MEETING OF CITY FATHERS

Ald. Ten Eyck Took the Chair Because Mayor Teetzel Was Busy With Political Affairs.

ALD. HOBSON HAD A COMPLAINT. So Had Ald. Morden—Various Municipal Matters Discussed—General News.

Hamilton, Ont., Oct. 29.—(Special).—The City Council met to-night and despatched its business with more celerity than was anticipated when the meeting opened.

Who the Board of Works report was under discussion Ald. Hobson complained about the slowness of the permanent road work. He also wanted the city to get the money said to be owing to it for work done by the Street Railway Company, by suing for it, along with the other suits pending concerning the street repairs.

Ald. Morden complained about the poor electric light service, saying that if the new lamps were not to be made satisfactory they should be replaced by the old lamps.

Later in the evening Ald. Morden, supported by Ald. Kerr, moved that a return be made to the Council at its next meeting respecting the number of electric lights used, their candle power, and the cost of the same.

Ald. Findlay thought this should come before the Board of Works, but the return proposed this, and the report will be presented to the Council.

House of Refuge Furnace. The House of Refuge Committee report, recommending the Burrows, Stewart & Milne furnace for the house, was agreed to, with very little discussion.

The Sewers Committee recommended that the sewers to be constructed on Kinsdale avenue, Princess-street and Barton-street be built by contract and not by day, as some scheming aldermen wanted. Engineers Wingo recommended that course and the Council approved.

Fire and Water Matters. Ald. Dixon asked of the Fire and Water Committee report a resolution ordering a building in the waterworks yard and nominally used by the Board of Works, be transferred to the Fire and Water Committee.

Ald. Findlay protested, and the matter was referred to the board.

The Finance Committee report came up with its recommendation that \$80 be paid for a typewriter bought for the City Solicitor's office. Ald. Walker and Neiligan moved that the bill be paid by the City Solicitor.

The aldermen were more generous respecting the account for \$10 for a telephone extension in the Solicitor's office. It was four months ago that the bill was granted toward the expense incurred on the welcoming of Hamilton's returning South African.
