ITS STATUS DOUBTFUL

OTTAWA, May 15.—The efforts of
the royal commission today were
mainly directed toward ascertaining
what the views of the members of
the shell committee were with regard
to their status, and also what they in-
tended to do with the millions of pro-
fits they piled up on the transactions
between the British war office and
themselves.

Two ex-members of the committee,
Gen. Thomas Benson and Col. Lafferty,
were on the stand, and both stoutly
maintained that there never was any
other idea so far as they know, but to
turn such profits back to the British
war office, and concerning the legal
position of the committee, both wit-
nesses agreed that in the early stages
it was that of trustees for the British
Government. Subsequently, the mem-
bers of the committee, witnesses
agreed, became a little alarmed them-
selves at their legal position.

Both witnesses proved rather hazy
on the financial details of the con-
tracts under investigation, and conse-
quently could say little as to the mean-
ing of the second and third contracts
between the war office and the
shell committee. Colonel Lafferty
gave the reason why he thought

other battleships of the largest type.

WAR SUMMARY

THE DAY'S EVENTS REVIEWED

THE only event of note in the region of Verdun yesterday
was the capture of about 220 yards of trenches on the heights of
the Meuse from the Germans by the French in a swift and sudden
attack, prepared for by bombardment. In the Champagne the Ger-
mans showed signs of coming activity. They bombarded the French
lines in the region of Le Mesnil-Les Maisons de Champagne, and they
then launched several simultaneous attacks with small effectives at
various points. These were either stopped short by the French cur-
tains of fire, or repulsed by counter-attacks.

The trying out of a scheme of attacks by a new method, that of
a series of small, isolated onslaughts, as inaugurated by the enemy in
Champagne yesterday, suggests that the Germans are convinced of
the breakdown of their previous tactics, as employed at Ypres, the
Dnjapac and Verdun, and that they are endeavoring to work out a
new plan of clinching victory that does not involve such a tremendous
waste of life. The German tactical scheme of attempting to thrust
infantry forward to capture positions and to clinch a success was in-
vented by the kaiser. It was realized that this method of fighting
was costly. But the German general staff believed before it began
the war that a complete victory would be won by Christmas, 1914, or
by spring at the latest, and for a speedy victory it was prepared
to sacrifice a great many men.

But never yet has the German system of tactics succeeded. Even
when their artillery could open a comparatively narrow gap in the
Russian lines last summer, the German infantry could do no more
than occupy the "cultivated" ground. Whenever it tried to clinch
the decision with the Russian infantry it was given more fighting than
it could stand. When the Russians would fall back in good order to
a new position, the German infantry had to let them fall back in
good order, and the Russians would hold out till the Germans slowly
brought up their heavy guns. At Verdun the French were fully
prepared for the negating of the German scheme of attack, and the
result is that the German war machine is stalled. With men trained

SLASHING ATTACK
MADE ON CARVELL

Notorious Pro-German Hired
to Trail Hughes, Says Ot-
tawa Journal

CARVELL STRIKES BACK

He Says "Questionable Oper-
ations" Will Be Derved
Into to Limit.

OTTAWA, Ont., May 15.—Comment-
ing upon Frank Carvell, M.P.'s an-
nouncement in parliament Saturday
that the Liberal party engaged Wm.
Travers Jerome to dig up information
in the United States about General Sir
Sam Hughes, the Ottawa Journal, in a
front page editorial professes to be
astonished. The article refers to a
"Mr. Carvell's desperate blunder" and
hints at his lack of patriotism in em-
ploying a notorious pro-German.

Speaking to newspapermen today, in
reference to Jerome's appointment, Mr.
Carvell said:
"I went to Jerome because he was
reputed to be the ablest lawyer in the
United States. No man knew the un-
derworld, as Aillan knew it, better
than Jerome. And Sam Hughes thinks
he can draw the attention of the public
from the questionable operations of his
bosom friends by the references he has
made, he has some more thinking com-
ing to him."

