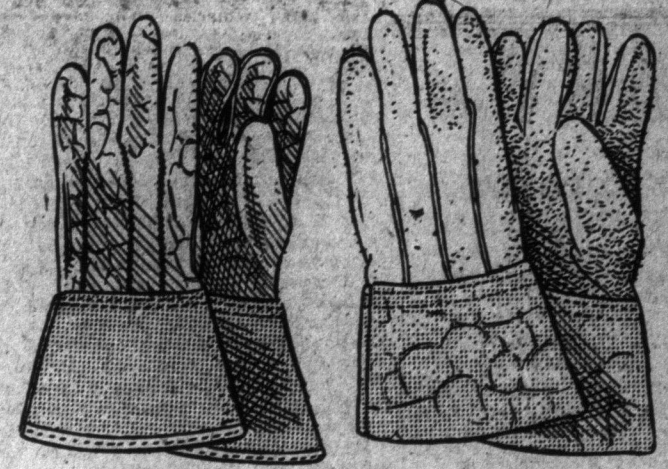

### SEAMEN RECOUNT ENEMY ATROCITIES

Why British Sailors Cannot Associate With Germans at Stockholm.

### CITES HUN MURDERS

Havelock Wilson Issues Document on Some Recent Piratical Doings.

London, Aug. 14.—Havelock Wilson, seaman, today issued a document, in which he stated that the National Seaman's Union, in a statement prepared for the Associated Press today, gave the reasons why British seamen cannot fraternize with Germans at Stockholm, or anywhere else.

The document is an account of recent sinkings of British vessels in which German submarines fired upon open boats or otherwise savagely mistreated the hapless crews. It was explained that no attempt had been made to make a complete list, but that examples had been selected more or less haphazardly, to illustrate the reasons for the attitude of the seamen and firemen's union towards parties with the enemy. The first instance picked out was the already familiar case of the British

ship Belgian Prince. The statement says: "The Belgian Prince was sunk by a submarine July 21. The lifeboats and survivors were thrown into the sea after being deprived of their lifebelts. Forty men were drowned."

"The British steamship Kildale was sunk April 12. Fifteen shells were fired at the boats while they were pulling clear of the ship, killing one seaman."

"The British steamship Westminster was sunk December 14. The boats were severely shelled by the submarine, the captain and mate being killed."

"The British steamship Evestone was sunk February 3. The submarine's guns were turned on the boats, firing shrapnel shells, fragments of which swept both boats, killing the master, steward and three others, and seriously injuring the second officer."

"The British steamship Addah was sunk June 15. The submarine fired on the master's boat, killing eight men. After the boat had been sunk and the men were swimming about in the water, the submarine again fired shrapnel shells at them."

### SMALL BRITISH LOSSES IN PAST TWO WEEKS

Total for First Fortnight of August Not Twenty-Two Thousand.

London, Aug. 14.—Reports of British casualties issued during the first two weeks of August total 21,722, officers and men. They are divided as follows: Killed and died of wounds: Officers, 222; privates and non-commissioned officers, 4424. Wounded or missing: Officers, 1821; men, 15,254.

London, Aug. 14.—"Our raiding parties entered the German lines last night northeast of Gouzeaucourt and at two points east of Vermelles, securing a few prisoners," says today's official announcement. A number of the enemy were killed and his dugouts were bombed.

Washington, Aug. 14.—American labor will be supplied for harvesting the Canadian grain crop, under an arrangement reached today between W. W. Cory, Canadian Deputy Commissioner of the Interior, and department of labor officials.

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TO RELEASE MEN BUT PAY NOTHING

City Council Decides That Government Must Pay Harvest Help.

MUST SAVE THE CROPS

Cost Would Only Amount to Twenty Thousand at Most.

While Toronto, in response to the call of the Ontario Government, is willing to release hundreds of its employees to aid the farmers in saving the crops it is not willing to pay the difference between the cost pay and that paid by the producers of the soil.

Following a conference with the representatives of the government, the board of control reported to the council that the province would not pay the difference to the civic employees; it would pay only to its own.

It was contended that the city would not lose any money if his motion carried, but on the contrary would save a considerable amount.

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According to Controller Cameron the city was to blame for the depreciation of the farms. He had drained them of their labor.

