

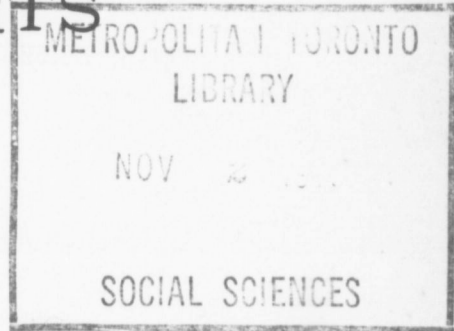

REPORT OF THE CHURCHWARDENS.

The congregation will be interested to learn that a desire has been expressed on behalf of the Executive Committee of Synod to find accommodation for diocesan purposes in connection with the offices of this Vestry on St. James' Cathedral premises. Preliminary estimates and designs of the necessary alterations and additions are being obtained in order that the subject may be laid before the Finance and Consulting Committee during the coming year.

Another matter, which seems to us to be of more than congregational interest, is also commended to the consideration of that committee and of the vestry. The Legislature has empowered the Provincial Government to take steps towards the due commemoration of this year as the centenary of Parliamentary institutions in Canada, and it may be said, in the British Colonial Empire. It is not generally known, and therefore it is all the more desirable to note in some public manner, that there is no spot in this capital city of the province so intimately connected with its early history and institutions as St. James' church. The present St. James' cathedral square was set apart by Governor Simcoe in 1797, in the plan of the town of York for the site of a church and churchyard for the inhabitants of the town of York, and was granted for those purposes. In that plot, accordingly, the dust of many of the earliest inhabitants of all denominations reposes to this day. But an even more important and interesting historical circumstance is that the church built on this site in 1807 became at once intimately connected with the municipal system of the province, as it was established by the first Parliament at its second session of 1793. It was in the vestry of this church that the inhabitants met annually for thirty years to elect churchwardens and townwardens for the town of York. The list of those townwardens for the thirty years between 1807 and 1833, and the official record of their election exist only in the vestry book of St. James' church. Whether the city authorities may feel disposed to join in erecting some permanent record of this primary stage of our local history remains to be seen. We think that the subject might properly be presented for their consideration. We also think that the Finance Committee might very well take up at the same time the question of beautifying the church by a window or other monument commemorating the thirty or more churches which have arisen within the ancient boundaries of St. James' parish since the foundation of the original church in 1807.

Hamilton,—That this Vestry having heard from the Rector the plan for the daily opening of the church and the holding of service therein, desires to assure him of sympathy and encouragement in the aforesaid matter, and in heartily welcoming all worshippers, at all times, to this mother church of Toronto. Carried.

This vestry, having heard with regret that Mr. O. A. Howland has declined to offer his services again as people's Churchwarden of St. James' church, which office he has filled to the utmost acceptance of this Vestry and the congregation of the church for many years, begs hereby to express to Mr. Howland its most sincere thanks for the many and arduous services which during those years he has rendered not only to St. James' church but to the Anglican church in this diocese.

LIBRARIAN'S REPORT.

The Librarians beg to report that the past year has been a very satisfactory one, inasmuch as there seems to be an increasing demand for books on the part of the scholars, and the fine collection of books from which they can select has been much appreciated by the children attending the school.

The number of books lost during the past year has been small, and the condition of the books indicates that reasonable care is being taken of them, as a general rule, in the homes of the scholars. About twenty-five new books have been added to the library this year. The Infant class have of late had access to the library, and thus far it appears to be proving a boon not only to themselves, but, in many cases, to the parents.

The Rev. George Scott, of Minden, Diocese of Toronto, made a personal appeal for help to build a small church at Gelert, one of his stations. Our Rector has also kindly encouraged us by his presence and interest in the Society.

"This fund is expended in assisting forty-one missionaries, who minister to the needs of 121 different Churches or stations. Of these clergymen there are thirteen whose income is less than \$600, and four do not receive more than \$150. Out of this they are compelled to keep a horse, in addition to their other expences.

"It is not necessary to point out how hard it must be for any man, however earnest, to perform his work as it should be done under these conditions.

"Let us all resolve to give them a practical proof of our sympathy. We may be very sure that any sacrifice *we* may make at the present time will fall far short of the continual sacrifices which *they* are compelled to make in the work they have undertaken."

Two members of the Cathedral branch promised the Bishop of Algoma \$100 annually, for a certain number of years, towards the stipend of the Rev. R. Reinson. The time has expired, and by request of the Bishop half the amount will be contributed annually towards the stipend of the Mr. E. H. Earl, who is assisting the Rev. Chas. Piercy at Sudbury.

The Rector has been notified by the Bishop of Saskatchewan, of the removal of the Rev. H. T. Bourne from the Piegan Reserve, and of the appointment to the position of Mr. J. Hinchliffe, "a young man who can speak to the Indians without an interpreter. He has been teaching school and acting as catechist and lay reader on the Blood Reserve, in local connection with the C. M. S. He is a layman but is reading up for Holy Orders."

The Bishop also says, "I am in hopes we may still count upon the annual grant of \$400 from your congregation, which has been so kindly and regularly paid, and for which I am, and shall always be, most grateful."

In response to this appeal from the Bishop of Saskatchewan, the members of St. James' Cathedral branch resolved "That the \$400 per annum hitherto given to the Rev. H. T. Bourne, of the Piegan Reserve, be continued to his successor."

