if it should. Either he will be a iterleader or he will be shown up as utterly incompetent to lead.

Altogether too many troops have patrols and patrol leaders nominally only. Is it not unfortunate that in many, many troops a boy is appointed leader and is greatly enthused by the appointment only to find at the next few meeting that his only duty is to stand in front of a patrol for about five minutes once a week. Contrast this boy's case with that of one, and the one I speak of really exists, who is responsible for each member of his patrol receiving instruction for Tenderfoot, Second Class and First Class; who is responsible for the attendance of each member of his patrol; and who is allowed and encouraged to take his patrol out on a hike.
