WAR FORMALLY DECLARED

Washington, April 25.—(6.30 p.m.)—The President has signed the resolution declaring war against Spain, which was rushed through the House yesterday in less than two minutes. The declaration is as follows:

Be it enacted, etc.: First, that war be, and the same is hereby declared to exist and that war has existed since the 21st day of April, A.D., 1898, including said day, between the United States of America and the Kingdom of Spain.

Second, that the President of the United States be and he is hereby directed and empowered to use the entire land and naval forces of the United States and to call into the actual service of the United States the militin of the several States to such extent as may be necessary to carry this Act into effect.

New York, April 25.—(Special to Toronto World.)—A London special says Our treaty requires Portugal, war having actually begun by decree of Spain, to order to sea the Spanish fleet lying in wait at Cape Verde Islands for the Oregon, or else seize and hold it to the end of the war. The beginning of war for international purposes, has been construed by Great Britain, which makes it the hour when Spain delivered his passports to General Woodford, and this decision is in strictest agreement with the principles applicable to the case, and cannot successfully be appeled from. Should Portugal not make the demand on Spain, she ceases to be neutral, and becomes a belligerent, to be dealt with accordingly. Should Spain refuse to comply with the demand, Portugal has no naval force to enforce the demand, and by her impotence ceases to be a free nd independent nation, and is practically a protectorate of Spain's for all purposes of war.

GRAIN EXPORTE RS WORRYING. Grain exporters are beginning to worry. Practically no charters have been made since early Saturday last, and dullness reigned the supreme feature to-day. The rate of insurance continues climbing, and is now almost prohibitory. Unless the war with Spain is of brief duration, dealers express the opinion that there will be a bad famine in many European countries. Exporters fear also that Spain will seize grain in neutral bottoms.

. MR. SHERMAN WAS AGITATED.

Washington special to World: Mr. Sherman attended the special Cabinet meeting, and from his demeanor the impression gained ground that he had reconsidered his determination to resign. The President requested him to remain when the members wr leaving, saying he had matters of importance to discuss with him. After ten minutes conversation the Secretary came down with the President and was visibly agitated. He drove to the State Department and mmediately sent his resignation to the President, who accepted it instantly. Mr. Day has accepted the position. •

Yesterday witnessed another phenomenal advance in the grain markets of the world. At Chicago May wheat reached \$1.20, the highest point since 1888, when "Old Hutch" engineered the famous \$2 corner. The net gain for the day at that point was 6c per bushel, while at Minneapolis and Duluth prices leaped up 8c. The advance is attributable to a decrease during the past week of over 3,000,000 bushels nn the American visible supply, but more especially to the Spanish-American war, which threatens to stop the flow of food supplies from this side of the water to Europe, and this gives rise to a speculative demand in Liverpool. Additional strength is lent that market by the increased requirements of France and Italy, and by Russia's withdrawal of all offerings. Wheat yesterday rose an extreme 6d in England, from 10 to 30 centimes at Paris and 50 centimes at Antwerp. As compared with a week ago May wheat is 11c dearer in Chicago, 11d dearer in Liverpool and 1 franc' 5 centimes dearer in Paris. Provisions have advanced in sympathy and at Chicago pork is \$1.95 and lard 37c higher than on Monday last.

The stiffening in the price of food supplies is already felt locally. Flour is 50c a barrel dearer than a week ago, and Toronto bakers will at once advance the price of bread. Montreal bread makers have already added 2c to the cost

Another local effect of the war will likely be seen in higher house rents, for the prospect is that a very large number of Americans, especially from the Atlantic coast cities, will take up their residence in Toronto until the war blows over. Canadian summer resorts will also doubtless benefit by the desertion of American watering places the coming season.

Stocks are not showing much activity. Both Wall-street and London exhibited weak tendencies yesterday, as did also the Canadian exchanges.







She carries four twelve-inch, eight eight-inch and six four-inch guns in her main battery; has four torpedo tubes, fifteen inch armor, and carries 36 officers and 469 men. As compared with H. M. S. Majestic and British vessels of that class she is 30 feet shorter, 1,000 to 2,000 tons less displacement, fires a lighter broadside and has 200 less men.



In the old days a wooden ship would be almost shot to pieces before she would sink. Her masts would be gone, her sails dragging over the sides,her hull full of holes, and yet her sailors would have time to escape. The modern ship, all of steel and almost solid with machinery, needs but a gentle stab from a ram, and if her compartment doors are not closed, goes down in a few minutes. It is not to be surmised that these points have not been thought over by naval officers. Many defects have been remedied, but the element of danger still exists to an abnormal degree. It must also be remembered that since the formation of modern navies as we know them, there has been no great naval battle to demonstrate the virtue or defects of the system. The nearest approach to a battle between modern ships was the hattle of Yalu, between the Japanese and Chinese, and her, though there was hardly the semblance of an organized battle, the damage done was almost something beyond the conception of the Auevrage landsman. In the battle of Wehlal Wei which followed, a Chinese iron clad and a cruiser were sent to the bottom in less than 20 minutes by torped boats, which demonstrated very practically the small margin of safety there is in a modern battleship.

A maval battle of modern times is any to be as hard on the victor as on the vanquished. The derangement of machinery combined with the damage done by guns of great penetrative power will be apt to make a modern sea fight a duel to the death, the poor victors crawling home as best they may, little better off than the fee they whipped.




