LUMBERMEN AND USED

Canada For Canadians Seems to Be The Motto. RESTRICT EXPORTATION OF SAWLOGS

Is What They Have Asked the Government at Ottawa to Do.

Of course John Charlton, M.P., whose Lumber Interests Are in the United States, Was on Deck, Backed by Mr. W. C. Edwards, M.P., of the Ottawa Valley, to Oppose the Resolution Moved by Ald. Scott, Seconded by Mr. John Bertram, But the Member for Michigan Was Voted Down—There Was Some Hot Talk Among the Lumbermen—Canada Can Look After Herself and Secure Better Markets Than Those of Uncle Sam.

The present condition of the lumber trade is a source of much speculation to those engaged in the business, and, in order to find out where they are at, a very large gathering of lumbermen took place in the Board of Trade building yesterday, in response to a circular sent out a few days ago by the secretary of the Board.

CHAINED OF EMMA ORR.

Chain of Circumstantial Evidence Being Slowly Forged

Galt, Aug. 19.—(Special to The World.)—Day by day the mystery of the Emma Orr murder is apparently being cleared up. Day by day the chain of circumstantial evidence connecting James Allison, the hired boy, with the murder grows stronger.

Stalker Disappointed Them. Great expectations were built up on Robert Stalker's evidence, but they failed to materialize. He swore that he had recently been denied by Emma Orr, and was working at Pentland's building, a driving shed, on the morning of the tragedy.

Alex. Allison Took a Fit. The excitement over the case was heightened by a rumor set afloat during the afternoon that Alexander Allison, the father of the prisoner, had attempted to commit suicide by taking strychnine, as he manifested symptoms of acute poisoning.

ROYAL VISIT TO IRELAND.

Enthusiasm for the Duke and Duchess of York.

THE PROCESSION IN DUBLIN

Was Heartily Cheered—Visit to the Show of Textile Industries.

His Royal Highness and Lord Roberts of Kandahar to be Invested with the Order of St. Patrick Amid Full State Ceremonies—Next Week the Duke and Duchess Will Go to the Horse Show and the Leopardstown Races.

Dublin, Aug. 19.—The popular enthusiasm over the visit of the Duke and Duchess of York to Ireland is unabated. Their Royal Highnesses were again the recipients of warm ovations to-day at the opening of the exhibition of Irish textile industries, and during their visit to the Horticultural Show.

The procession through the main streets of Dublin was heartily cheered. To-morrow there will be an investiture of the Order of St. Patrick in St. Patrick's Cathedral.

Seattle, Wash., Aug. 19.—The steamship Alki, which arrived in port yesterday from Skagway and Dyea, brought the following letter to the Associated Press:

Skagway, Alaska, near Dyea, Aug. 4.—Twelve Canadian customs officers have arrived here and will establish a custom house at the portage between Lake Bennett and Tagish, a point by which all Yukon or Klondike travelers must pass if they start from Dyea.

It is idle to argue that there is no serious feeling between the Americans and Canadians. The newly appointed collector for Alaska, Mr. Ivy of Oregon, who has been here for some time, is in telegraphic communication with Secretary Gage prior to sailing from Seattle.

Washington, D. C., Aug. 19.—The United States Government and the United States have previously agreed on the operation in augmenting the postal facilities for the Klondike region, and the result will be a substantial doubling of the mail service from the coast into that district.

Canada's proposition for carrying the mails, one round trip a month, between Dawson City and Dyea, was accepted this afternoon by acting Postmaster-General Schellenberger, and the Canadian Government was notified of the action.