THRIFT EXHIBITS AT EXHIBITION

Government to Make Special Feature of Food-Preservation Demonstration.

The Ontario Government exhibit will make a rather radical departure from exhibits of previous years at the Exhibition. Formerly the idea was to interest the stranger in the agricultural possibilities of the province, but this year the display will appeal both to the city man and the farmer.

There will be five large booths, or information bureaus, in the government building, one devoted to live stock and veterinary science, another to grain and roots, another fruit and vegetables and another to the care of less miscellaneous will be handled by the O.A.C. dealing with fertilizers, drainage, bees, weeds, insects and plant diseases.

In the centre there will be a large booth, 50x12, devoted entirely to thrift. Here there will be canning and meat curing demonstrations, and an exhibit of food and food substitutes, including the menu of the Exhibition, made of bran and wheat, corn and wheat, rolled oats and wheat and barley and wheat. The grains and roots in the field crop competitions will be placed along the back of the booth.

In addition there will be a large exhibit in the dairy building devoted to demonstrations dealing with the uses of milk and cheese and the production of milk and cheese on the farm.

The Northern Ontario exhibit will be housed in the main building, and will be representative of several new Ontario districts present to explain the various displays.

The Women's Thrift Association and other local organizations, together with the women's institutes, are co-operating with the government in the food and thrift exhibit.

After lingering in doubt for many weeks, the Canadian National Exhibition Art Commission has been assured that the French collection is now on the way to Toronto.

FOOD RESTRICTIONS NOT YET IN FORCE

Few Days' Grace, Pending Order's Appearance in the Gazette.

LUNCH MEN PUZZLED

All Expected to Get Definite Instructions From the Government.

When is an order not an order? When is a mealtier day when it is an offence to serve meat on such a day? Such were the questions that confronted restaurant, hotel and quick lunch men yesterday.

Roast beef au jus, braised short ribs, and right thru to beef stew and beef hash, the menu of most of Toronto's eating places differed not a whit yesterday from any other day in the year.

The proprietors in turn, when interviewed, stated that they had no knowledge of the order, and were not aware that it was an indictable offence to serve beef and bacon.

The food controller was in Toronto yesterday, but was so busy with committee meetings that it was impossible to see him.

"It is in force from the time the order-in-council was signed," replied Mr. Hanns.

Mr. Hanns was so rushed for time that there was no opportunity to enquire further into the meaning of his order-in-council.

Assistant Crown Attorney Hughes, when asked by the reporter for The World, said he knew nothing about the order-in-council.

He informed The World that the enforcement of the order in Toronto would be handled from his office.

Notwithstanding the fact that the order-in-council was not published in the Gazette, or a copy of the order was received here from Ottawa.

An Ottawa despatch stated that the order was not to be enforced until it was gazetted, which will occur at the end of the week.

In consequence the order will not be acted upon until next week by the numerous small quick-lunch places.

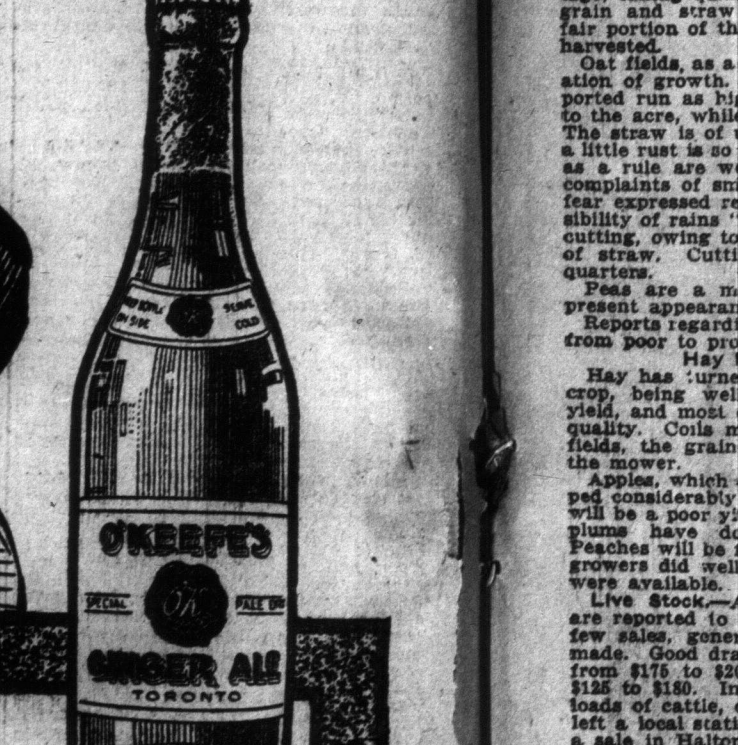

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TORONTO VERY PROUD OF WOMEN'S WAR WORK

Residents of This City Who Are Busy With Belgian Relief Within Reach of the Hun Shells.

