Aside from the wet and dry issues, the biggest fight of the day was centred in the Irish plank. Overruling its sub-committee, the committee threw out the administration plank proposing to leave the Irish problem to the league of nations and adopted in its stead a declaration of sympathy and a pledge to take whatever diplomatic action would be consonant with international comity.

San Francisco, July 1.—Furious warfare over the prohibition plank began late today in the platform committee of the Democratic national convention, with every prospect that it would be carried later to the convention floor, no matter what the committee finally should decide.

The word was passed around that most of the administration chiefs here were content to let the league plank stand as it was when it emerged from last night's stormy committee meeting.

The reference to reservations, added at the instance of anti-administration leaders, was not inconsistent with the stand taken by President Wilson, his managers here believed, nor in conflict with the party's record.

Among the other planks completed during the day was that relating to woman suffrage, he committee after a long argument following the advice of the sub-committee by approving an appeal to Democratic officials in Tennessee, North Carolina and Florida, for quick action on the suffrage amendment.



Ottawa, July 1.—The platform of the National Liberal and Convervative party, founded at the government caucus today, is as follows:

Constitutional.

Firm adherence to British connection in full confidence that Canada will find its ample scope for development, usefulness and influence as a members of the Britannic commonwealth, with the status of a self-governing nation equal to that of the other members. The maintenance of the autonomy of Canada and existing rights and powers of self-government; the approval of the principle that no treaty, understanding or commitment which may involve the empire ought to be undertaken except after consultation and by common consent in the common interest. Approval of Canada's membership in the league of nations and a firm determination to maintain our recognized status as a member of the league. The upholding by every means within the federal power of constituted authority thrucut the Dominion; the maintenance of parliamentary control over all legislation; respect for the rights and powers of the provinces.

Citizenship.

The adoption of such measures as are necessary to maintain and protect the ideals of Canadian citizenship and co-operation with the provinces in their efforts to Canadianize alien immigrants; the fostering of a Canadian as opposed to any class or sectional spirit and the elimination of all prejudices that tend to retard or destroy national unity and development.

National Policies:

Practical application of the principle that parliament and government exist to make and administer laws for all the people and not for any particular section to the detriment of the nation as a whole; the carrying out of policies that are nation-wide in their application or effect and that prosperity and happiness of all its people.

A thore revision of the tariff with a view to the adoption of such reasonable measures as are necessary: (a) To assist in providing adequate revenues, (b) to stabilize legitimate industries, (c) to encourage the establishment of new industries essential to the economic development of the nation, (d) to develop to the fullest exten our natural resources, (e) to prevent the abuse of the tariff for the exploitation of the consumers, and (f) to safeguard the interests of the Canadian people in the existing world struggle for commercial and industrial supremacy.

As a means of raising revenue, the tariff should be so adjusted as to place the chief burden upon those best able to bear it.

Articles of luxury should be heavily taxed thru the imposition of customs and excise rates. Food commodities and other necessaries of life, net produced or manufactured in Canada should, if taxed at all, bear duced in Canada should be subjected to such customs duties only as may investigation frem time to time.

be necessary in the general national interest to be determined after strict investigation from time to time.

Apart from the question of revenue the tariff should have regard to the maintenance, stability and prosperity of Canadian enterprise in the development of all our natural resources in lands, forests, mines, fisheries—as well as our agricultural and maintacturing industries.

Consideration must also be given to the importance of creating and maintaining conditions that will afford to Canadian industrial workers opportunities for steady and remunerative employment, and maintain proper and decent standards of living among our laboring population. It is undoubtedly in the true interests of Canada as a whole that Canadan workers should not be forced to seek in foreign countries employment (Continued on Page 2, Column 2).

