Wanted Religious Teaching. Professor Cayen Moved for it in the General Assembly—Wheat Average in Manitoba Increased. Winnipeg, June 16.—(Special).—At the morning session of the Assembly to-day Principal Cayen moved a motion on religious teaching. He did not wish the public schools to teach the doctrines of Protestantism or the spiritual aspects held by all the evangelical churches, but it was possible to have a line of Bible teaching such as that in the old Irish schools, which gave diligent and useful summaries of Biblical doctrine to which no Christian, Protestant or Roman Catholic, could object. It was possible also for the children to memorize considerable parts of the Bible. BEHRING SEA COMMISSION. Had a Session in Montreal Yesterday. MESSRS. KING AND PUTNAM Heard Arguments at the Court House, Judge Wurtelle Being Present.

Hon. F. Peters and Hon. Don M. Dickinson Were the Leading Counsel and They Had Able Assistants—Sir Charles H. Tupper Was Present to Watch Certain Private Interests—After Some Argument the Commission Adjourned to Meet at Halifax—Beland said: Israel Barnett Says He is a Brother of Barney Barnato.

Montreal, June 16.—(Special).—The Behring Sea Commission met at the court house this morning, the Court of Appeal having been placed at their disposal. Mr. Justice Wurtelle of the Court of Queen's Bench occupied a seat beside the two commissioners, whose names are the Hon. George E. King, judge of the Supreme Court of Canada, and the Hon. William Putnam, judge of the United States Court, Portland, Me.

The counsel appearing before the commission for Her Majesty are: Hon. F. Peters, Q. C., Premier of Prince Edward Island; Mr. F. L. Beland, Q. C., of Montreal, and Mr. E. V. Bodwell, of Victoria, B. C., for the United States; Mr. Lansing of Watertown, N. Y., and Mr. Charles Warren of Detroit. Sir Charles H. Tupper, Q. C., M. P., a member of the House of Commons, and the secretary of the commission is Mr. Richard Cartwright, chief clerk of the Fisheries, Ottawa. The chief clerks of the commission are: Mr. J. C. Clay of Portland, Me., and Mr. Thomas P. Owens of Ottawa.

The session was taken up with the hearing of arguments on a motion presented by the Hon. Mr. Dickinson, who desired that certain evidence bearing upon the question of the United States territory be repeated to-morrow and Saturday evenings.