CHEERED BY THOUSANDS.

Mr. Asquith, who arrived in the
private motor car of Baron Wim-
borne, former lord lieutenant of Ire-
land, was tendered a luncheon by the
lord mayor and then had a conference
with about a dozen leaders of the
local commercial community.
The evening session of the con-
ference lasted three hours, after
which a brief official statement was
issued, to the effect that the premier,
at his own request, had met a few citi-
zens, with whom he had a full and
frank discussion concerning the pre-
sent status of affairs. Mr. Asquith
immediately after the conference re-
turned to Dublin by automobile. He
was enthusiastically cheered by thou-
sands of the populace.

OTTAWA'S BIG FIRE
POSSIBLY INCENDIARY

Commissioners Say Proof is Lack-
ing, But Suspicion Remains.

OTTAWA, May 15.—While R. A.
Fringle, K.C., and Judge D. B. McFavish,
the two commissioners appointed to in-
quire into the circumstances connected
with the fire that destroyed the parlia-
ment buildings, are of the opinion that
"there is nothing in the evidence to
justify your commissioners in finding
that the fire was maliciously set off,"
yet "your commissioners are of opinion
that there are many circumstances con-
nected with the fire to lead to a strong
suspicion of incendiarism, especially in
view of the fact that the evidence is
clear that no one was smoking in the
reading room for some time previous to
the outbreak of the fire, and also to the
fact that the fire could not have occurred
from defective electric wires."

ALLIES SETTLE WITH GREEKS.

LONDON, May 15.—The allies have

agreeing not to violate Greek neutrality,

ULSTER'S STAIN
CHECK TO PLAN
FOR DISARMING

Premier Asquith's Visit to
Belfast Has Apparently
Been Failure.

COMPROMISE REMOTE

Ulstermen Evidently as Hos-
tile to Home Rule as in
Past.

BELFAST, May 15.—Stubborn dis-
inclination to accept anything in the
way of a government which might
impair the (future) subjection of Ulster
to home rule was evident today on the
occasion of Premier Asquith's
visit to Belfast, which lasted only a
few hours. So far as can be learned

body of representative Ulstermen was
disappointing.

CASEMENT NOT PUT
ON TRIAL FOR
HIGH TREASON

He and Suborned Soldier
Came Up for Preliminary
Hearing.

LED WIDE CONSPIRACY

Ramifications of Plot Extend-
ed From Germany to
America.

LONDON, May 15, 8:50 p.m.—The
writing of a new chapter of the his-
tory of the Sinn Fein rebellion was
begun today, when Sir Roger Casement,
knighted in 1911 for services to the
British Government, and Daniel Julian
Bailey, an Irish private soldier, one of
his companions on the ill-fated subma-
rine trip from Germany to Ireland,
were placed in the dock of the Bow
Street Police Court for preliminary
examination, on the charge of high
treason.

While considerable testimony intro-
duced by the crown tended to incrim-
inate Bailey, the main attack of the
prosecution was directed against Casement,
in an endeavor to enmesh him
in a net of evidence which would es-
tablish without question the leading
part in it, he claimed, he played the
leading part in the plot.
No Ordinary Prisoner.
Casement himself was the centre of
all eyes during the day. It was evident
that no ordinary prisoner was before
the bar, for, despite the unkempt con-
dition of his clothing, he made a strike
with neatly trimmed beard
and hair brushed well back from a high
forehead, underneath which were the
deeper eyes of the dreamer.

Casement busied himself taking
notes, indicating that he intended to
have a hand in the conduct of the strike.
As the case wore on, began to dis-
play considerable self-assurance. The
prosecution devoting its attention
to showing how Casement carried on
the alleged work in Germany, and
casement's part in the execution of the
conspiracy hatched in Germany.

