Mr. Mowat moved in the house for the plan proposed by the reform convention, and Mr. Mowat seconded the motion. It was defeated by a majority of 10. The next day he moved for the Queen's University. It was again defeated by a majority of 10.

In November, 1884, Mr. Mowat retired from politics for a time. He was Vice-Chancellor of Upper Canada. But he had not even begun the long political career by which he became known. In 1872 Edward Blake, having defeated Sandfield Macdonald and formed a new ministry in Ontario, desired to devote all his attention to the Federal arena. The successor he wanted was Oliver Mowat and Mowat stepped into the breach and once more entered into the strife of politics.

From Oct. 23, 1872, to July 9, 1880, he held the Premiership of Ontario without a day's interruption. He carried the first general election, 1873-1875, 1878-1880 and 1884. The first important question with which his administration was connected was the settlement of the boundaries and of the legislative authority of Ontario. Here the practical difficulties became involved in a long conflict with the Federal authorities—the struggle for provincial rights, as it is known.

The head of the Federal government was Sir John A. Macdonald—Mowat was chief of the Ontario government for 40 years. By the time Mr. Mowat had succeeded in forming a government of great strength, of which the leading members, besides himself, were Messrs. Pardee, Fraser and Hart. The defence of the territory and autonomy of Ontario gave the government a reputation for fighting policy, which had the effect of opposition. Mr. Meredith, a man of great ability and personal magnetism, was his party friend at Ottawa. The most critical and exciting period of his administration was the question of ownership of the minerals and timber in the disputed territory, such as the control of liquor licenses and of certain streams on which important industries were dependent.



GERMANY NOT SURPRISED. Berlin, April 18.—Canada's imposition of a surtax on German goods was seemingly not unexpected in ministerial quarters here, where the step is not regarded as changing the trade relations to a great extent, since Canada has recently only been buying such articles from Germany as were not obtainable elsewhere. The preferential duty accorded to Great Britain already had placed Germany at a disadvantage. Nothing is likely to be done by the German government, as it is recognized that it is nothing more than might have been expected from Germany's exclusion of Canada from most-favored-nation treatment. General Secretary Charles Dold of the Piano and Organ Workers Will Also Be in Toronto.



BARR'S MUTABLE MANY TROUBLE OVER BAGGAGE

Threats of Raid on Baggage Tents Responded to By Warning That Police Would Shoot.

Winnipeg, April 19.—(Special).—The Rev. Mr. Barr met with a decidedly cold reception on arriving at Saskatoon tonight. No crowd had gathered to greet the prime mover of the big immigration scheme, and not a cheer was given until he reached his tent, when a few belated "hurrahs" were given by a small number of colonists.

Wouldn't Pay for Tents.

Many of the newcomers to-day took possession of the tents they had purchased and refused to pay the dollar demanded by Barr's agents, while a few paid under protest. The non-payment of baggage caused much trouble, and threats of raid on baggage tents were freely made. Impelled by the situation, Barr called a meeting, and asked the colonists to consent to his signing a blanket release for all baggage and distribute it himself. Some objected, and Barr in tactless speech told the crowd if the raid was made that the mounted police would fire upon the crowd.

Prairie Fires Threaten Camp.

"Don't be afraid your baggage will be stolen," said Barr. "Canadians will not steal it, but I don't say that for our Englishmen. We had thieves amongst our party. Things were missed on shipboard. The thieves were more, more shame to them." Despite these remarks the crowd kept its temper.

Prairie fires threaten the camp, and a party has been organized to fight

them, provided the necessary supplies are nearer camp. Because of the non-distribution of baggage many were forced to sleep on the ground. They have rubber blankets yet, tho they were purchased from Barr.

The journey westward may not commence until next week, and the

colonists are short of money, and are selling rifles and other superfluities.

as had Sir Oliver Mowat in dealing with the affairs of a great province."

Words of Old Friend.

Hon. James Sutherland, who sits in the Dominion house for what was Sir Oliver's old riding North Oxford, looks back on a long personal friendship with the dead statesman.

Mr. Sutherland says Mr. Mowat was "one

of our greatest Canadians. He was always progressive, tho his temperament was conservative. His history, unblemished, and it will not be his lot to be forgotten."

Sir Wilfrid Laurier expressed himself

to the World and said that it was not his habit to give an interview in relation to the death of a public man. However, he said that Sir Oliver Mowat was a warm personal friend of his, and who he would like to see in love. He said that when Sir Oliver Mowat left the cabinet of the Dominion it was against his desire, and that he retained intimate relations with the deceased by correspondence and chats up to a few days before his death.

Hon. David Mills.

Hon. David Mills paid a feeling tribute to his late friend's career, and in his associations with him in matters of education, and in the Dominion Advertiser, was frequently called to Toronto to consult with Sir Oliver on political problems, and had found him holding enlightened views, which he expressed with a cautious regard for what was right. As a lawyer Sir Oliver was able, large-minded and well informed, especially on all questions regarding the interests of the Dominion and the provinces, and he was well located a distinct loss to Canada and mark the separation of the past from the present.

Mr. Mills, who was a member of the

Legislative Council, and was a member of the late parliament of Canada, and a father of Confederation. He was essentially a lawyer of the first rank and has closed an honored career in the full enjoyment of the unqualified confidence and respect of his fellow men."

Ottawa, April 19.—(Special).—W. T. J. Lee and J. G. O'Donoghue were in the city today, but left for Toronto to-morrow. They came to size up the situation regarding the proposed amendment to the Label Act, which has been passed. It has been proposed that a label be brought to bear on the government of the bill introduced into the Senate.

BERMUDA ACCEPTS POSTAGE PLAN

Ottawa, April 19.—(Special).—Sir William Mulock has received an acceptance from Bermuda of his proposition presented some time ago to place the island on the same footing as the Dominion. The new arrangement will go into effect a week from to-morrow. At present Bermuda is ruled by the Postal Convention, but after April 27, she will be a part of the Dominion of Canada. All the colonies have been asked to come into this position, but so far only Great Britain, the Bahamas, Bermuda and Bermuda have replied. These three have accepted.

CUBA IS PROGRESSING.

Montreal, April 18.—(Special).—Sir William Van Horne, chairman of the Canadian Pacific Railway and president of the Cuba Company, arrived here this morning by the Rutland Express from New York after spending nearly two months in Cuba.

When seen at Windsor station, Sir William said that Cuba had entered upon what he believed would prove an era of great prosperity—the fruit of the wise policy that had been adopted, and the reward of the suffering that had been undergone. The railway was now in full operation, and the expectations that had been framed with regard to traffic were being realized.
