

Sixteen Vers-Old Girl Will Enter The Thames Sixteen-Mile Race in London Boston; July 18-Sixteen-year-old Alsie Aykroyd, the East Boston girl who swam brom. Revere Beach to Bass Point and brok, a distance of seven miles, without topping for rest, will be one of the entries n the River Thames, London, August 20 o decide the world's amateur swimming hampionship.