Toronto has many women who have done and are doing exceptional work along patriotic lines, but there is no one anywhere of whom other women are more proud than they are of Mrs. Agar Adamson and those who were or are associated with her—Mrs. Irene-Taylor and Miss Margaret Saunders—in the work of caring for Belgian children and refugees at Furnes.

Most since the war started this special work has been carried on with Mrs. Adamson as its directing head. The extent of the labors involved and the responsibilities that came with it can be only gleaned on this side of the water, yet, from letters from the Belgian Government, under which the schools and other benefactions are carried on, and from letters, some of which have humor and pathos most interestingly mingled, sent from time to time by Mrs. Adamson herself, we get some very vivid glimpses of the splendid things being done by women from Toronto.

In a letter published this week the public is given one of the most graphic pictures of the results of a bombardment, yet the plight of the refugees, of whom Mrs. Adamson herself is one, is described so humorously that half the sting is taken from the recital without in the least minimizing the vision of the dangers to which the group of children, nurse and villagers were subjected.

Mrs. Irene-Taylor, it will be remembered, was honored by the King of Belgium with the Military Medal for her many offices, among which was attending the sick, in the course of which she contracted blood-poisoning. Miss Saunders was wounded by a bomb, which killed the girl with whom she was walking. Mrs. Adamson so far has escaped severe injuries, but has undergone many privations during her nearly three years of exceptional work for those whom she took in hand to serve.

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HOME FOOD CONSUMPTION MUST NOW BE REGULATED

Campaign to Encourage Thrift in Use of Wheat Flour Will Begin Shortly.

"Victory is dependent upon the extent of your food service." This is the slogan that is being sent broadcast thru Canada on a card which bears the signature of Food Controller W. J. Hanna.

For a time it will be difficult to understand this. Many will receive the cards which emphasize so strongly the importance of that food is so scarce in the present campaign of world-warfare, without realizing that the statement really means that victory depends upon anything else, the supply of men that we might have at the front. Now, after three years of warfare, it is being pointed out to those who make conditions that food is as essential to winning the war as is the question of money itself.

One of the things that the committee is asking to do will be to lessen the usual consumption of wheat foods 25 per cent. To make this practicable the easiest means suggested itself to our makers of practice and arrangement of the daily menu in such a manner that householders will appear at no many meals on so many days of the week, instead of bread at every meal as heretofore.

The elimination of whole wheat bread from several meals is only one of the ways suggested for the conservation of the food that must be sent overseas to our fighting men of the allies, if they are to keep "it" to do the work for which they have given up so much, and which is dependent upon the means of bringing to a satisfactory accomplishment.

How You Can Simplify Your "Fall Cleaning" Task

HOUSEHOLD HELPS By ISOBEL BRANDS

BEFORE you launch your fall house cleaning campaign take stock of your cleaning supplies. Perhaps there are a few things which you still lack— inexpensive brushes, dusters, etc.

The first step in simplifying your cleaning task is to get the right kind of brushes. There is a wide variety of brushes, and which can be covered with cheese cloth if desired, but it is washable in warm suds and lasts a long time.

Then there is the thin radiator brush, which enables you to get at all the narrow places in the radiator otherwise inaccessible.

Instead of bending down to sweep the dust into the dustpan use the long-handled dustpan, which can be carried on your arm from room to room, and which closes automatically when not in use.

There is also a "button brush" with stiff bristles for brushing fabric chairs, buttons on mattresses, etc. Many excellent varieties of polishing preparations are on the market. If you wish to polish metals quickly without the use of additional pastes or polishes you can get the special impregnated cloths with which to polish either silver, brass, nickel, etc.