The Bishop of Mackenzie River has written to thank the members of this congregation for the assistance they have given him, and hopes their interest in his missions will not fail. He has secured the services of two Wycliffe College students, who will go out with him in May.

In connection with the Zenana Society, the members of this branch have decided to support two Bible-women in India. The annual cost for each one will be \$25.

By special request of the Diocesan Treasurer the Cathedral branch will guarantee \$20 instead of \$30 towards Miss Perkes' salary, and \$20 instead of \$10 towards the support of the Blackfoot Home for girls, in charge of Miss Perkes.

The other annual pledges remain as before—\$100 towards the stipend of a travelling missionary in the deanery of Haliburton, diocese of Toronto; \$25 towards the stipend of a missionary in the Temiscamingue District, diocese of Algoma; \$12 towards the rent of the central Dorcas Rooms on Yonge street.

It was resolved that "All money sent by this branch be passed through the hands of the Diocesan Treasurer of the W. A.

The membership by card has increased to 115, and eighty subscribers to the Monthly Letter Leaflet. Twelve ladies have become members of the "Extra-cent-a-day-Band," but we hope many more will join.

A member of this Auxiliary continues to pay \$250 for the education of a young man for the ministry and also \$100 towards the education of a missionary's son.

Another member of our Auxiliary has undertaken to provide board and education for a missionary's daughter for one year; another kindly undertaking her wardrobe.

In conclusion, we beg to thank all the members of the congregation who have so kindly assisted us by their generous subscriptions; and we particularly thank those who have helped and encouraged us in the actual work by attending the monthly meetings and using their influence in bringing others.

Let us all be more earnest and faithful in using our members' prayer, that our endeavours to aid and encourage missionaries may be blessed:

"Put into our hearts the things that we should do and say to promote Thy glory and further the object we have in hand. Grant that we may never be discouraged, but go forward with faith and hope—looking unto Thee."

work. The work done is of two kinds, the personal work done by the individual members and the work accomplished by the members collectively as a Chapter. As it is impossible to make a definite report of the former, it is of the latter that we wish to speak. The most important thing done has been the formation of a Bible-class for young men which has met in the School-house every Monday evening during the Winter. Mr. Woodroffe, of Wycliffe College, one of our members, has at great personal inconvenience, taught the class which has been of a very interesting character, and has consisted in part of very profitable discussion on biblical subjects.

In an age when attacks are being made on the Bible from all sides and even from within the fold of the Christian Church itself, it is an encouraging sight to see young men meeting regularly on a week night for the study of God's Word.

The course of sermons specially to young men which was so successfully inaugurated last year is being repeated this year. Dean Carmichael, of Montreal, preached the first, on the first Sunday in December; the Bishop of Algoma the second on the first Sunday in January; and the Rev. G. Osborne Troop, Rector of St. Martin's Church, Montreal, the third, on the second Sunday in February. On each occasion the Cathedral was crowded to the doors, a large proportion of those present being young men. There will probably be two more sermons in the course, one by the Rector and the other by Bishop Garrett, on the 22nd of May.

The Chapter held two open meetings this season, at one of which the Rector gave an address on "The Greatest Book in the World," and at the other Messrs. L. H. Baldwin and T. R. Clougher, of Grace Church, gave addresses on "Manly Christianity." These meetings were both interesting and satisfactory.

Other methods of work have also been carried out, such as hotel visiting, Esplanade work and visiting of young men at their homes and boarding-houses, and it is hoped that in the warmer weather some work may be done among the men employed on the vessels at the harbour.

We cannot conclude this report without alluding to the Convention of the Canadian Brotherhood held in this city in February last. It was gratifying to notice so many of our congregation attending and taking an interest in this Convention; it is one that will not soon be forgotten. What could be a more encouraging and impressive sight than to see so many young men gathered together from all parts of the Dominion and met there for one purpose and with one object in view—The spread of the Master's Kingdom.

The work of the Chapter for the year has been steady and unobtrusive, but on that very account, we have reason to hope, more lasting and effective.

THE CHOIRBOYS' GUILD.

TEMPERANCE SOCIETIES.

The junior Bands of Hope have steadily increased since their resuscitation this season. The boys and girls meet separately and on different evenings. The order and behaviour in both bands are most satisfactory. Religious instruction, prayer, singing and entertainment by the children, form the usual programme at the meetings. An exhibition of dissolving views was given to the members in the month of March, and the children are practising at the time of this report for a song-service, to be given by them at an early date.

The senior branch of the C. E. T. S. meets once in each month in connection with Miss Dixon's Bible-class. The membership roll, though not large, is encouraging. Everything is being done to afford pleasure and profit to those who attend the meetings.

SERVICES IN THE PARISH.

FIRE HALL, LOMBARD STREET.

The service every Sunday evening at this hall appears to be much appreciated by the excellent lot of men there stationed. Miss Smith has been most regularly at her post as organist.

HOMEOPATHIC HOSPITAL.

A service has been held regularly on the first Sunday in each month at the above hospital. The Sacrament of Holy Communion has been administered to patients and members of the staff, as from time to time required. The work of the Church in these matters, as also in that of regular visitation by the clergy, has met with a gratifying reception.