Expedition Will Endeavor to

MELBOURNE, Australia, via London,
May 15.—Australia will assist in orga-
nizing an expedition for the relief of Sir
Ernest H. Shackleton, the British Ant-
arctic explorer, by supplying officers and
twenty-six men, who will be provisioned
for eighteen months. This announcement
was made today by George Foster Pearce,
minister for defence, in reply to a cable
enquiry from the British Government.

HUN FLEET SCURRED AWAY
BEFORE BRITISH SUBMARINES

German Warships Were Lying Outside Gothen-
burg in Wait for a British Steamer.

TWELVE LIVES LOST
WHEN BUILDING FELL

Nearly a Score of Others Injured
in Akron, Ohio, Disaster.

AKRON, Ohio, May 15.—At least a
dozen persons were killed and nearly a
score injured this evening when the Old
Beacon Journal Building, occupied by the
Crestal Restaurant, collapsed as a result
of a blast of dynamite in an adjoining
excavation.

Seven identified and three unidentified
bodies have been recovered, and two per-
sons now missing are thought to be in the
ruins. A tremendous roar, echoing the screams
of dying people, brought thousands to the
disaster scene, in the heart of Akron's
business district. Instantly the entire city,
rallying under the shock, plunged to the
work of rescue.

A great pile of ruins, broken timbers,
twisted steel and tons of brick and mortar
buried the victims, who a moment before
were dining in the restaurant.
A dynamite charge set off fifty feet
away from the restaurant a few min-
utes before the disaster is believed to
have been the direct cause. The crash
occurred during the dinner hour, when
the restaurant was crowded and when thou-
sands of people were on the streets during
the evening rush.

RAILWAY LOAN
WAS APPROVED
BY PARLIAMENT

Fifteen Million Dollars Will Be
Advanced to Canadian
Northern.

SENATE CANNOT BLOCK

Railway Expected to Be Out
of Troubles for
Year.

OTTAWA, May 15.—The house of
commons occupied today with railway
legislation in committee of supply. It
passed at 6 o'clock the proposed aid
by way of loan to the Canadian
Northern railway of \$15,000,000. All
it wants is the governor-general's
sanction to the supply bill, and that
will be given at prorogation by the
middle of the week. The senate has
no say on items in the supply bill.
This money will be available under an
order-in-council to be drafted later
on giving the government control of
the accounts of the company to which
in his opinion it would be just as well
the money is to be devoted. It is be-
lieved that the relief thus afforded the
company will put things in fair shape
for the next twelve months, allow a
number of improvements to be made,
contractors accounts to be paid and
various services of the line substantially
improved.

GEN. LOGIE GOES TO KAPUS-
KASING CAMP TO INVESTI-
GATE OUTBREAK AMONG
PRISONERS—MORE TROOPS
SENT IN TO QUELL UPRISING.

OTTAWA, May 15.—Major-
Gen. Sir Sam Hughes announced
tonight that Gen. Logie, com-
manding the Toronto military dis-
trict, had gone to the Kapuskasing
internment camp where there had
been an outbreak among the pris-
oners, resulting in four or five
men being shot.

The department had no details
of the occurrence, beyond that the
camp was quiet now, and is await-
ing the report of Gen. Logie, in
whose district the outbreak occurred.

The chief of police at Cobalt stated
over the long distance phone last night
that according to the report reaching
him, four men had been shot during a
riot at Kapuskasing, but it was not
known yet whether they were alien
prisoners or soldiers. Gen. Logie, he
said, went to Cobalt on his way to
Kapuskasing.

The Cobalt Nugget office received
word that several alien enemies had
been killed and several wounded in an
outbreak at the Kapuskasing alien
enemy camp. Additional troops had
passed thru Cobalt, bound for Kapus-
kasing, on Sunday night. It is thought
these were part of the active service
soldiers stationed at North Bay.

NO FURTHER PARTICULARS.

