

## GIANT OF AIR THAT HAS CROSSED OCEAN

Some Facts About The Great British Dirigible R-34

The huge British dirigible airship R-34 which has passed the Atlantic Ocean to America, is the very latest as well as the very largest of this type of "ship." It is 639.5 feet in length; her greatest liameter is 78.9 feet and she has a capacity of 2,000,000 cubic feet of hydrogen gas. This gas is carried in 18 balloons inside the framework and outer covering. A netting keeps these balloons from rubbing against the lattice construction and outer covering. Four gondolas hang from this great fish-shaped gas bag and in these are five Maori engines of 250-horse power each, besides accommodations for oil and 30 people. The distance from the amidships bottom of the gondolas to the highest point of the ship is 92 feet.

### KOLTCHAK IS HIGHLY PRAISED

rible Atrocities Perpetrated Under Rule of the Bolsheviki

(Christian Science Monitor from its Eastern New York, July 2—That Admiral Koltchak is the greatest man that the Russian revolution has produced; that his only ambition is to redeem Russia from the terror of Lenine and Trotzky and set up a truly democratic government, and that he is worthy of the great cause he is leading, was asserted by John A. Embry, United States consul at Omsk, Siberia, upon his arrival in New York. Mr. Embry said that he had known Admiral Koltchak personally for a long time; that he had known him at Odessa, at Omsk and in the field, and that he was convinced that he was destined to lead Russia out of chaos and that the government he has already established is the best and most democratic in Russian history. This government, he said, included a cabinet of thirteen ministers, six of them Socialists, the others Social Democrats or non-partisans, but not a Tzarist among them. He quoted its head, who has a power similar to that of the president of the United States, as saying his only ambition is to see in Russia a constitutent assembly representing all the Russians, freely and honestly elected, and that then he would be ready to retire to private life. ling is somewhat lower than for similar work done in the Autumn. 



### THE LATE DR. ANNA SHAW

Dr. Anna Howard Shaw, honorary president of the National American Wo-man Suffrage Association, who died at her home in Faylan, Penn., on July 2, was 71 years old.

She was chairman of the Woman's Committee of the Council of National Defense and was recently awarded the Distinguished Service Medal for her work

Defense and was recently awarded the Distinguished Service Medal for her work during the war.

Dr. Shaw long had been prominently identified with the woman suffrage movement and was president of the National American Woman Suffrage Association consecutively for eleven years. In 1915 she declined a renomination and then was elected honorary president.

She had spoken in every state in the United States before many state legislatures and committees of both houses of Congress in the interest of suffrage. She was a member of the Woman Suffrage Alliance, International Council of Women, League to Enforce Peace and National Society for Broader Education.

Dr. Shaw continued her active participation in public affairs to the last. Immediately preceding the great war, in the early summer of 1914, Dr. Shaw went to Rome as chairman of the committee on suffrage and right of citizenship at the quinquennial session of the International Council of Women.

Immediately after hostilities ended in France Dr. Shaw signed the resolution she helped draft for the National American Woman Suffrage Association addressed to the Peace Conference, asking for punishment of the Germans for their crimes against women and girls.

For her endeavors in the interest of women at home as well as soldiers in France during the war, Dr. Shaw re-France during the war, Dr. Shaw re-ceived létters from Queen Mary of Eng-land, Mme. Poincare, wife of the Presi-dent of France, President Wilson and Gen. Pershing and other celebrities.
