WAS GARLAND POISONED? UPON A CHARGE OF MURDER.

The Mysterious "Lizzie" on the Stand

BEFORE CORNER YOUNG.

Witness Brings a Second Woman Into the Peculiar Case.

THE HEIGHT OF INTOLERANCE.

There are a large number of people in Toronto who desire Sunday cars, people who are willing to pay the regular fare for their use, who think the company ought to pay the regular percentage of its Sunday receipts to the city. There is another section of our citizens who do not desire Sunday cars, who consider it sinful to use them, who think that Sunday cars drive the people to drink and into immorality and crime, and yet the second class makes bold to say that if Sunday cars are run the fares on them ought to be less than on week days, that the existing mileage agreement does not cover Sunday cars, but that an additional mileage ought to be paid by the company to the city, and that it will prevent those who wish Sunday cars from having them. Every British city in the world of the population of Toronto enjoys the regular facilities of cheap transit on Sunday, as well as on weekdays. In all these cities cars abstain from using them; they do not seek, however, to interfere with the liberty of their fellow-citizens by putting up bogus objections. Fifteen thousand bicycles can run on Sunday, every private vehicle in the city is free to serve its owner for transit, and every public conveyance is subject to hire, but the deadly and immoral street car of the poor man, of the weary, of those who are compelled to acts of ministration and mercy, on Sunday, of those who must get about on Sunday, and of those who, let us add, regard Sunday cars as a genuine blessing, must be put down at any cost. There is no such equal intolerance of the poor and of the honest as that of the wealthy as that of Hon. S. H. Blake and the hypocritical daily press of Toronto in this matter. And yet we will soon have Sunday cars just as they have in Montreal, in Hamilton, in Niagara Falls, at St. Catharines, Windsor, St. John, Halifax, Vancouver, and even in Dundas.
