



DEFAMING CANADA

History Back of the Ridiculous Statements of a German News-

(Times' Special Correspondence)

London, Nov. 11—A Canadian who has just returned from Berlin informs me that a tremendous sensation is being caused throughout Germany by the publication of articles damaging to the reputation of Canada. These were commenced by the Lokal Anzeiger, and are being extensively copied and quoted all over the German Empire.

My informant says that Canadian residents in Berlin intend to take every measure possible to refute the offensive and grotesque statements made in these articles; further that there seems to be little doubt that the articles are a further instalment of the violent attack on Canada which commenced when the C.P. R. obtained a concession from the Austrian government to run steamships from Trieste.

Inacuracy of statement and a light disregard of well-known facts are common to both. For instance, the original charges that Canada was a land of "white slaves" are on a parity with the uncomplimentary picture now being given of men and conditions in the dominion; which has been transmitted to you by cable.

Then followed the Austrian discussion concerning the operations of this Canadian company, again marked by violent German intervention. Another thing to be noted is that during the year the Illustrirte Zeitung published special Canadian editions in which the resources of the dominion and the opportunities for manufacturer, workman and farmer were faithfully recorded; the consequence was that these interests in the German Empire were carefully considering Canada.

The earlier methods of antagonism having failed, it was obviously necesstary to initiate a new campaign, consequently we have the Lokal Anzeiger articles. It is highly significant, too, that these articles are almost concurrent in publication with those from Vienna which state that serious charges against the Canadian Pacific are admitted to be unfounded.

We are paying 37 that institution, which the New York Evening Post describes as "a disgraceful prison." It is contended by the Prison Association that in opposing reconstruction they are doing so on the ground of economy. The Evening Post goes further, however, and says:

The tariff must come down.

Canadian Courier:—"Canada must learn to practice economy. We are paying 37 per cent more for what we eat and wear than we did in the period from 1890 to 1900. The price of living is higher here than in any place else in the world. We are grossly extravagant and culpably reckless." It might be added that we are also unwise to tolerate a high food that the presence of mind to fetch her one over the 'ead 'for we was rescued!" "But the state of New York is really too poor to tinker with a prison which

too poor to tinker with a prison which has been condemned from every point of view, because that would be merely temporizing with and modifying the evil conditions, instead of abolishing them outright. Moreover, the whole theory of punishment upon which Sing Sing was based is antiquated and has been discarded. Every up-to-date state is looking to the establishment of prison industrial farms; New Jersey, Washington, and Ohio are three that are working in this direction. To urge that New York must continue to huddle its prisoners together in that contracted space

oners together in that contracted space in Sing Sing, or in the prison in the mid-Manchester yesterday the armament in Sing Sing, or in the prison in the middle of Auburn, is false economy. For one thing it lays the entire stress on caging the prisoners and not upon treating them so that they will have at least a fair chance of re-entering society as reformed citizens. On the ground of the physical health of the prisoners alone, Sing Sing must go."

From every quarter comes the plea for the substitution of the prison industrial farm for the jail. If the reform is coming but slowly, it is nevertheless coming, and some parts of Canada have been progressive enough to be in the forefront of the movement. The province of New Brunswick should not lose any more time, or, if the province will not act, then the municipality of the city and county of St. John should be permitted to take action on its own account to provide a municipal farm.

At a meeting of business men in Manchester yesterday the armament craze was denounced, and the hope expressed that workingmen would vigorously oppose the building of Dread-noughts. This is a result of the activity of the armament-makers and other scare-mongers, who are constantly clamoring for greater expenditure on the navy.
