TO THE GRAND WORTHY CHIEF, OFFICERS AND REPRESENTA-TIVES OF GRAND TEMPLE, I. O. OF G. T., OF CANADA.

The Committee appointed at the Annual Session of this G. T., to co-operate with the Sons of Temperance in getting up Petitions to Parliament, for a Prohibitory Liquor Law, and also to memorialize Ecclesiastical Bodies on the subject of Prohibition, beg leave to report:

That said Joint Committee met in the City of Hamilton, on the 6th January last, and in a most harmonious manner, discussed the several matters referred to them. They agreed to Petition by Temples and Divisions, under seal and signature of Presiding Officers and Minute Secretaries, also stating the number of members. This has been carried out, and the Petitions forwarded to the Hon. M. Cameron for presentation to the House. The also decided to send form of Petition to each of the other Temperance Organizations. In view of the wish expressed by the Montreal Temperance Society, to establish a Canadian Prohibitory Liquor Law League, the matter was considered; they could not recommend either Order to unite in that movement; but expressed their approval of a Provincial Convention of all existing Temperance Organizations. The Sub-Committee to draft a Bill, did not approve of Mr. Linton's, but preferred one offered last year, with some amendments and additions, which has been handed to the Hon. O. Mowat, who agreed to put the same in legal form, free of charge. The Memorial to Religious Bodies is prepared, and at the proper time will be presented to them respectively. It was resolved that the expense of meeting, &c., of Committee, be equally borne by the two Orders. Your Committee recommend the thanks of this G. T. be sent to Hon. M. Cameron and O. Mowat.

GRAND WORTHY SECRETARY'S REPORT.

BOWMANVILLE, April 5, 1860.

G. W. CHIEF, OFFICERS AND REPRESENTATIVES:

We are permitted once more, under the guidance of a kind Providence, to meet in Grand Temple assembled.

We are always pleased to meet friends and acquaintances, under ordinary circumstances, when separated from them for a season; but how much more gratifying to meet those with whom we are associated as brothers and sisters in the great cause of humanity.

The Constitution does not require of me to present a report at a semi-annual Session; but it having formerly been the practice to do so, I therefore avail myself of the privilege, it being in all probability the last time I shall ever have the honor to address you.

I am pleased to meet so many of the old and tried friends of our cause, coupled with so many new recruits in our ranks, clearly demonstrating our future prosperity, and fairly shewing that wherever a blank may be created by the absence of old and familiar faces—through force of circumstances, such blank is fully repaired by the attendance of new members.

At our last Annual Session, and during the interim, circumstances transpired that have considerably agitated the entire ranks of our noble Order in Canada; and whatever course of action may be taken at this Session relative to the same, permit me to entreat, that all our discussions be tempered with a spirit of forbearance; and I trust each and all Representatives will weigh well the responsibility resting upon them, before discharging the trust reposed in them by their respective Temples, remembering that, in the event of any evil resulting from hasty legislation, we are individually held responsible to Him who knoweth our most secret thoughts for whatever may be impure in the motives which prompted our action. Let us, therefore, fully understand our obligations and responsibilities, and in all our actions be guided solely with an eye single to the advancement of our glorious Cause, and the redemption of the inebriate from the thraldrom of Intemperance.

The manner in which the motives of our members have been impugned, and our acts misrepresented through the public press, by professed temperance men, is to be deprecated. Other good causes have suffered through the baseness of traitors, and we need not expect to escape. But ours is the glorious privilege of writing all injuries in the sand. Persecution may howl, and the blast of envy detract, yet we can say, "Father forgive them, they know not what they do."

Brothers and Sisters—the principles of our Order are founded on right, and are therefore perfect in themselves, and capable of overcoming all opposition. They are like the rock of Horeb, when touched by the magic rod of Moses, they gush forth with streams of refreshment to the weary and the dying—they often make the solitary place glad—they teach lessons of forgiveness, as we hope to be forgiven. Those virtues were conceived of the infinite wisdom—heaven-born and soul-redeeming. The evil may condemn that which is too pure for their society or sympathy; but we will march upward and onward, over all opposition; as God lives, we shall triumph: "the wilderness shall bud and blossom as the rose." We may have many a weary ascent to climb, and find many thorns in our pathway, but a cheerful prospect of fragrant flowers greet us; the smiles of the good and great cheer us; we are made happy by

