S has a tendency to be soft=z, after two vowels: pease, peas, boys, toys, teas, beaux, (bōz).
- 5th X=z: in the beginning of words; Ex.: xyst=zist.

**Observations:** — 1° In many words which are now verbs, and now not verbs: when verbs, they have s soft=z; otherwise, s sharp.

Ex. abuse, confuse, close, mouse, louse, house, grease, profuse, refuse, diffuse, etc.

Exc. muse, carouse, spouse..... have always s=z.  
obtuse, douse, souse.. ..... have always s=s.

2° Real prefixes, that is: Prefixes joined to a word having its own meaning and retaining it; do not change the sound of the word.

Ex. reserve (to spare) keeps s soft=(reserve'). But re-serve (serve anew) is pronounced as if in two words, with s sharp. The same for other prefixes: ab, dis, mis, pro, pros, etc.

Ex. re-sell, re-sign (sign anew), but not resign (give up), resound (sound anew), but not resound (give back the noise); dissolution, absolution, absolve, pros'ody, pros'elyte, pro-si'phon.

Exc. disease (diz.) disaster, dismal, dissolve, resolve, and der., but in dissolution: s is sharp, according to Rule.

\*\* N. B. Rules seem numerous: but a good ear will easily supply most of them; because they are generally based on harmony and good sense.

C. S. or T=Sh or Zh in words ending in sion, tion, tia, tiate, sier, zier, ceous, cious, tious, sure, surate, asuist, ssue, sual, cial, icie, ecie, cian, ciate, sient, tient, etc.

\*\* N. B. (Gen.) Sound Sh after a consonant; zh.... after a vowel.

C before n, t, z (initial): Cnidae, Czar, ctenophora, ctenoid, cnemial, cnidaria, Czarina, Czarowitz ; besides: indict', victuals (vít'tlz), etc., and deriv.

Ch before th: Chthon'ic, and besides in drachm (drăm), schism (sîzm), yacht (yöt), fuchsia.

d in Wednesday (wenz'dy), soldier (sól'jer), handsome, handsel, handkerchief, feldspar, feldspath.

Woronicz (vorō'nic), von Wrangel (fon vrang'el, Swedish); von Wrangell (fon vrang'el, Russian).
