AN ANTI-TEMPERANCE GOVERNMENT.

If the remarkable action of the city board of liquor license commissioners reflected only the will of its unimportant and irresponsible members there would be little that could be done by those citizens who object to seeing the law outraged, except to make unavailing protest now and follow it by the effort next year to have men appointed on the board who have some other interests than the protection of liquor sellers at the expense of the law.

The present Liquor License Act only allows the issue of seventy-five retail licenses in the city of St. John. When this law first went into force it would possibly have caused some hardship had it been immediately carried out to its full extent and the commissioners probably had the tacit approval of the majority of the people when they, as a temporary measure, took advantage of a clause in the act allowing those who had been deprived of licenses the privilege of continuing their business for three months, in order to sell out and close up their shops without heavy personal loss.

These protests have been coming for about eight years now and in spite of them and of the evident meaning of the law, there has been, every year, several more than seventy-five saloons openly doing business in the city. Extensions, allowed for three months by the law to permit the saloon keeper to sell out, have been renewed time after time for the purpose of allowing him to buy more stock and continue in business.

Liquor dealers have been heard to remark that they would rather be without than with a license as, under the regular system, they would have to pay their fee in a lump, while under the extensions they were allowed to pay it in instalments.

The Star at the time doubted the sincerity of the board and, knowing that the extensions should expire the last of July, has kept a close watch upon developments. That its suspicion was well founded was proved by the information published in its columns yesterday that the extensions had again been renewed for another six months and would probably be, as in previous years, extended for the full year.

AN INJUSTICE EXPOSED. The Telegraph this morning said that the outsiders who had been brought by the government to do I. C. R. work in this city, had been ordered home again. An attempt is made to give the credit of the withdrawal to Mr. H. A. McKewen and to absolve the minister of railways from all blame in connection with the matter.

If Mr. McKewen has become solicitous of the welfare of St. John workmen, the conversion is a very recent one and the Star may be pardoned for claiming a little credit for it. The constituents of Mr. Emmerson—six were from Memramook and two from Sackville—who have been depriving St. John laborers of work have been here for about ten days. Considering that the ex-solicitor general is reported to be ambitious of wriggling back into the comfortable berth which, miscalculating his calibre, he vacated a few months ago with results of which we are too manifold to recount him, it is remarkable that he took no action to

remedy the wrong until this much abused but widely circulated journal called the attention of the St. John labor men and the police to it. The Star will be glad when the deportation promise is kept and will consider itself justified in believing that if this effort to defraud the workmen of St. John had not been so exposed as to make its continuance impossible, Mr. Emmerson's friends would have drawn money from the pockets of local laborers for some time to come.

Again has a bubble in the seething pot of Russian revolution exploded with fatal results. The death of Von Fischev, coming, as it does, in the time of Russia's defeat abroad is a sinister indication of the even greater danger that threatens the Slav autocracy at home. The iron lid of despotism has kept the overflow down to intermittent outbursts heretofore, but now that the attention of the rulers is distracted by foreign troubles, the swelling discontent threatens to boil over and overwhelm the land with a red flood. The result of continued oppression of the people has been shown more than once, but Russia has not yet learned the lesson.

The Telegraph, in its local columns, quotes a member of the old Portland Council who says that when it was proposed to establish in the North End the civic electric system which now provides light thirty dollars per lamp per year cheaper than the Carleton company and ten dollars per lamp per year cheaper than the Street Railway Company, the scheme was opposed as a sheer waste of money.

The Star is informed that the Wall street bridge is not the only St. John work upon which men from Westmorland county have been seen to prefer over local workmen. Apparently Mr. Emmerson regarding his chances here as hopeless, is using the patronage of this county to favor his own constituency where, rumor has it, all his resources will be needed in the next election.

DOMINION PARLIAMENT. OTTAWA, July 28.—Before the house went into supply this morning Mr. Bennett brought up the subject of J. D. Jackson's appointment as commercial agent in Leeds, England.

Mr. Bennett stated that the government gave Mr. Jackson the position for service in the last provincial election when Mr. Sutherland defeated Dr. McKay, Liberal, by over one hundred majority. Mr. Jackson had given large liberal majorities for many years.

Mr. Bennett's motion was to institute the inquiry into the methods of the conservatives in carrying the riding. Mr. Bennett stated that the government was associated with a criminal element of the riding and used corrupt means to secure its election. He stated that the government was a disgrace to the liberal party and was responsible for the present position of the government.

Mr. Borden's amendment expressed the view that in no stickable start the general elections will take place in August or early September. This statement is based on the fact that the printing bureau on the voters lists, and the pouring out of both parties of vast volumes of campaign literature by every mail.

A party of thirty Italian laborers passed through the city last evening on their way from Bridgewater to Boston, the fact that they were carrying tickets the two dollars head tax imposed by the United States government, collected from each man by one of the United States officials, Chris Nichols acted as assistant.