OTTAWA, May 15.—No particulars
have been received here of the serious
fight with the Austrian prisoners of
war at the internment camp at Kapus-
kasing, on the transcontinental in
Northern Ontario, where four Austri-
ans are reported to have been killed
and 15 wounded, while trying to escape.
Gen. Sir William Otter, who has
charge of all the internment camps, is
out of town, and neither the militia
nor justice departments have any in-
formation.

There were about 2000 prisoners at
this camp, and nearly all were Austri-
ans. There has always been more or
less trouble with prisoners trying to
escape, and the trouble is always worse
in the spring.

RUSSIAN ADVANCE

Turks Flee From Column March-
ing on Mosul in Mesopo-
tamia.

LONDON, May 15.—The Russian
column which has just been discovered
as marching on Mosul, Mesopotamia, 300
miles north of Baghdad, is losing no time
in its advance, for it has just taken the
town of Rivandouza and sent Cosacakis
out in rapid pursuit of the fleeing Turks.
The occupation of Rivandouza marks a
considerable advance since yesterday.
The Turks are retreating precipitately
before the Russian columns, and
quantities of war material.
The Russians also reported a Kurdish
offensive launched from the direction of
Diarbekir, and they report the gaining
of valuable results from reconnaissances
in the direction of Mesopotamia.

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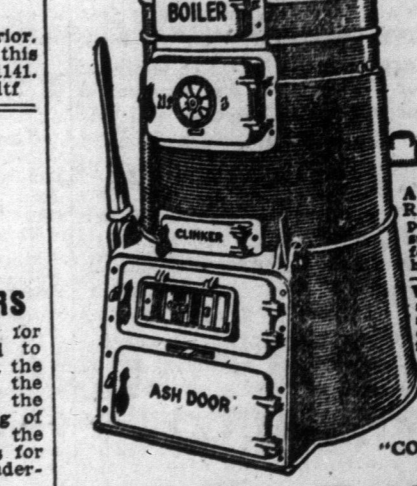

TEN POINT ADVANCE MADE BY M'INTYRE

Market Moderately Active With Good Buyin in Public Favorites.

The market at the Standard Stock Exchange was strong in tone yesterday and fairly active. McIntyre was a leading feature, selling up to a new high at 151, an advance of ten points from the high of Saturday, Hollinger, West Dome Consolidated and Timiskaming were also stronger and active.

Silver reacted slightly again, which had a quieting effect on the Cobalts, with the exception of Timiskaming in the Porcupine Dome. Extension traded at 25 and closed a little better at 26. New York was a big buyer of this stock lately, which may explain its heaviness at the local exchange.

West Dome Consolidated came in for a notable advance, opening at 48 and after setting off a little, sold up to 54, closing almost at the top at 55. Developments on West Dome are shaping up well, and the stock has very strong support of becoming a public favorite.

In the Cobalts, Timiskaming was fairly active, opening at 75 and reacting to 72 1/2. A buying movement set in towards the close, which carried the stock up to the opening price, where it closed strong. The weaker tendency of the silver market has caused considerable liquidation in Timiskaming, but well-informed brokers are anticipating a sensational movement in the stock exchange.

There was moderate activity in Pete Lake, with a little stronger tendency shown by the stock which sold up to 2 1/2 and closed there. McKinley changed hands at a price of 44, from 42 to 47, but lost the gain later. Chambers-Ferland closed strong at 30, Adams was quiet, between 64 and 65.

Mocatta & Goldmaid of London, England, say with regard to the silver market: Such an advance as we have had of 60 per cent, since the 14th of March, is almost unprecedented and can only be accounted for by the almost universal demand for silver coinage and at the same time a diminished supply, for which the troubles in Mexico are partly responsible. No doubt in normal times these quotations would have produced sellers for forward delivery, both speculative and otherwise, but in the absence of any "forward" quotation, this has been impossible, and the market has been dependent on instant supplies, which are by no means over plentiful.