### NEW PARTY IS FORMED

Ottawa, July 1.-With the announcement of the retirement of Sir Robert Borden definitely from their leadership and with the consequent necessity of naming a new chieftain, together with the allimportant future policy of the party to be discussed, the caucus of government followers, followng prorogation here today, will go down to posterity as one of the most momentous and significant in the federal political history of

Standing out with the retirement of Sir Robert was the choice of a new name for the party. There were many suggested, but the honor of being the sponsor for the successful one went to Hon. J. A. Calder, minister of mmigration and colonization chose "the National iberal and Conservative party,

to be commonly known as the "National party." There was no successor to Sir. Robert named. Sir Robert had promised to retain his seat in the house and to support his successor to the best of his ability. Among the cabinet members there is also an agreement to stand firmly by the man who is ultimately named by the whole of the government supporters. Each member of the caucus is to submit the name of his nominee in writing to Sir Robert. Talk around the corridors after the caucus indicated that the two most generally favored are Sir Thomas White and Hon. Arthur Meighen.

Premier Borden's Statement.

The following statement was issued by Sir Robert Borden tonight:

The supporters of the government met in caucus this morning at 10.30 oclock and continued in session until 1. They met again this afternoon at 4.30 and continued in session until 7.

From first to last the spirit of the caucus was magnificent and inspiring. With practical unanimity, the decision was reached to stand together, and, by united effort, to maintain stable government. There was a very frank and full discussion of all the subjects considered, and every member who spoke expressed his perfect confidence in the government and his pride in its record.

It was decided that the supporters of the government should unite themselves into a party to be known as the National Liberal and Conservative party. The policy of the party, which had been considered and tentatively approved at previous meetings, was finally adopted, and is now given to the public. At the forenoon meeting, the prime minister addressed the caucus at some length. He reviewed the direumstances which led to the formation of the present administration; he emphasized the supreme purpose which hought together men who had formerly opposed each other in the politi-

While again revision or the Canadian tariff based upon the foregoing consideration is due, it must be recognized that, owing to the war economic and commercial conditions the world round have been profoundly disturbed and that, as a consequence, it is neither practicable nor possible in the national or public interest to undertake such revision until a thore hydrometric and the execution of the principle of direct taxation with a view to increasing the national revenue derived from this source. Such taxation should be so adjusted that the burden may be borne by those most capable of sustaining it. Parliament Prorogues After Four Months of Legislative Action.

### SPEECH FROM THRONE

Ottawa. July. 1—(By Canadian Press).—The last half-hour of the session ws spent in the house of commons in humored exchanges between the front benchers. The commons assembled at two o'clock, and the only business before the house was a resolution introduced some time ago by J. E. Archambault, resarding French translations of Hansard, He agreed to let the matter stand over until next session with the confidence that something would be done to provide a complete French translation of Hansard simultaneously with the English version.

Has Hopeful Doubts.

Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King hoped that "if by any possibility this government was in power next fall," it would see that parliament was called earlier and that estimates were brought up earlier, so that the house would not see again the hurried despatch of financial business in the last, minutes of the session. Sir George Poster said that the government would expedite these matters all possible. As usual it, would provide a large block of the estimates at the beginning of the session, and the opposition might help by "coming to close quasters" on them early in the session instead of debating academic questions when the house went into committee of supply.

Foster Chafes Fielding.

Hon. W. S. Fielding started in to discuss this government's method of handling estimates, when the Black Rod of the senate knocked at the door of the house. Mr. Fielding said that he could quote convincing proof of his point. "If the majesties of the law allowed," As the resounding knocks on the deer died away, Sir George Foster said to. Mr. Fielding: "In other words, you are knocked out."

The commons then followed Black Rod to the senate chamber to hear the King's speech on prorogation.

You have wisely made provision to continue authority for the supervision of the marketing of Canadian wheat crops, if ever this world's markets should render this the most advantageous method of protecting the interests of the Canadian people. The exercise of this authority will necessarily receive the most attentive and careful consideration from my advisers. The measures providing for the control of fuel recognizes the full im-



## **POLES RETREATING** TO SHORTEN FRONT

In Kiszyn Region They Have Defeated a Strong Detachment of Bolsheviki.

Warsaw, July 1.—(By the Associated Press).—Polish forces on the Bolshevik front have evacuated Mozir and Kalenkowitz, in Polesia, according to an official statement issued at army staff headquarters here. This step was taken, it is said, for the purpose of shortening the front.

Soviet troops in the Bobruisk sector are re-grouping under cover of artillery fire, the statement says, but in the Kiszyn region the Poles have defeated a strong detachment of the enemy, capturing four cannon and a number of machine guns.