Since our Annual Session, we are able to report fifty new Temples organized, with a membership of twelve hundred and fifty to be added to our former number, with two old Temples resuscitated: making our number of Temples over four hundred, with a membership of over 19,989. During the same period only four Temples have surrendered their Charters, which calamity was caused solely through the pressure of hard times, being unable to collect sufficient dues to meet their expenditure for rent, wood and light. I am happy to state that many of the newly organized Temples are the spontaneous result of public sentiment in favour of our Order and Cause; and notwithstanding that we now have a Temple in almost every town and village in Western Canada, our numbers could be more than doubled, would our Deputies work with the same zeal to present our claims, that our enemies shew in endeavouring to mar our prospects. Had each Deputy organized one Temple in every Quarter, it would have more than doubled our best effort; but while we have one Deputy (Br. W. Campbell,) who has organized twelve good and efficient Temples, during the last six months, twenty-three others have organized none; and I am fully convinced, if there was a good and efficient lecturer employed, who would attend to visiting the unoccupied territory, and organize Temples, much good would result: at the same time I trust the Representatives will give their unqualified disapprobation against those self-constituted Temperance Lecturers, unknown as tried Temperance men.

Brothers and Sisters, if we reflect that while our Order in Canada was in its infancy, our financial condition was such as to cast a gloom over our entire ranks, and as then prophesied by some, would eventually absorb our existence as an Organization, we cannot but contemplate our present prosperous condition with pride and satisfaction; and when we consider, that by a system of strict economy, and prudent legislation, we have been enabled, since 1856, to liquidate a debt, then owing, of some \$1700, and place our assests at over \$1,000, with a constant decrease of taxation, and, at this time, with a less assessment on Subordinates than any other similar organization in the world, it affords, in my opinion, sufficient evidence to silence all the base slander, as to our reckless expenditure, and to establish a perfect confidence in the administration of your Executive.

Ever since I have had the honour of being a member of this Grand Temple, it has been my highest ambition and constant study to see secured for the Grand Temple of Canada the proud and honourable position she now occupies; to be the first to claim the palm of victory over all the other seventeen Grand Temples under the jurisdiction of the R. W. G. L., and entitle her to four Representatives, the highest position which can constitutionally be attained by any Grand Temple; and I am happy to say, that our sister Grand Temples freely accord to us the honor we are so justly entitled to; and if my humble efforts have, in the smallest degree, contributed toward securing the much-coveted boon to Canada, the result more than compensates for all the care and thought bestowed, as I warmly feel the poet's inspiration in the following glowing lines:

"Breathes there a man with soul so dead, Who to himself hath never said— This is my own, my native land."

And I would here state for your information and satisfaction, that the R. W. G. Templar has, in very complimentary terms, adopted our code of Constitution for Subordinate Temples, as the best which has come under his notice, and ordered a supply printed for the use of the Subordinate Temples under the immediate jurisdiction of the R. W. G. L.

I have attended every Session of the R. W. G. Lodge, since its organization, and with those meetings I couple some of my happiest recollections. When I comtemplate the noble principles displayed at the alter of Faith, Hope and Charity, there all political preferences and National pride give way to nobler feelings; and we freely unite and exchange sentiments as Brothers and Sisters in the great and glorious Cause—the redemption of man from the thraldom of Intemperance.

I have also attended every Session of this Grand Temple, but one, since its organization, and I am this day forcibly struck with the fact, that I stand here as the only Charter member present; but notwithstanding that the original branch of this noble Temperance tree in Canada has almost become withered and decayed, it is pleasing to reflect that sufficient vitality remained to sustain and invigorate the numerous grafting which were being yearly made; and while my health and strength is spared me, by a kind Providence, I trust I will always be found doing my duty as a Good Templar.

TO THE G. W. C. T., OFFICERS AND MEMBERS:

Your Committee on the State of the Order, have great pleasure in performing their duty, because this noble Institution, with which we have the happiness of being connected, continues to enjoy the smiles of Heaven, the sunshine of our Redeemer's countenance, and the inspiring energy of the Holy One, who is the author of every good and perfect gift.

It is worthy of note, that the Independent Order of Good Templars, of North America, in all jurisdictions of Grand Temples, has been marked with progress from the beginning; and in no jurisdiction has the same amount of progress marked our heaven-inspired efforts, than in Canada.

When we reflect on the powerful influence of the Drinking Usages of Society—the prevalence of Drinking Customs—the power of habit, and the tenacity with which those in the Traffic cling to the Bible-condemned and God-cursed business, not to speak of other kinds of opposition; and then look at the cheering facts furnished in the able Report of the Grand Worthy Secretary, we cannot but rejoice: our Faith is strengthened, our Hope is raised, and our Love to God—to our fellow-laborers, and to all mankind—is increased, and calls forth thanksgivings from every heart and tongue.