There have been a few bazar orders, but China has remained quiet out of the market, the exchange being much below parity. The price of silver so sensitive to supply and demand it is difficult to anticipate the probable movements, but the upward tendency shows no signs of breaking yet, and the market seems

is healthy now as when prices were considerably lower.

Plummer and Keays says: "It will be remembered that even before the reorganization we advised the purchase of West Dome and the action of the market has fully justified our predictions. We are today even more optimistic on the future of this mine, and we base our opinion on the developments of the property itself, and not on any market 'tip'."

When it is remembered that these developments are the result of only a comparatively few weeks' work the progress of West Dome is surely to be regarded as remarkable.

"West Dome Consolidated will not be in the dividend-paying class for some time to come, but it will soon be a regular producer, and in the meantime the stock is one of the cheapest mines on the list. As a semi-speculative purchase West Dome Consolidated could not be bettered, and we strongly advise its purchase."

MADAME CASGRAIN WILL ATTEND I.O.D.E. MEETINGS

Regent of Vercheres Chapter, Ottawa, is Well-Known Patriotic Worker.
HAS LIVED ABROAD
Sympathies and Activities for Red Cross Cause Make Her Beloved by Women.
Among the prominent women who will attend the meeting of the National of the Imperial Order Daughters of the Empire, which takes place in Toronto this week, will be Madame Casgrain, wife of the Hon. T. Chase Casgrain, postmaster-general of Canada.
She then signed consented to the second contract was drawn between the war office and the four manufacturing members of the committee.
Question Not Raised.
First, she assumed they were to occupy the position of directors of contracts, such as had been instituted in England, and, second, he believed that the sub-contractors through Canada wanted to have their contract with somebody they could hold directly responsible. But witness said the question of who was to be held in the event of profits or losses was never raised.
Col. Lafferty, one of the original members of the shell committee, and now superintendent of the Dominion Arsenal, said he understood the original purpose of organization of the committee was to produce ammunition in the country if possible for the use of Great Britain. He said he remembered very well when an alteration was made in the position of the four manufacturers; it was at a meeting in Montreal. He did not understand that the document they then signed contained them as sub-contractors of Sir Sam Hughes. He believed it necessary to give the manufacturers of component parts of shells some persons whom they could hold responsible.
Would Return Surplus.
"My impression distinctly was," Col. Lafferty concluded, "that the whole committee was to do the best we could for the war office, and if we could save anything out it would be handed back to the war office."
Col. Benson, district officer commanding at Halifax, was the first witness in the afternoon, and his recollection of the facts concerning the letting of the contracts was very high. He told the commission that he was then master of ordnance, and as such had been given a seat on the committee. His duties, too, were concerned with the quality of the munitions rather than with the prices paid for them.
Never Contemplated "Split."
He said it had occurred to him that the members of the committee were legally responsible for any losses, and presumed the inter contract making the four members contractors thru Sir Sam Hughes, with the British war office, was to properly arrange this matter.
Mr. Carvell: Was the distribution of profits ever discussed at a meeting?
Col. Benson: Positively no.
Col. Benson declared that Col. Carnegie and Gen. Bertram endeavored, so far as he knew, to keep the prices of all munitions down to the lowest possible figure.
In cross-examination Mr. Carvell asked witness if he ever had any explanation of why, if all profits were to go to the war office, the second contract between Sir Sam Hughes and the four manufacturing members was drawn up.
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In pursuing the question of prices on contracts Mr. Carvell took up the shells in May, 1915, with the Nova Scotia Steel Company, Mr. Hellmuth objected on the ground that the contract was not under discussion. Mr. Carvell replied that while he would not press the question at the present moment he might as well state his position now. He referred to a ruling given by Mr. Justice Meredith where in he allowed a question concerning an outside contract because one of the component parts was dealt with by the shell committee. His question came under that ruling, Mr. Carvell maintained, and he intimated that he would press it vigorously at a later date.
The commission adjourned to sit tomorrow morning.
