

He said the cost at Baby's Point of a rubble concrete dam, faced with ashlar 925 feet long at top and 510 feet at bottom, 134 feet high, would be \$1,060,200. The cost of installing an hydraulic electric plant of 6000 h.p. gross (480) h.p. net), and transmitting the same seven miles to the centre of the City of Toronto, would be \$191,900, or a total of \$1,252,100. To this would have to be added for engineering, legal and other expenses, \$187,900.

The Engineer does not state land dam ages, or the cost of the reconstruction of railway and highway bridges or roads.

Tha cost of the Weston dam, he says, would be \$300,000, in addition to the dam at Baby's Point. This dam also would be rubble concrete, faced with ashlar 500 feet long, at top, 430 feet at bottom, and 30 feet high, including tail race, valve-house, valves, pipes, etc., \$360,000.


