



THE BEET SUGAR INDUSTRY.

The growth of the beet-sugar industry is one of the marvels of Europe. Gery portion of them at as early a date as many, which in 1884 produced 1,147,000 possible. tons of beet sugar, in 1894 produced 1,800,000 tons, an increase of 57 per cent. 