There is also a different cloth for each kind of metal. For the extra polish on floors there are several varieties of mops—square, round and triangular. These are all mounted on long handles, so that they can be used under furniture, and consist of fibre mops mounted on the end of a handle. If your floors can be washed with water you can use a mop of this kind.

Another convenient thing is a mop of a pair with a top tray containing separate compartments for soap, cleaners, etc.

Do not forget some protection for your hands when buying your fall cleaning supplies. Rubber gloves are useful. There is also a very cheap hand protector in the shape of cotton "leather" gloves. These are large-fingered and quite strong, and a great protection to the hands when polishing, dusting, etc.

Or you can purchase a specially made "glove duster," which is a square of felt cloth with a stitched hand pocket on it, which keeps the hand completely covered while dusting.

Another permanent help during cleaning is the household tool box. When cleaning it is invariably necessary to repair or change or repair some piece, and it is a nuisance not to have the right tools or right tools, but it is a small, portable household tool box is a small, portable household tool box is a small, portable household tool box.

The perfect equipment of your cleaning supplies will help greatly in making easier fall house cleaning, and perhaps greatly reduce the cost of help. These things, properly bought and cared for, last a long time, and are a truly worthwhile investment.

Secrets of Health and Happiness

Vaccination Against Colds

Now a Scientific Certainty

By DR. LEONARD KEENE HIRSHBERG

If colds are eternally associated with germs, asks one of my witty correspondents, "why not put salt on their tails, snare them, parboil them and prepare them as you do typhoid and other bacteria, which have become vaccines and sure preventives against the diseases they cause?"

This very thing has been done, but not with the awaited and hoped for results. It failed so triumpantly in the instance of typhoid. Nevertheless, it seems to help sometimes, and there is no reason why vaccines should not be tried for "colds." The worst that can be said about them is that they are harmless.

"Man," says a clever scribe, "is a very noble piece of work; is, indeed, king of kings, except at those times when he is troubled with a cold in his head." Perhaps this is not original and harks back to Strabo, Horace, Persius or to the Cymbeline, but it gives a glimpse of a fellow's feelings when he is "cold."

Very Common Trouble. A "cold" in the head has robbed many a man of more things than dignity, comfort and wellbeing. When a real, honest-to-goodness "cold" sets in he is grateful for a good fire, a hot mustard footbath, heavy comforters and an early-to-bed retirement, as well as a long night's sleep.

"Colds" are among the commonest things in creation. If it is possible to vaccinate humans against them and make men immune to these germs, it seems strange that, like fevers and measles, they should return, like a bill you season in and out. "Colds" cling to you and revisit their inhospitable quarters times out of mind. If you manufacture some sort of chemical extractum in your blood and tissues against these unwelcome visitations, their presence may be shortened.

Catching the Bacillus. Somehow or other, either the particular group of microbes which cause "colds" have not been identified or the membranes of the nose, mouth and other respiratory parts lack the stamina, resistance, instinct or capacity to form those curious enzymes or chemical juices which the rest of your anatomy makes and puts on the physiological market.

Your nose or your throat may not be well made or well manned. These have not been paragon of perfection. Often they lack certain essentials which the blood of the human form divine may need to produce a commodity able to compete with and to put to rout the hereditary enemy, "colds."

An American army surgeon has found that a cold in the head is caused by a bacillus which cannot abide fresh air. It moves and has its being deep down

A.—Rheumatism is a carelessly used name given to the symptoms of many different diseases. It is generally used only to mean pain. If you will describe your symptoms closely and precisely and forget this vague term I will try very gladly to help you. I could tell you more than 20 ailments which are falsely called "rheumatism." Dry heat, hot applications, Swedish movements, the electric battery, manipulation and massage may help to assuage the pain while a search is made for the real disease.

Dr. Hirschberg will answer questions for readers of this paper on medical, hygienic and sanitation subjects that are of general interest. 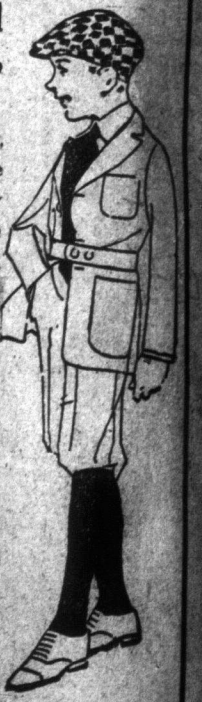
